

WOMAN'S CLUB OF ROANOKE, VA. BRIEF HISTORY FOR THE YEAR ENDING MAY, 1962

The year 1961-62 has been rewarding and much work has been accomplished under the leadership of Mrs. James Long (Frances) who has served her second term.

Mrs. Long has proved to be one of our most successful and dearly loved presidents. In addition to her unusual capabilities, she is kind, considerate and helpful to every one and has won the full confidence of the members.

The Board of Directors is composed of twenty-five outstanding women who have given unsparingly of their time and personality as they have planned and organized the work.

The Club carries an average membership of two hundred and fifty. Thirty three names have been added. About fourteen have been lost. Some have moved out of the city, others resigned and three have died.

The members have worked diligently and have co-operated in all endeavors to better the community and to carry out the Federation objectives.

In addition to the more than five thousand hours of volunteer personal service, three thousand dollars has been donated to civic, charitable and cultural groups, namely, The American Cancer Society, Mentally Retarded Association, Roanoke Fine Arts Center, Roanoke Symphony, Veterans Hospital Heart Fund, March of Dimes, Roanoke Valley Association, Mary Louise Home of The King's Daughters, Juvenile Detention Home and \$1,000.00 gift to the Roanoke Hospital Drive. Fifty Seat Belts were sold as a contribution to the Safety Program.

Three members have been named Mothers of the Year in Religion, Arts and Science and Community Life. Members have appeared on T.V. programs fourteen times. Ceramics, Knitting, Crafts and Bridge groups were sponsored by the various departments.

The Departments have had regular meetings which have been well attended and their programs worthwhile and in line with the State Federation objectives.

The Woman's Club continues to follow the same creed and purposes for which it was organized, although, as the years pass we must "Face the Challenges of a New Decade," our Theme for 1962.

BY-LAWS

Revised May, 1961

ARTICLE I-Membership

Section 1. The membership shall consist of four classes: Active, Associate, Honorary and Life.

SECTION 2. Only women shall be eligible for election as Active members.

SECTION 3. Men or women who are unable to attend because of business or professional activities who are in sympathy with and desire to encourage the aims of the club, shall be eligible for election as Associate members.

Section 4. Honorary members shall be eligible to vote and hold office, but shall be exempt from payment of dues. Members of the Past Presidents Group shall automatically become Honorary Members of the Club.

Section 5. Applicants for membership shall be approved by the Board of Directors and elected by the membership. Each applicant shall be sponsored by two club members.

ARTICLE II-Officers and Elections

Section 1. The Officers shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Third Vice President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of one year. The outgoing President shall serve as Director-at-Large during the term of office of her successor.

Section 2. At the regular meeting in February of each year the Club shall nominate from the floor and elect a nominating committee of five members who shall report at the next regular meeting nominations for officers. Nominations may also be made from the floor. No member may be nominated whose consent to serve, if elected, has not been secured.

Section 3. The vote shall be by ballot for any office where there is more than one nominee, otherwise elected by acclamation.

Section 4. The officers shall be elected in March and shall take office at the close of the meeting in May.

Section 5. No member shall be eligible for the same office or chairmanship for more than two consecutive years except the treasurer and parliamentarian.

Section 6. If a vacancy occurs in the office of President, the First Vice President shall succeed to that office for the unexpired term. All other vacancies in elective offices shall be filled by the Board of Directors.

Section 7. As soon as practicable after annual election of officers, the President-Elect shall call together the newly elected officers for the purpose of completing the Board of Directors. At this meeting the heads of departments, standing committee chairmen and the historian shall be elected whose terms of office shall run until the close of the annual meeting in May. The President shall have the privilege of choosing the corresponding secretary and parliamentarian.

Section 8. The Junior Woman's Clubs may each select a Contact Chairman from the membership of the Woman's Club, with the approval of the Board. These Contact Chairmen shall become members of the Board of Directors. The Presidents of the Junior Clubs and the club members on the State Executive Committee, shall be conference members of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III—Duties of Officers

Section 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings and to perform all duties pertaining to that office. She shall be Chairman of

the Board of Directors and ex-officio member of all committees except the nominating committee.

Section 2. In the absence of the President, the First Vice President shall perform all duties pertaining to the office.

Section 3. In the temporary absence of the President, the First, the Second or the Third Vice President, in order of their rank, shall preside over the meeting.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive all money of the Club, collect all dues, keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and shall pay out all funds by order of the Board of Directors. A yearly report shall be submitted to the Board of Directors at the June meeting. All funds raised by any department or committee in the name of the Club shall be deposited with the club treasurer at or before each monthly Board meeting. The audited yearly report shall be printed in the Year Book.

Section 5. The Recording Secretary shall record and keep on permanent file the minutes of all regular and called meetings of the board and of the membership. She shall send to the President a copy of the minutes as soon as possible after the meetings.

Section 6. The Corresponding Secretary shall attend to all correspondence of the Club. She shall notify members of their election and shall furnish the President with copies of all letters written.

SECTION 7. The Historian shall prepare the official history of the Club during her term of office.

Section 8. The Past Presidents of the Woman's Club shall constitute an advisory group to the Executive Board. The duties of such Advisory Group shall be to consider and advise on such subjects as shall be referred to it by the President or by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IV-Management of the Club

Section 1. The government and management of the Club shall be vested in the Board of Directors, which shall consist of the elected officers, the heads of departments and standing committees herein provided for, the Junior Contact Chairmen, Corresponding Secretary, Parliamentarian, Historian and the retiring President.

Section 2. Any member of the Board absent from three consecutive regular meetings without sufficient reason shall forfeit her place as a member of the Board.

ARTICLE V-Departments and Committees

Section 1. The activities of the Club may be vested in Departments which conform to those of the State and General Federations as nearly as possible.

