# CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Article I. The name of this organization shall be The Blue Ridge Forum.

Article II. Object. The object of this organization shall be to pursue steadfastly the yearly programs planned for the promotion of Higher Education, Personal Improvement and Social Progress. It shall be non-political and non-sectarian.

Article III. Membership. Membership shall be open to former Delphians. Additions may be made to the membership not to exceed twenty active members. other than former Delphians. To become a member, a candidate's name shall be endorsed by two members of the Forum and presented to the membership chairman who will present the nominee to the executive board. and upon adoption by the membership a written invitation shall be sent to the candidate. Majority vote shall elect. Upon acceptance by the candidate she becomes a member. All resignations shall be made in writing to the president by March of the current year.

Article IV. Officers. The officers of the organization shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and three directors of the seminar all elected annually to serve for a period of one year, or until their successors are duly elected and whose term of office shall begin immediately following the close of the year. Should an office become vacant prior to the annual election such vacancy may be filled by a majority vote at any regular meeting.

Article V. Amendments. Amendments may be made to this constitution by giving previous notice and adopted by a two-thirds vote of members present and voting, a quorum being present.

Article I. The Forum shall hold monthly meetings beginning in September and closing in May.

Section II. The president shall have power to call

Article III. A special meeting may be called by special meetings. a majority vote of the members present at any regular a majority and discount being present. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. The Executive Board shall consist of all elected and appointed officers. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article V. The president shall preside at all meetings of the organization; shall diligently strive to promote its welfare at all times; shall stimulate the interest and cooperation of the members by precept and example and shall otherwise direct the affairs of the

The offices of Parliamentarian, Critic, Reporter, organization. Timekeeper, Historian and Rollkeeper shall be filled by the President, who shall appoint all special committees not otherwise provided for.

Article VI. In the absence of the president, the vice-president shall assume the duties of the president. She shall also serve as Chairman of the Hospitality Committee. In the event of the death of a member of the Forum or of one in the immediate family of a member, she shall arrange for a floral tribute to be sent to the family.

Article VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the minutes of all meetings; the record of the names and addresses of all members; shall be custodian of all organization records and shall give notice of all regular or special meetings as may be necessary.

Article VIII. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to enter in the records of the organization the receipts and disbursements of all monies; she shall render at the close of the year a complete statement of the organization's finance, and shall be custodian of and responsible for all funds.

Article IX. The members of the seminar shall appoint a leader for each program and shall assign to various members the topics they are to discuss. They shall also see that the topics for study obtained in the year book are faithfully carried out. Non-members shall not be given the privilege of the floor and shall not appear on any program.

#### ELECTIONS

Article X. At the regular business meeting in April a Nominating Committee of three shall be elected. This committee shall make its report for officers as called for in Article IV of the Constitution. Nominations from the floor may also be made at this time. Election shall be by ballot, provided there is more than one nominee for any office; otherwise by acclamation.

#### DUES

Article XI. Annual dues shall be two dollars, payable upon receipt of the year book.

# Our First Thanksgiving Again

With Thanksgiving only a week away, Gov Albertis S Harrison Jr. has renewed the old struggle to get recognition for the fact that the first giving of thanks in the New World, at least the English portion thereof. was held in Virginia in 1619. Th's was a full year before the Pilgrims landed at Plymouth.

The good ship Margaret, bearing a group of 38 colonists, reached Berkeley plantation at Harrison's Landing Dec. 4, 1619.

Acting on instructions that the date of landing "shall be yearly and perpetually kept holy as a day of Thanksgiving to Almighty God," John Woodliffe, merchant and leader of the party, complied.

The service was repeated a year later and possibly until 1622 when an Indian massacre wiped out most of the colony. Admittedly, that was the end for a long time, but undoubtedly thanksgivings were held later in many places.

It so happened that the Pilgrims had better publicity agents over the years and so continue to get credit for starting the custom.

They got themselves first into a lot of other things. For example, even Virginians when singing America, have to extol: "Land of the Pilgrims' pride." (We'd like to substitute "Cavaliers" for "Pilgrims" but it changes the meter).

President Kennedy, in his proclamation to be printed in full on this page a week hence, gave the Pilgrims all credit. He didn't mention Berkeley and so, in proclaiming the day himself, Governor Harrison ignored the Pilgrims and the President.

