#### **Introduction:**

In 1978, the City of Roanoke and downtown business community commissioned a \$100,000 study to evaluate the development potential of Roanoke's downtown core area and to prepare a plan for revitalizing it. The Elmwood Park Century Project is one of the recommendations from the study that was approved by City Council as submitted to the public as a bond issue in 1979.

In early 1981 a committee was established to advise Roanoke city officials on planned improvements to Elmwood Park and fundraise for their construction and maintenance. The committee was chaired by Betty Beasley Woody, with the following members of the committee: Dorothy L. Gibboney, Byron A. Hicks, Mary Watkins, William Watts, Louise Goodwin, Vernon Jamison, Roma Pevler and George Vogel.

Donations for planting material were solicited from the community, and were to be made in honor of historic Roanoke residents. Woody prepared a list of all the donations and retained original letters and information sent to document the individuals memorialized by the donations. The list of donors and memorials was to be maintained at the Roanoke Pubic Library, rather than incur the expense of numerous memorial plaques throughout the park.

The landscape design and planting plan for the park was prepared by landscape architect Lester Collins. In addition to plantings, other donations included additional boulders and funds for water features.

Betty Woody (1921-2016), who compiled this information, was active in many Roanoke civic organizations. She and her husband, Robert Wells Woody, a Roanoke City Council member 1952-56, were supporters of and fundraisers for many local nonprofit groups.

## **Scope and Content:**

- This collection consists of 1 legal-size record storage box and 1-letter size record storage box.
- Materials include: meeting minutes, plans (drawings and schematics), correspondence, lists of donors and news clippings, programs from dedication ceremonies.
- Items in Box 2 were originally stored in plastic sleeves in two binders, as assembled by Betty Woody. However, from these binders committee meeting minutes were interfiled with minutes found in Box 1, Folder 9, and general correspondence was added to Box 1, Folder 4.
- The date range of the collection is 1979 through 1984.
- One of the highlights of the collection is a list of donors, either of monetary contributions or who purchased trees dedicated to the memory of loved ones.
  Plans and schematics of the proposed park also provide an interesting glimpse at some of the ideas generated from the committee, some of which are visible in the park today.