Section 2. The First Vice President shall serve as Dean of Departments. The Second Vice President shall serve as Chairman of Hospitality. The Third Vice President shall serve as Membership Chairman

Section 3. Standing Committees shall be Ways and Means, Cancer Control, Health, Program, Hospitality, Membership, Finance, Year Book and Revisions.

Section 4. The Program Committee, whose duties shall be to arrange Club Membership programs from September through May, shall consist of at least three members. The proposed programs, insofar as possible, shall be submitted to the Board of Directors for approval.

ARTICLE VI-Meetings of the Club

Section 1. The annual meeting of the Club shall be held on the third Friday in May, time and place to be announced.

Section 2. The regular monthly meetings of the Club shall be held on the third Friday of each month except June, July and August at 1:30 P.M., preceded by a social hour, unless changed by a two-thirds vote of the Board Members, due notice of time and place to be given to the membership.

Section 3. Special Meetings may be called at any time by the Board of Directors, provided notice be given the membership three days prior to the meeting. No written notice shall be required for the annual or regular meeting.

Section 4. Twenty-one active members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

ARTICLE VII-Meetings of the Board of Directors

Section 1. Regular monthly meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at ten A.M. on the Thursday preceding the third Friday of each month except July and August unless changed by a two-thirds vote of the Board members.

Section 2. Special meetings may be called by the President or by five members of the Board of Directors, provided each member shall be notified

two days in advance.

Section 3. Seven members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII—Dues

Section 1. (a) Annual Dues of active members shall be \$7.00, Associate Members shall be \$5.00, Life Members, \$100.00.

Section 2. There shall be an Initiation Fee of \$5.00 for all new members coming into the Club.

Section 3. The fiscal year of the Club shall end May 31.

Section 4. Dues shall be payable at the beginning of the fiscal year June 1st. The names of those members having paid dues by July 31st shall constitute the Club Roll to be printed in the YEAR BOOK. After due notice members whose dues are not paid by July 31st will be automatically dropped from the membership.

Section 5. Members in good standing who resign in writing may have the privilege of reinstatement on application to the Executive Board and payment of one half the Initiation Fee of \$5.00 plus the yearly dues.

Section 6. Membership cards shall be issued by the Treasurer to all members upon payment of their dues. Permanent Honorary membership cards in Club colors of blue and gold shall be issued to all Honorary Members. These cards shall serve as admission to all Club activities.

Section 7. No member shall vote at the annual meeting or on any question or matter, if she is in arrears for any dues or fees.

ARTICLE IX—Guest Privileges

Section 1. Members may bring guests on payment of fifty cents for each. No charge shall be made for out-of-town guests, members of our Junior Woman's Clubs or husbands of club members.

Section 2. Open meetings of the membership shall be held at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE X-Rules and Regulations

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law not covered by these By-Laws.

ARTICLE XI-Amendments

Section 1. These By-Laws may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Club by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted at the previous regular meeting.



- 4. A daily registration fee of \$3.00 shall be required of club members and visitors who do not attend the convention for the entire session. The daily card of admittance may be purchased at the SPECIAL OR DAILY Registration Desk in the Exhibit Area.
- 5. Each delegate or visitor not registering by mail must present her credential card in person, properly filled out and signed, at the Regular Registration Desk. She must pay the \$10.00 registration fee before receiving her badge, program, etc.
- 6. Credential cards cannot be filled in by members of the Credentials Committee. Delegates should fill in the three sections of the credential card before coming to the Regular Registration Desk.
- 7. Should a delegate arrive without her credential card, she must procure a duplicate card from the General Federation Chairman of Credentials and have it filled out and signed by her club president or state president.
- 8. Duplicate credential cards and duplicate badges will be issued only by the Federation Chairman of Credentials.
- 9. One envelope only, containing program, badge, etc., will be given to each delegate registering.
- 10. All credentials must be called for before noon, Wednesday, June 27, 1962.
- 11. Extra programs will be on sale in the Exhibit Area of the Sheraton-Park.

CONVENTION RULES

GENERAL PROCEDURE

- 1. The Convention shall be one session, recessing from meeting to meeting within the session.
- Doorkeepers and ushers will admit no one to daytime meetings, either delegates or visitors, without a badge or official card.
- 3. No notes shall be passed nor will page service be available either on the platform or on the Convention floor when a speaker is addressing the Convention.

DELEGATES

- Delegates are to sit in the section allotted to them and bearing the official banner of their state. All delegates should be in their seats before the opening of every meeting.
- 2. Delegates arriving late may take seats in the rear of the Convention Hall but should take their regular seats with their delegation at intervals as indicated in the program.
- 3. No delegate shall represent more than one organization or be entitled to more than one vote.
- When seeking recognition, delegates shall address the Chair and announce name and state.
- 5. No proxy voting shall be allowed.
- 6. Delegates wishing to obtain the floor must wear delegate's badge and sit with their delegation in the delegates (voting) section.
- During business or discussion periods each speaker shall be limited to two minutes; time may be extended only with consent of the Assembly.
- 8. Delegates shall not speak a second time upon the same question until all others who desire to speak upon that question have been heard.
- 9. A delegate who is to be absent from a Convention meeting may give her badge and credential to her alternate (or the Chairman of her delegation who shall name an alternate), who shall then take her seat in the delegate section. Only delegates shall be entitled to vote.

VISITORS

 Members of any Club or Organization holding membership in the General Federation of Women's Clubs who are not delegates may attend the convention and may take part in the discussions, but shall not make motions nor vote.

MOTIONS AND RESOLUTIONS

- 1. Motions when requested by the Chair shall be written, signed and sent to the Recording Secretary immediately upon presentation.
- 2. All resolutions shall be referred to the Committee on Resolutions and may not be debated until reported to the Assembly by the Committee on Resolutions.

In 1951 he became Assistant Director of the Mutual Security Agency, in charge of the European program. Just prior to his appointment as Assistant Secretary of State, Mr. Cleveland was Dean of the Maxwell Graduate School of Citizenship and Public Affairs of Syracuse University. He has written and lectured widely on economic development, public administration, and U. S. foreign policy.