Someday, we hope, history will be rewritten correctly for use of the whole country. Until then we'll just have to suffer the injustice.

Anyhow, please pass the turkey and cranberries!

# CONSTITUTION AND BY-LAWS

Article I. The name of this organization shall be The Blue Ridge Forum.

Article II. Object. The object of this organization shall be to pursue steadfastly the yearly programs planned for the promotion of Higher Education, Personal Improvement and Social Progress. It shall be non political and non-sectarian.

Article III. Membership. Membership shall be open to former Delphians. Additions may be made to the membership not to exceed twenty active members, other than former Delphians. To become a member, a candidate's name shall be endorsed by two members of the Forum and presented to the membership chairman who will present the nominee to the executive board, and upon adoption by the membership a written invitation shall be sent to the candidate. Majority vote shall elect. Upon acceptance by the candidate she becomes a member. All resignations shall be made in writing to the president by March of the current year.

Article IV. Officers. The officers of the organization shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and three directors of the seminar all elected annually to serve for a period of one year, or until their successors are duly elected and whose term of office shall begin immediately following the close of the year. Should an office become vacant prior to the annual election such vacancy may be filled by a majority vote at any regular meeting.

## BY-LAWS

Article I. The Forum shall hold monthly meetings beginning in September and closing in May.

Section II. The president shall have power to call special meetings.

Article III. A special meeting may be called by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting, a quorum being present. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. The Executive Board shall consist of all elected and appointed officers. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article V. The president shall preside at all meetings of the organization; shall diligently strive to promote its welfare at all times; shall stimulate the interest and cooperation of the members by precept and example and shall otherwise direct the affairs of the organization.

The offices of Parliamentarian. Critic, Reporter, Timekeeper, Historian and Rollkeeper shall be filled by the President, who shall appoint all special committees not otherwise provided for.

Article VI. In the absence of the president, the vice-president shall assume the duties of the president. She shall also serve as Chairman of the Hospitality Committee. In the event of the death of a member of the Forum or of one in the immediate family of a member, she shall arrange for a floral tribute to be sent to the family.

Article VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the minutes of all meetings; the record of the names and addresses of all members; shall be custodian of all organization records and shall give notice of all regular or special meetings as may be necessary.

Article VIII. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to enter in the records of the organization the receipts and disbursments of all monies; she shall render at the close of the year a complete statement of the organization's finance, and shall be custodian of and responsible for all funds.

Article IX. The members of the seminar shall appoint a leader for each program and shall assign to various members the topics they are to discuss. They shall also see that the topics for study obtained in the year book are faithfully carried out. Non members shall not be given the privilege of the floor and shall not appear on any program.

#### ELECTIONS

Article X. At the regular business meeting in April a Nominating Committee of three shall be elected. This committee shall make its report for officers as called for in Article IV of the Constitution. Nominations from the floor may also be made at this time. Election shall be by ballot, provided there is more than one nominee for any office; otherwise by acclamation.

#### DUES

Article XI. Annual dues shall be two dollars, payable upon receipt of the year book.

Source of Authority

Article XII. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be authority on all points of procedure not covered by this constitution and by-laws.

#### GUEST PRIVILEGE

Article XIII. Any member shall have the privilege of inviting a resident guest to the meetings, but the same resident guest shall not be entitled to more than one meeting in any one year. Non-resident guests may have guest privileges extended during the visit provided it does not exceed two meetings in any year. Visiting Delphians are always welcome.

### CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be The Blue Ridge Forum.

Article II. Object. The object of this organization shall be to pursue steadfastly the yearly programs planned for the promotion of Higher Education, Personal Improvement and Social Progress. It shall be non-political and non-sectarian.

Article III. Membership. Membership shall be open to former Delphians. Additions may be made to the membership not to exceed twenty active members, other than former Delphians. To become a member, a candidate's name shall be endorsed by two members of the Forum and presented to the membership chairman who will present the nomine to the executive board, and upon adoption by the membership a written invitation shall be sent to the candidate. Majority vote shall elect. Upon acceptance by the candidate she becomes a member. All resignations shall be made in writing to the president by March of the current year.

Article IV. Officers. The officers of the organization shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and three directors of the seminar all elected annually to serve for a period of one year, or until their successors are duly elected and whose term of office shall begin immediately following the close of the year. Should an office become vacant prior to the annual election such vacancy may be filled by a majority vote at any regular meeting.

### BY LAWS

Article I. The Forum shall hold monthly meetings beginning in September and closing in May.

Article II. The president shall have power to call special meetings.

Article III. A special meeting may be called by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting, a quorum being present. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. The Executive Board shall consist of all elected and appointed officers. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article V. The president shall preside at all meetings of the organization; shall diligently strive to promote its welfare at all times; shall stimulate the interest and cooperation of the members by precept and example and shall otherwise direct the affairs of the organization.

The offices of Parliamentarian, Critic, Reporter, Timekeeper, Historian and Rollkeeper shall be filled by the President, who shall appoint all special committees not otherwise provided for.

Article VI. In the absence of the president, the vicepresident shall assume the duties of the president. She shall also serve as Chairman of the Hospitality Committee. This Committee shall be responsible for the entire program and details of the luncheons. In the event of the death of a member of the Forum, or her husband, the Chairman shall arrange for a floral tribute to be sent to the family.

Article VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the minutes of all meetings; the record of the names and addresses of all members; shall be custodian of all organization records and shall give notice of all regular or special meetings as may be necessary.

Article VIII. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to enter in the records of the organization the receipts and disbursements of all monies; she shall render at the close of the year a complete statement of the organization's finance, and shall be custodian of and responsible for all funds.

Article IX. The members of the seminar shall appoint one of the three to introduce the program and conduct the discussions for the day. They shall also see that the topics for study obtained in the year book are faithfully carried out. Non members shall not be given the privilege of the floor and shall not appear on any program.

#### ELECTIONS

Article X. At the regular business meeting in April a Nominating Committee of three shall be elected. This committee shall make its report for officers as called for in Article IV of the Constitution. Nominations from the floor may also be made at this time. Election shall be by ballot, provided there is more than one nominee for any office; otherwise by acclamation.

#### DUES

Article XI. Annual dues shal be three dollars, payable upon receipt of the year book.

### Source of Authority

Article XII. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be authority on all points of procedure not covered by this constitution and by-laws.

### GUEST PRIVILEGE

Article XIII. Any member shall have the privilege of inviting a resident guest to the meetings, but the same resident guest shall not be entitled to more than one meeting in any one year. Non-resident guests may have guest privileges extended during the visit provided it does not exceed two meetings in any year. Visiting Delphians are always welcome.

# **DAR Accepts Old Bible** For Museum

A rare old Bible, owned by Mrs. C. P. Kennett and Mrs. T. W. Bibb of Roanoke, has been accepted as a gift by the Curator General of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution.

The presentation was made through the Col. William Preston chapter, DAR, and the ancient volume, published in 1752 in Edinburgh, Scotland, will soon be on display at the DAR national museum in Washington.

The Bible first belonged to John Cassel whose family came to Philadelphia from Kreigsheim, Germany, in 1686 at the invitation of William Penn. Later, it was inherited by a daughter who married John Banks, a young Continental army volunteer who participated in Gen. Washington's famous crossing of the Delaware and in the taking of the Hessians at Trenton.

ing of the Hessians at Trenton.

He was captured by the British but later released. Births of the 12 children of the young couple are recorded in the Bible as are many names of Revolutionary soldiers and others prominent in the life of that era.

Containing the Apocrypha and many family records, the Bible has long been in the possession of the Shelor family through descendency from Deborah Cassel Banks who moved to Virginia. In the 1800's, the leather cover showed wear and was encased in velvet by Deborah's great granddaughter.

#### CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS

Article 1. The name of this organization shall be The Blue Ridge Forum.

Article II. *Object*. The object of this organization shall be to pursue steadfastly the yearly programs planned for the promotion of Higher Education, Personal Improvement and Social Progress. It shall be non-political and non-sectarian.

Article III. Membership. Membership shall be open to former Delphians. Additions may be made to the membership not to exceed forty active members, other than former Delphians. To become a member, a candidate's name shall be endorsed by two members of the Forum and presented to the membership chairman who will present the nominee to the executive board, and upon adoption by the membership a written invitation shall be sent to the candidate. Majority vote shall elect. Upon acceptance by the candidate she becomes a member. All resignations shall be made in writing to the president by March of the current year.