EDWARD P. CLIFF, Chief of the Forest Service in the Department of Agriculture, is a career Government Forester, having entered the Forest Service on the Wenatchee National Forest in the State of Washington in 1931. Since 1953 Mr. Cliff has been the U. S. Department of Agriculture representative on the Board of Geographic Names. Mr. Cliff came to Washington, D. C., in 1944 after spending several years in Oregon in charge of Wildlife management and as Supervisor of the Fremont National Forest. He was later appointed Regional Forester for the Rocky Mountain Region with Headquarters in Denver and in 1952 he returned to Washington as Assistant Chief of the Forest Service and ten years later he became Chief of the Service.

THE HONORABLE DOUGLAS DILLON took the oath of office as Secretary of the Treasury at a ceremony held at the White House on January 21, 1961. Prior to entering Government service, Mr. Dillon had a long and active career in the international field as an investment banker. He served as Ambassador to France prior to his appointment by former President Eisenhower as Under Secretary of State. In the latter position he was responsible for the economic policies and programs of the Department of State and for coordinating the Mutual Security Program, both in its military and non-military aspects. While in the State Department he attended several Foreign Ministers meetings and headed a number of U. S. delegations to international conferences. The latter include the Committee of 21 which concluded the Act of Bogota in 1960 and the Ministerial Meeting in Paris which put into final form the Convention for the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development.

THE HONORABLE ANGIER BIDDLE DUKE, Chief of Protocol of the U. S., was sworn in on January 24, 1961. President Kennedy designated Mr. Duke as "Chief of Protocol for the White House with the personal rank of Ambassador." Educated at St. Paul's in New Hampof Amoassador. Eddedted at St. Factor in New Flamp-shire and Yale University, Mr. Duke entered the Foreign Service in 1949 and served with distinction in the State Department in Washington, D. C.; Secretary and Consul in the Embassy in Buenos Aires; Special Assistant to the Ambassador to Spain, and in 1952-53 as Ambassador to Ambassador to El Salvador. He was the youngest Ambassador appointed El Salvadol. He was the Joungest Annuassador appointed in the history of the United States up to that time. He served as manager of stores in East St. Louis, Oklahoma City, Louisville and Cleveland. In 1961 he was elected President of the Sears-Roebuck Foundation. Long active in civic affairs, Mr. Griffin is a member of the executive board of the Boy Scouts of America and is a vice chairman of the board of ACTION, Inc.

KATHARINE HANSEL, has had an extremely successful career as a concert artist of note, with innumerable solo appearances with symphony and chamber orchestras, as a recitalist in Town Hall and Carnegie Recital Hall among others. Her artistic versatility is shown by her many performances in oratorio, opera, musical comedy, television and radio. She is well known for presenting to the public the songs of contemporary American composers—many of them premiere performances. She is a member of Sigma Alpha Iota, national music fraternity, a faculty member of Catholic University of America, and soprano soloist of the National Presbyterian Church in Washington, D. C.

DR. FREDERICK BROWN HARRIS, Chaplain of the United States Senate, is a well-known writer and speaker. For over thirty years he was Minister of Foundry Methodist Church, Washington, D. C. Dr. Harris has received many honors, including the medal of the Order of Taiguk, presented to him by the Korean government for "tireless efforts in behalf of that Far Eastern Democracy." He writes a weekly editorial emphasizing spiritual verities, printed in many newspapers throughout the country. Two volumes of his prayers offered as Chaplain of the United States Senate have been published, as well as a book entitled "Spires of the Spirit." He has a well deserved national reputation as a great spiritual leader.

AUGUST HECKSCHER, writer, teacher, and philosopher, has been appointed by President Kennedy as Special Consultant on the Arts at the White House. In 1960 he served on the President's Commission on National Goals and contributed a chapter on "The Quality of American Culture." He is also board chairman of the International Council of the Museum of Modern Art, member of the executive committee of the Woodrow Wilson Foundation, governor of the Yale University Press and member of the program advisory committee of the National Cultural Center.

LUTHER HARTWELL HODGES, Secretary of Commerce, came to Washington after serving six years as Governor of the State of North Carolina. He served as chairman of the Southern Governors' Conference and of the Southern Regional Education Board. He was one of nine American Governors to make an extensive tour of the Soviet Union in 1959 and was in charge of a North Carolina Trade and Industry Mission to Europe later the same year. He is a former Vice President of Marshall Field and Company, Chicago. He began his career in the textile industry and was head of the Textile Division of Office of Price Administration and consultant to the Secretary of Agriculture in 1945. He spent a year in West Germany as head of the Industry Division of the Economic Cooperation Administration and was consultant to the State Department on the International Management Conference.

THE HONORABLE BOWDON HUNT is Judge of the Juvenile and Domestic Relations Court of Polk County, Florida, a position he has held since 1945. A former teacher, probation officer, and social worker, Judge Hunt has served as President of the Florida Juvenile Court Judges Association, the Florida Probation and Parole Association, Vice President of the Tampa Regional Mental Health Association, Vice President of the Florida Conference of Social Workers and innumerable other important State posts. He is the author of "These Our Children" a commentary on problems of young people.

CAPTAIN JAMES B. KING, JR., Assistant Director, United States Marine Band, started his musical training at the age of ten. While attending Curtis Institute of Music he was selected to be the clarinet soloist for the Westinghouse Radio Program. As a young musician he played under the baton of Fritz Reiner, Leopold Stowkowski, Eugene Ormandy and other prominent men of music. In 1944 he enlisted in the U. S. Army where he became solo clarinetist with the Marine Band. Since becoming Assistant Director in 1956 he has made frequent appearances at the White House where he has conducted before the President and visiting dignitaries.