Article IV. Officers. The officers of the organization shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and three directors of the seminar all elected annually to serve for a period of one year, or until their successors are duly elected and whose term of office shall begin immediately following the close of the year. Should an office become vacant prior to the annual election such vacancy may be filled by a majority vote at any regular meeting.

#### BY LAWS

Article I. The Forum shall hold monthly meetings beginning in September and closing in May.

Article II. The president shall have power to call special meetings.

Article III. A special meeting may be called by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting, a quorum being present. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. The Executive Board shall consist of all elected and appointed officers. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article V. The president shall preside at all meetings of the organization; shall diligently strive to promote its welfare at all times; shall stimulate the interest and cooperation of the members by precept and example and shall otherwise direct the affairs of the organization.

The offices of Parliamentarian, Critic, Reporter, Timekeeper, Historian and Rollkeeper shall be filled by the President, who shall appoint all special committees not otherwise provided for.

Article VI. In the absence of the president, the vicepresident shall assume the duties of the president. She shall also serve as Chairman of the Hospitality Committee. This Committee shall be responsible for the entire program and details of the luncheons. In the event of the death of a member of the Forum, or her husband, the Chairman shall arrange for a floral tribute to be sent to the family.

Article VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the minutes of all meetings; the record of the names and addresses of all members; shall be custodian of all organization records and shall give notice of all regular or special meetings as may be necessary.

Article VIII. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to enter in the records of the organization the receipts and disbursements of all monies; she shall render at the close of the year a complete statement of the organization's finance, and shall be custodian of and responsible for all funds.

Article IX. The members of the seminar shall appoint one of the three to introduce the program and conduct the discussions for the day. They shall also see that the topics for study obtained in the year book are faithfully carried out. Non members shall not be given the privilege of the floor and shall not appear on any program.

#### ELECTIONS

Article X. At the regular business meeting in April a Nominating Committee of three shall be elected. This committee shall make its report for officers as called for in Article IV of the Constitution. Nominations from the floor may also be made at this time. Election shall be by ballot, provided there is more than one nominee for any office; otherwise by acclamation.

#### DUES

Article XI. Annual dues shall be three dollars, payable upon receipt of the year book.

#### Sources of Authority

Article XII. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be authority on all points of procedure not covered by this constitution and by-laws.

#### GUEST PRIVILEGE

Article XIII. Any member shall have the privilege of inviting a resident guest to the meetings, but the same resident guest shall not be entitled to more than one meeting in any one year. Non-resident guests may have guest privileges extended during the visit provided it does not exceed two meetings in any year. Visiting Delphians are always welcome.



### CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS

Article I. The name of this organization shall be The Blue Ridge Forum.

Article II. *Object*. The object of this organization shall be to pursue steadfastly the yearly programs planned for the promotion of Higher Education, Personal Improvement and Social Progress. It shall be non-political and non-sectarian.

Article III. Membership. Membership shall be open to former Delphians. Additions may be made to the membership not to exceed forty active members, other than former Delphians. To become a member, a candidate's name shall be endorsed by two members of the Forum and presented to the membership chairman who will present the nominee to the executive board, and upon adoption by the membership a written invitation shall be sent to the candidate. Majority vote shall elect. Upon acceptance by the candidate she becomes a member. All resignations shall be made in writing to the president by March of the current year.

Article IV. Officers. The officers of the organization shall be a president, vice-president, secretary, treasurer and three directors of the seminar all elected annually to serve for a period of one year, or until their successors are duly elected and whose term of office shall begin immediately following the close of the year. Should an office become vacant prior to the annual election such vacancy may be filled by a majority vote at any regular meeting.

### BY LAWS

Article I. The Forum shall hold monthly meetings beginning in September and closing in May.

Article II. The president shall have power to call special meetings.

Article III. A special meeting may be called by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting, a quorum being present. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. The Executive Board shall consist of all elected and appointed officers. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article V. The president shall preside at all meetings of the organization; shall diligently strive to promote its welfare at all times; shall stimulate the interest and cooperation of the members by precept and example and shall otherwise direct the affairs of the organization.

The offices of Parliamentarian, Critic, Reporter, Timekeeper, Historian and Rollkeeper shall be filled by the President, who shall appoint all special committees not otherwise provided for.