PAULINE PARK WILSON KNAPP, Director of the Merrill Palmer School, Detroit, Mich., has a long record of achievement in Home Economics, Childhood Education and Family Relationships. She holds a degree of Home Economics from the University of Kentucky and she received her doctorate in psychology at Columbia University. She has served as Dean of Women and Dean of Home Economics at the University of Alabama and has been an instructor of Home Economics at the University of Georgia and Cornell University. The Merrill Palmer School is the outstanding institute of its kind in the country doing research on family life and children.

RUTH H. KODANI, member of the President's Committee for Traffic Safety, holds a magnificent record as a volunteer in civic affairs. She is a member of the Southern California Advisory Committee to the Attorney General on Constitutional Rights; Los Angeles County Commission on Human Relations; President, Los Angeles Community Concert Association; member Board of Managers of Broadcasting and Film Commission, National Council of Churches; Chairman of the Advisory Committee to National Committee of Religious Leaders for Safety, National Safety Council; "Committee of 100" United Church Women; member of Department of Christian Social Relations, Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles, and Board of Directors of Girl Scouts, YWCA and PTA.

DR. FRANK C. LAUBACH, scholar, educator, author, missionary, went among the savage Moros in the Philippines thirty-three years ago and reduced their Maranaw language to writing. There he worked out the prototype of his now world-famed "EACH-ONE-TEACH-ONE" literacy lessons. He was thus catapulted into a career as one of the most traveled men on our planet. Working with educators, government officials, private welfare agencies and missionaries, in 104 countries and in 311 different languages and dialects, he perfected simple lessons to teach adults to read easily. Over 100 million adults it is estimated have learned to read and write by Laubach's "EACH-ONE-TEACH-ONE" method.

THE HONORABLE KATIE LOUCHHEIM, Deputy Assistant Secretary of State for Public Affairs, holds the honor of being the first woman to receive such an appointment.

Active in Democratic politics for the past 18 years, Mrs. Louchheim is a former Vice Chairman of the Democratic National Committee. She served with UNRA during World War II and accepted a special assignment to interview displaced persons in the American zone of Germany. In her present official position Mrs. Louchheim serves as hostess to many distinguished women from other countries who visit the U. S.

CATHERINE MARSHALL, daughter of a Presbyterian minister, became interested in writing and speaking at an early age. In 1936 she married Peter Marshall, who in 1947 became Chaplain of the U. S. Senate. After his sudden death in 1949 Mrs. Marshall turned to writing and has authored several best-sellers, including the popular "A Man Called Peter." Her latest book, "Beyond Our Selves," reveals what she has learned about the Christian secret of a happy life. She tells of her own fight with temptation, her dramatic experiences with healing, her knowledge of love and sorrow, prayer and faith. From all this she has forged golden lessons of salvation.

EDWIN McCAMMON MARTIN, Assistant Secretary of State for Inter-American Affairs, is a native of Ohio. He is a graduate of Northwestern University where he also did graduate work in political science. He entered government service in 1935 and joined the Department of State in 1945 as Chief of the Division of Occupied Areas Economic Affairs. He was a member of the U. S. delegation at Punta del Este, Uruguay, Conference; was alternate governor with the U. S. delegation to the Inter-American Bank meeting in Brazil, and served as the Secretary of State's principal adviser at the U. S.-Japan Committee on Trade and Economic Affairs held at Hakone, Japan.

HAROLD S. MINER, President of CARE, is a prominent banker who has represented the Congregational Christian Service Committee on the CARE Board of Directors since the inception of CARE in 1945. He is Vice President of the Manufacturers Hanover Trust Company, New York City. In recognition of CARE aid to the French people, the Republic of France honored Mr. Miner by making him an officer of the Ordre de la Santa Publique. He was also decorated by Chancellor Adenauer with the Grand Service Cross of the Federal Republic of Germany.







PRAYER IN SCHOOLS

WHEREAS: In a resolution entitled "Affirmation of Faith" the General Federation of Women's Clubs in 1951 affirmed that the General Federation of Women's Clubs declared its conviction that: A devoted faith in God is the world's greatest need; God reigns and all men must take account of Him; God offers the only way for nations to achieve peace, security and happiness; and that God's law, physical and moral, cannot be denied without disaster; and

WHEREAS: Article I of the Amendments to the Constitution of the United States provides that "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof ---"; and

WHEREAS: The following prayer was composed by a New York District Board of Education under state law, to be said aloud every day at the will of the pupil: "Almighty God, we acknowledge our dependence upon Thee and we beg Thy blessings upon us, our parents, our teachers and our country"; and

WHEREAS: The Supreme Court of the United States has ruled that the action by the New York
District Board of Education was inconsistent with Article I of the Amendments to the Constitution of the United States; and

WHEREAS: The General Federation of Women's Clubs recognizes and appreciates the fact that our nation was founded upon religious faith and freedom and realizes that failure to perpetuate these ideals will destroy our survival as "One Nation under God, indivisible, with liberty and justice for all"; Therefore

RESOLVED: That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges every club woman in each state federation to work actively for a Constitutional amendment which will allow non-denominational religious observance in all American institutions receiving public or private revenues if participation therein is not made compulsory.

- g. One accredited delegate from each city, county and regional federation continuing membership under its

SECTION 3. VISITORS. Members of all clubs and organizations belonging to the General Federation who are not delegates may attend conventions and take part in the discussions, but shall not make motions nor vote.

SECTION 4. REGISTRATION. A registration fee of ten dollars (\$10.00) per capita shall be required of each voting member attending a convention. A registration fee shall be required of visitors, the amount to be determined by the Executive Committee. The registration fees shall be used to finance the convention.

SECTION 5. QUORUM. The quorum for a convention shall be two hundred voting members representing at least twenty states.

- 3. Disbursements of funds of the General Federation shall be by check which shall bear two signatures: the signatures of the Treasurer and the Assistant Treasurer; or the signatures of either the Treasurer or the Assistant Treasurer, and of the President.
- 4. All financial contributions by member clubs and Federations to projects endorsed by the General Federation of Women's Clubs shall be sent to the Treasurer of General Federation at Headquarters to be forwarded to the designated projects.