Article VI. In the absence of the president, the vicepresident shall assume the duties of the president. She shall also serve as Chairman of the Hospitality Committee. This Committee shall be responsible for the entire program and details of the luncheons. In the event of the death of a member of the Forum, or her husband, the Chairman shall arrange for a floral tribute to be sent to the family.

Article VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the minutes of all meetings; the record of the names and addresses of all members; shall be custodian of all organization records and shall give notice of all regular or special meetings as may be necessary.

Article VIII. It shall be the duty of the treasurer to enter in the records of the organization the receipts and disbursements of all monies; she shall render at the close of the year a complete statement of the organization's finances and shall be custodian of and responsible for all funds.

Article IX. The members of the seminar shall appoint one of the three to introduce the program and conduct the discussions for the day. They shall also see that the topics for study obtained in the year book are faithfully carried out. Non members shall not be given the privilege of the floor and shall not appear on any program.

### ELECTIONS

Article X. At the regular business meeting in April a Nominating Committee of three shall be elected. This committee shall make its report for officers as called for in Article IV of the Constitution. Nominations from the floor may also be made at this time. Election shall be by ballot, provided there is more than one nominee for any office; otherwise by acclamation.

#### DUES

Article XI. Annual dues shall be three dollars, payable upon receipt of the year book.

### Sources of Authority

Article XII. Roberts' Rules of Order shall be authority on all points of procedure not covered by this constitution and by-laws.

### GUEST PRIVILEGE

Article XIII. Any member shall have the privilege of inviting a resident guest to the meetings, but the same resident guest shall not be entitled to more than one meeting in any one year. Non-resident guests may have guest privileges extended during the visit provided it does not exceed two meetings in any year. Visiting Delphians are always welcome.

### CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS

Article I. The name of this organization shall be The Blue Ridge Forum.

Article II. *Object*. The object of this organization shall be to pursue steadfastly the yearly programs planned for the promotion of Higher Education, Personal Improvement and Social Progress. It shall be non-political and non-sectarian.

Article III *Membership*. Membership shall not exceed 40 active members. To become a member, a candidate's name shall be endorsed by two members of the Forum and presented to the membership chairman who will present nominee to the executive board and upon adoption by the membership a written invitation shall be sent to the candidate. Majority vote shall elect. Upon acceptance by the candidate she becomes a member. All resignations shall be made in writing to the president.

Article IV. Officers. The officers of the organization shall be a president, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and three Program Directors, all elected annually to serve for one year, or until their successors are duly elected and whose term of office shall begin immediately following the close of the year. Should an office become vacant prior to the annual election such vacancy may be filled by a majority vote at any regular meeting.

Article V. Amendments. Amendments may be made to this constitution by giving previous notice and adopted by a two-thirds vote of members present and voting, a quorum being present.

### BY LAWS

Article I. The Forum shall hold monthly meetings beginning in September and closing in May.

Article II. The president shall have power to call special meetings.

Article III. A special meeting may be called by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting, a quorum being present. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. The Executive Board shall consist of all elected officers. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article V. The president shall preside at all meetings of the organization; shall diligently strive to promote its welfare at all times; shall stimulate the interest and cooperation of the members by precept and example and shall otherwise direct the affairs of the organization. The officers of Parliamentarian, Critic, Reporter, Time-keeper, Historian and Hospitality Chairman shall be filled by the President, who shall appoint all special committees not otherwise provided for.

Article VI. In the absence of the president, the vice president shall assume the duties of the president.

Article VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the minutes of all meetings; the record of the names and addresses of all members; and shall be the custodian of all organization records and shall send cards to the sick and bereaved.

Article VIII. It shall be the duty of the Telephone Chairman to notify the membership of all regular or special meetings as may be necessary.

Article X. The Program Directors shall appoint one of the three to introduce the program and conduct the discussions for the day. They shall also see that the topics for study obtained in the year book are faithfully carried out. Non members shall not be given the privilege of the floor and shall not appear on any program.

Article XI. The Hospitality Committee shall be responsible for the entire program and details of the luncheons. In the event of the death of a member of the Forum, or her husband, the Chairman shall arrange for a floral tribute to be sent to the family.

#### ELECTIONS

Article XII. At the regular business meeting in April a Nominating Committee of three shall be elected. This committee shall make its report for officers as called for in Article IV of the Constitution. Nominations from the floor may also be made at this time. Election shall be by ballot, provided there is more than one nominee for any office; otherwise by acclamation.

#### DUES

Article XIII. Annual dues shall be three dollars, payable upon receipt of the year book.

### Sources of Authority

Article XIV. Robert's Rules of Order shall be authority on all points of procedure not covered by this constitution and by-laws.

#### GUEST PRIVILEGE

Article XV. Any member shall have the privilege of inviting a resident guest to the meetings, but the same resident guest shall not be entitled to more than one meeting in any one year. Non resident guests may have guest privileges extended during the year provided it does not exceed two meetings in any year.





#### CONSTITUTION AND BY LAWS

Article I. The name of this organization shall be The Blue Ridge Forum.

Article II. *Object*. The object of this organization shall be to pursue steadfastly the yearly programs planned for the promotion of Higher Education, Personal Improvement and Social Progress. It shall be non-political and non-sectarian.

Article III. Membership. Membership shall not exceed 40 active members. To become a member, a candidate's name shall be endorsed by two members of the Forum and presented to the membership chairman who will present nominee to the executive board and upon adoption by the membership a written invitation shall be sent to the candidate. Majority vote shall elect. Upon acceptance by the candidate she becomes a member. All resignations shall be made in writing to the president.

Article IV. Officers. The officers of the organization shall be a president, Vice-President, Secretary, Treasurer and three Program Directors, all elected annually to serve for one year, or until their successors are duly elected and whose terms of office shall begin immediately following the close of the year. Should an office become vacant prior to the annual election such vacancy may be filled by a majority vote at any regular meeting.

Article V. Amendments. Amendments may be made to this constitution by giving previous notice and adopted by a two-thirds vote of members present and voting, a quorum being present.

#### BY LAWS

Article I. The Forum shall hold monthly meetings beginning in September and closing in May.

Article II. The president shall have power to call special meetings.

Article III. A special meeting may be called by a majority vote of the members present at any regular meeting, a quorum being present. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article IV. The Executive Board shall consist of all elected officers. Five members shall constitute a quorum.

Article V. The president shall preside at all meetings of the organization; shall diligently strive to promote its welfare at all times; shall stimulate the interest and cooperation of the members by precept and example and shall otherwise direct the affairs of the organization. The officers of Parliamentarian, Critic, Reporter, Time-keeper, Historian and Hospitality Chairman shall be filled by the President, who shall appoint all special committees not otherwise provided for.

Article VI. In the absence of the president, the vice president shall assume the duties of the president.

Article VII. It shall be the duty of the Secretary to keep the minutes of all meetings; the record of the names and addresses of all members; and shall be the custodian of all organization records and shall send cards to the sick and bereaved.

Article VII. It shall be the duty of the Telephone Chairman to notify the membership of all regular or special meetings as may be necessary.

Article X. The Program Directors shall appoint one of the three to introduce the program and conduct the discussions for the day. They shall also see that the topics for study obtained in the year book are faithfully carried out. Non members shall not be given the privilege of the floor and shall not appear on any program.

Article XI. The Hospitality Committee shall be responsible for the entire program and details of the luncheons. In the event of the death of a member of the Forum, or her husband, the Chairman shall arrange for a floral tribute to be sent to the family.

#### ELECTIONS

Article XII. At the regular business meeting in April a Nominating Committee of three shall be elected. This committee shall make its report for officers as called for in Article IV of the Constitution. Nominations from the floor may also be made at this time. Election shall be by ballot, provided there is more than one nominee for any office; otherwise by acclamation.

#### Dues

Article XIII. Annual dues shall be three dollars, payable upon receipt of the year book.

#### Sources of Authority

Article XIV. Robert's Rules of Order shall be authority on all points of procedure not covered by this constitution and by-laws.

#### GUEST PRIVILEGE

Article XV. Any member shall have the privilege of inviting a resident guest to the meetings, but the same resident guest shall not be entitled to more than one meeting in any one year. Non resident guests may have guest privileges extended during the year provided it does not exceed two meetings in any year.

In its 50 years, the club has presented many celebrated artists in concert. Its first concert was in 1909 when Prof. Van Cleve of Cincinnati gave a performance in the music salon at Hobbie Bros.

The club has a woman's chorus which sings at state and local affairs; a music appreciation class, and student, junior and juvenile divisions for young musicians.