III. Reunification of Refugee Families

WHEREAS, The General Federation of Women's Clubs has repeatedly affirmed its belief that "the moral and spiritual strength of the nation radiates from the home";

That these basic principles apply to all free nations and, indeed, to civilization itself; and

WHEREAS, The President and the Congress of the United States of America, by their support of the World Refugee Year, have taken note of the fact that, throughout almost two decades, as a result of mass deportations out almost two decades, as a result of mass deportations and imposed transfers of whole populations, which are taking place to this very day, families have been tragitaking place to this very day, families have been tragically separated—children from their parents and wives from their husbands—and the civilizing influence of the home has thus been destroyed; and

WHEREAS, Although the World Refugee Year has been extended, it remains a tragic fact that, from among the hundreds of thousands of persons forcibly detained behind the Iron Curtain, only a minuscule number of families have been reunited, despite all efforts of their relatives now permanently settled and endeavoring to reestablish sound and wholesome homes in this and other free countries: therefore

BE IT RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs do petition the President and the Congress of the United States of America that they seek, through more determined efforts of their Delegation to the United Nations, and by more vigorous acts of direct diplomacy backed by emphatic legislation, to find more effective means of reuniting refugee families, and thus give to the world concrete proof of a Free Country's determination to restore liberty with justice throughout the world.

WHEREAS, National figures show that unemployment of those in the labor market from ages 16-21 years is four times greater than in other age groups, and

WHEREAS, Automation is drastically reducing job opportunities for unskilled labor, and

WHEREAS, Unemployment and lack of education have been listed by the House Subcommittee on Education investigating juvenile delinquency as large contributing factors to juvenile delinquency, and

WHEREAS, Juvenile delinquency throughout the United States has been steadily increasing for the past twelve years; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs

- 1. GIVES strong support to stay-in-school programs rutilizing if necessary skilled artisan aids to assist certified teachers in conducting courses in the manual arts.
- 2. REQUESTS Federal and state governments to promote a conservation and development program of our public domain affording work opportunities for our youth without encroaching on the adult labor market,
- 3. PETITIONS labor and management (a) to cooperate with the school in counseling youth, and (b) to expand the apprenticeship system in order to furnish in-service or on-the-job training for young people who drop out of school before finishing their high school education.
- 4. URGES employment services to provide a program of local listing of work opportunities for young people and especially during vacation periods, and
- 5. ENCOURAGES local clubs to take the lead in organizing and promoting work opportunity programs for youth in their communities and states.

RECREATION AREAS IN NATIONAL FORESTS (Convention, 1924, Reaffirmed, 1956)

WHEREAS, Funds appropriated are presently insufficient to maintain and develop recreational areas in national forests which will meet the demand for their use;

WHEREAS, The income from the national forests exceeds the cost of their administration; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges the Congress of the United States to provide for the return to the Forest Service sums sufficient for the maintenance and development of recreation areas located in the national forests.

V. Development Program for the National Forests

WHEREAS, The growth and development of the Nation has had a terrific impact on the recreation areas of the National Forests, and

WHEREAS, The number of people seeking outdoor recreation in the National Forests is expected to double by 1976 and triple by the year 2000, and

WHEREAS, A "Development Program for the National Forests" contains a proposal for providing services and facilities properly to accommodate present and expected recreation visitors to the National Forests by 1972, and

WHEREAS, The President of the United States has endorsed the "Development Program for the National Forests," and

WHEREAS, The General Federation of Women's Clubs has consistently supported the Forest Service in its effort to serve the people in outdoor recreational facilities; therefore

RESOLVED, That the General Federation of Women's Clubs urges the Congress of the United States to support this program, so that public recreation needs in the National Forests will be provided, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, That copies of this resolution be sent to the President of the United States and to the appropriate Committee of the Senate and the House of Representatives.

Shriver Says:

Peace Corps Not A Male Stronghold

By Elizabeth Ford

THE PEACE CORPS has "an opportunity unrivaled in history"—the opportunity to place American teachers in the schools of developing countries across the world, R. Sargent Shriver, Peace Corps Director, said last

He pointed out that American teachers "are being asked to come. We're not forcing them on these for-eign governments," he said. "We're being invited." Shriver moved in on the

annual convention of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, with everything but a brass band, to plead for women recruits to the Corps and to ask the support of the GFWC to help spear-head an enlistment cam-

The Corps, he told the ladies, means "the end to a modern complaint . .. It's

a man's world."
One-third of the Corps volunteers are women, he said. And none who enlist lose their "identity." "We're not putting you into a man's uniform," Shriver made clear. The Corps, he told them, needs them for women's skills — as teachers, nurses and home economists.

nurses and home economists.

By the end of the year,
Shriver stated, the Corps
will have 5000 men and
women volunteers abroad.
"It's not a question now,"
he said, "of what we'll be
able to do . . . but what we
are actually doing."

PEACE CORPS women got full credit for helping to bomb out some of the concerning this service overseas.

Shriver lined up the myths and shot them down:

Illiteracy Concerns Mexico's 1st Lady

MEXICO CITY (AP) - Mexico's first lady, hostess to Mrs. Jacqueline Kennedy this weekend, has dedicated much of her life to helping solve Mexico's educational problems and toward giving underprivileged children a

chance to improve their lot.

Mrs. Eva Samano De Lopez

Mateos is a graduate teacher of
the Normal School of Toluca.

the Normal School of Toluca. She has worked in several humble schools, at times in the slums of the Mexican capital.

While her husband was minister of Labor, Mrs. Lopez Mateos kept her job teaching 50 fifth-graders at the Benito Juarez Primary School. Only after suffering a severe ailment did she retire from teaching.

She continues to keep an eye on everything concerning education, which she feels is a main need in a country where illiteracy still ranks high.

She does not like the title first lady, incidentally, explaining:
"Every mother is a first lady by her own right."
Her activities include the inauguration of new school buildings and child welfare centers, even in remote areas of Mexico.
Tears come to her eyes whenever she has a chance to speak to old teachers, who consider Mrs. Lopez Mateos their equal talking with her freely on school matters, comparing experiences. Many of the improvements that teachers and pupils have shared during the last three years in Mexico can be traced to her personal interest.

Millions of pesos have been spent—both from official and private sources—in the operation of the National Institute of Children's Welfare, where free breakfasts are prepared for poor children at public schools.

Last year 300,000 such break-

fasts were distributed daily, and plans call for a substantial in-

crease this year.
She likes to guide visitors through the institute, and Mrs.
Kennedy will visit it.

Mrs. Lopez Mateos travels widely through the country, checking on the needs of children and aged alike. Where no

roads are available, she rides on Jeeps or hoseback.

When a disastrous storm hit the Pacific port of Manzanillo. she was there within a few

hours, personally helping the people of the ravaged area.

Mrs. Lopez Mateos was born of a well-to-do family of British descent in San Nicolas Del Oro, a small village in the mountain-

Ask Amendment To Constitution

The General Federation of Women's Clubs passed this morning an emergency resolution calling for a constitutional amendment to counter Monday's Supreme Court ruling on official prayers in public schools.

The resolution, written by the five-member Resolutions Committee of the federation, "urges every club woman in each state federation to work actively for a Constitutional amendment which will allow non-denominational religious observance in all American institutions receiving public or private revenues if participation therein is not made compulsory."

In presenting the resolution to delegates at the Federation's 71st annual convention in the Sheraton Park Hotel, Mrs. Gerald E. Northrop, chairman of the Resolutions. tions Committee said, "we feel the Supreme Court could not have made any other de-cision. The Court was deciding on the legality of the New York District School Board's action in composing a prayer for recitation in the schools."

The purpose of the resolution, she explained, was to make the recitation of such a prayer legally possible.

The motion was carried with only a few dissenting votes. Its passage was preceded by about 15 minutes of sometimes impassioned discussion.

Mrs. E. Lee Ozbirn, fed-Mrs. E. Lee Ozoirn, led-eration president, said after the session she was "thor-oughly in accord with the resolution" and that she felt "the delegates behaved in a very dignified way this morning."

The preliminary clauses of the resolution read:

"Whereas, in a resolution entitled 'Affirmation of Faith' the General Federa-tion of Women's Clubs in 1951 affirmed that the Gen-eral Federation of Women's Club declared its conviction that: A devoted faith in God is the world's greatest need; God reigns and all men must take account of Him; God offers the only way for nations to achieve peace, security and happiness, and that God's law, physical and moral, cannot be denied without disaster and

"Whereas, Article I of the
Amendments to the Constitution of the United States provides that 'Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof . . . '; and

Economic Literacy Termed U.S. Need

By FRANCES LEWINE WASHINGTON (AP) — Secre-tary of Commerce Luther Hodges Wednesday told a cross-section of American women—who are supposed to control the nation's purse strings—that the United States has too many "economic illiterates."

Hodges is campaigning to increase public knowledge about such things as "supply and demand," and "balance of payments."

"Economics play a determining role in human affairs that ranges from the global struggle with communism to the price of a loaf of bread at the corner grocery store," he said.

Addressing a luncheon meeting of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, Hodges asked the women to get to work on his pet project—raising the level of economic literacy.

He cited statistics to show that little attention is given to economics in high schools and colleges.

He declared, "Only about 30 per cent of Americans who own stock—these are people who have a real financial interest in

have a real financial interest in how our economy works—can give a correct or even partially correct defination of capitalism. Imagine what the figure must be for all the adult population."

Pointing out that "we are battling communism overseas on an economic front," Hodges asked how Americans can explain to uncommitted nations "the advantages of capitalism if we kennedy? that som without miscalcula it."

"Why not the general federation take the lead?" she asked.
Mrs. Ozbirn of Oklahoma City is winding up her two-year term as head of the general federation which represents some 5½ million clubwomen in the United States.

million clubwomen in the United States.

She has stressed the need to change the image of the bridge-playing clubwomen and get them working as "responsible citizens" on community and international projects and problems.

She left the education suggestion to her successor, which probably will be Mrs. Dexter Otis Arnold of Concord, N.H. Mrs. Arnold, a former teacher, is first vice president and is running unopposed for president in Thursday's federation elections.

Though Mrs. Ozbirn didn't spell out her ideas, she told a reporter she thinks what's needed is to get "the clean, cold facts about the problem to the people" to overcome confusion, frustration and biased information.

"Women can do more about education than anyone else," she declared.

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As the weeklong convention went into its second day, the delegates heard Catherine Marshall, author and widow of Senate chaplain, the Rev. Peter Marshall, decry "the great American heresy"—the desire not to offend anyone.

Such attitudes are not good enough any more, she said. Our world is "being steadily backed into a corner."

"The sober fact is that not since the spread of Christianity in the first century, has any ideology spread as rapidly as communism," she said in a speech prepared for the 71st annual convention. "In 45 years it has taken over control of one-one-fourth of its territory."

Mrs. Marshall, whose husband was chaplain of the Senate between 1947 and 1949, has been writing and speaking about the lessons of salvation she learned after her husband's death in 1949. 





No Crime in Soviet Union, **Unreliable Source Reports**

Everything in Russia is "tremendous."

Everything in Russia is "tremendous."

That was the word used by John H. Wessels Jr., executive assistant to the governor of Virginia, in charge of public relations, as he addressed the final board meeting of the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs, Wednesday at Hotel Roanoke.

In his talk, "A Virginian Looks at Russia,"

Mr. Wessells referred to "tremendous" housing shortages, lack of food, and absence of privacy.

Mr. Wessells and 34 other Virginians formed an agricultural leaders delegation that towed Russells.

an agricultural leaders delegation that toured Rus-

sia this spring.

Wednesday he presented a series of color slides to the VFWC with the warning that "anyone who goes to Russia is in danger of becoming an expert when he returns," and that he hoped his statements would be accepted as his

According to Mr. Wessells, the Soviet pic-According to Mr. Wessells, the Soviet picture is one of extremes, Slides showing the "Soviet Gothic" architecture of impressive state buildings such as Moscow University and the theater of the Bolshoi Ballet contrasted sharply with a look at 7-year-old apartment houses that had wire nets strung on the outside to keep falling tile from hitting passersby.

"The inside of the Kremlin is many things," said Mr. Wessells, "depending on which way you point your camera. The people were better dressed than we thought they'd be. Occasionally we'd see a bouffant hair-do, a tight skirt, or a man with

a bouffant hair-do, a tight skirt, or a man with a tie.

"TV sets are cheap—so people can see Khrushchev every day."

The American Embassy is guarded by Russian police, a policy contrary to that in other countries. But none of the police carry guns or clubs, and military troops are not allowed in town.

"We were told—by a completely unreliable source—," he said, "that there is no crime in the Soviet Union."

Mr. Wessells said that the Russian guide explained that she had to choose between Church

and State in accepting her position. "If you go to church, you don't get anywhere in the State," said the VFWC speaker.

He explained that membership in the Communist Party is made attractive and hard to obtain, and that it requires hard work and continual proof of allegiance from grade-school age through the late twenties before one is accepted into the fold.

Mr. Wessells said further that the biggest selling commodity in Russia is Communism, but that the free-world influence is slowly slipping in. "The demand for consumer goods is unsatiable," he said, showing a slide of a new motorcycle parked beside a thatched roof hut. "No one can imagine the deprivations that this family endured to own this one status symbol, a motorcycle."

The people, he says, are wonderful. Hungry for information, they love to talk to American tourists, and ask hundreds of questions when given

tourists, and ask hundreds of questions when given the chance.

"One of the most fascinating experiences we had," said Mr. Wessells, "was meeting Russian girls who had been studying English for years. From them we learned the following things: Russians know that they are not being told the whole story. They ask questions that Soviet brochures answer time and time again—to find out the answers for themselves.

"You can't talk to a Russian more than five minutes without his saying, 'why do you Americans want war?'"

Expressing a firm belief in the spirit of the general Russian public, Mr. Wessells said, "If only the people of our countries could get together, we could solve any problem."

As it stands now, he pointed out, we are being outsold every day of the week by Communists. "They're not selling their goods," he said. "They're selling their system. And the people believe in it—so far."



The plan, never used here before, places UF agencies in charge of all residential areas and the small businesses in downtown Roanoke, Mrs. Capps said, Each agency will head the drive in a specific area.

The residential drive will be under the overall direction of the Roanoke County Red Cross chapter, a partner in the fund raising with the UF.

Mrs. Capps said that although the campaign date has not been set, group solicitation probably will begin about Oct. 1, with the residential phase coming up later in the month.

NORFOLK (AP) — Fort Hill Junior Woman's Club of Lynchburg and Vienna Woman's Club of Fairfax County shared national honors at the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs convention here Tuesday.

The awards were given at the Virginia Federation's annual Alice Kyle banquet at the Golden Triangle, where some 1,300 convention delegates will meet through Thursday morning.

Earlier Tuesday a rules committee tackled one of the thorniest intramural issues of the VFWC—at what age should a woman become a member of a senior club rather than a junior club?

Some 83 junior clubs, heavy majority, had already voted to move the age limit from 55 to 40; they complained they weren't ready for senior status.

But because of a technicality the issue was shelved until another session. Until then, a lady is still a senior at 35.

Reports at the opening session Thesday afternoon, presided over by Mrs. Giles Engledove, president of the federation, showed that the federation now includes 423 clubs with 23,700 members.

Projects of most of the 423 clubs during the past year showed a new interest in conservation, with emphasis on water supply and air pollution. Also noted by state officers was a growing enthusiasm for art, reflected in hundreds of art shows and competitive convention solved.



BRIEF HISTORY OF ACTIVITIES Woman's Club of Roanoke, Club Year 1962-1963

The Club Year 1962-1963, under the able leadership of our new President, Mrs. Roy V. Creasy, has been a busy, happy, and rewarding year with all Departments doing outstanding work. Each member of the Club has cooperated in carrying out the theme of the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs, "Federation Progress Through Individual Participation."

Thirty-one new members have been added to the Club roll, and members of our Club gave more than five thousand hours of volunteer service to welfare, civic, cultural, and health organizations.

Our Club, along with the Junior Woman's Club, was hostess for the Blue Ridge District meeting in October.

The Club again sponsored the Annual Dinner Dance at the Roanoke Country Club, and the Floyd Ward Revue.

A Scholarship award in the amount of \$200.00 was approved for financial assistance to a deserving student entering Nurses Training School. First Aid Stations were set up and equipped at the Towers, Crossroads, and Roanoke-Salem Plaza Shopping Centers. The Public Affairs Department sponsored a benefit bridge luncheon in April, raising \$132.50 to apply on purchase of a piano for Mountain View. Members of our Club appeared several times on "Club Quiz" T.V. program, and also on the "T.V. Bridge Party" program with the winnings from these activities being added to our Club Treasury for philanthropic work.

Financial assistance was given to several cancer patients from the Sippie Hurt Memorial Cancer Fund.

Several parties, or programs, were given for the patients at the V.A. Hospital.

The Friday Bridge games have been well attended and will be continued the coming year.

The Club news bulletin has grown in popularity and has proven to be of great help in keeping our members informed of all activities.

In addition to the regular contributions by the Club to various organizations, and to the projects of the Virginia Federation of Women's Clubs, as set forth in the Budget printed in the Year Book, special donations were made to:

The Roanoke Rehabilitation Center for furnishing one room, \$833.95.

J. L. C. Medley Boys Camp to receive proceeds from Floyd Ward Revue. And other smaller contributions made to Action on Arthritis, Science Fair Seminar, etc.

BY-LAWS

Revised May, 1961

ARTICLE I-Membership

Section 1. The membership shall consist of four classes: Active, Associate, Honorary and Life.

SECTION 2. Only women shall be eligible for election as Active members.

SECTION 3. Men or women who are unable to attend because of business or professional activities who are in sympathy with and desire to encourage the aims of the club, shall be eligible for election as Associate members.

Section 4. Honorary members shall be eligible to vote and hold office, but shall be exempt from payment of dues. Members of the Past Presidents Group shall automatically become Honorary Members of the Club.

Section 5. Applicants for membership shall be approved by the Board of Directors and elected by the membership. Each applicant shall be sponsored by two club members.

ARTICLE II—Officers and Elections

Section 1. The Officers shall be President, First Vice President, Second Vice President, Third Vice President, Recording Secretary and Treasurer, who shall be elected for a term of one year. The outgoing President shall serve as Director-at-Large during the term of office of her successor.

SECTION 2. At the regular meeting in February of each year the Club shall nominate from the floor and elect a nominating committee of five members who shall report at the next regular meeting nominations for officers. Nominations may also be made from the floor. No member may be nominated whose consent to serve, if elected, has not been secured.

SECTION 3. The vote shall be by ballot for any office where there is more than one nominee, otherwise elected by acclamation.

SECTION 4. The officers shall be elected in March and shall take office at the close of the meeting in May.

SECTION 5. No member shall be eligible for the same office or chairmanship for more than two consecutive years except the treasurer and parliamentarian.

SECTION 6. If a vacancy occurs in the office of President, the First Vice President shall succeed to that office for the unexpired term. All other vacancies in elective offices shall be filled by the Board of Directors.

Section 7. As soon as practicable after annual election of officers, the President-Elect shall call together the newly elected officers for the purpose of completing the Board of Directors. At this meeting the heads of departments, standing committee chairmen and the historian shall be elected, whose terms of office shall run until the close of the annual meeting in May. The President shall have the privilege of choosing the corresponding secretary and parliamentarian.

SECTION 8. The Junior Woman's Clubs may each select a Contact Chairman from the membership of the Woman's Club, with the approval of the Board. These Contact Chairmen shall become members of the Board of Directors. The Presidents of the Junior Clubs and the club members on the State Executive Committee, shall be conference members of the Board of Directors.

ARTICLE III - Duties of Officers

SECTION 1. It shall be the duty of the President to preside at all meetings and to perform all duties pertaining to that office. She shall be Chairman of the Board of Directors and ex-officio member of all committees except

the nominating committee.

SECTION 2. In the absence of the President, the First Vice President shall perform all duties pertaining to the office.

SECTION 3. In the temporary absence of the President, the First, the Second or the Third Vice President, in order of their rank, shall preside over the meeting.

Section 4. The Treasurer shall receive all money of the Club, collect all dues, keep an accurate account of all receipts and disbursements and shall pay out all funds by order of the Board of Directors. A yearly report shall be submitted to the Board of Directors at the June meeting. All funds raised by any department or committee in the name of the Club shall be deposited with the club treasurer at or before each monthly Board meeting. The audited yearly report shall be printed in the Year Book.

SECTION 5. The Recording Secretary shall record and keep on permanent file the minutes of all regular and called meetings of the Board and of the membership. She shall send to the President a copy of the minutes as soon as possible after the meetings.

Section 6. The Corresponding Secretary shall attend to all correspondence of the Club. She shall notify members of their election and shall furnish the President with copies of all letters written.

SECTION 7. The Historian shall prepare the official history of the Club during her term of office.

Section 8. The Past Presidents of the Woman's Club shall constitute an advisory group to the Executive Board. The duties of such Advisory Group shall be to consider and advise on such subjects as shall be referred to it by the President or by the Executive Board.

ARTICLE IV-Management of the Club

SECTION 1. The government and management of the Club shall be vested in the Board of Directors, which shall consist of the elected officers, the heads of departments and standing committees herein provided for, the Junior Contact Chairmen, Corresponding Secretary, Parliamentarian, Historian and the retiring President.

SECTION 2. Any member of the Board absent from three consecutive regular meetings without sufficient reason shall forfeit her place as a member of the Board.

Article V—Departments and Committees

SECTION 1. The activities of the Club may be vested in Departments which conform to those of the State and General Federations as nearly as possible.

SECTION 2. The First Vice President shall serve as Dean of Departments. The Second Vice President shall serve as Chairman of Hospitality. The Third Vice President shall serve as Membership Chairman.

Section 3. Standing Committees shall be Ways and Means, Cancer Control, Health, Program, Hospitality, Membership, Finance, Year Book and Revision.

Section 4. The Program Committee, whose duties shall be to arrange Club Membership programs from September through May, shall consist of at least three members. The proposed programs, insofar as possible, shall be submitted to the Board of Directors for approval.

ARTICLE VI-Meetings of the Club

SECTION 1. The annual meeting of the Club shall be held on the third Friday in May, time and place to be announced.

Section 2. The regular monthly meetings of the Club shall be held on the third Friday of each month except June, July and August at 1:30 P.M., preceded by a

social hour, unless changed by a two-thirds vote of the Board members, due notice of time and place to be given to the membership.

SECTION 3. Special Meetings may be called at any time by the Board of Directors, provided notice be given the membership three days prior to the meeting. No written notice shall be required for the annual or regular meeting.

Section 4. Twenty-one active members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

Article VII—Meetings of the Board of Directors

Section 1. Regular monthly meetings of the Board of Directors shall be held at 10:00 A.M. on the Thursday Preceding the third Friday of each month except July and August unless changed by a two-thirds vote of the Board members.

Section 2. Special meetings may be called by the President or by five members of the Board of Directors, provided each member shall be notified two days in

 ${\tt SECTION}$ 3. Seven members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII—Dues

Section 1. (a) Annual dues of Active Members shall be \$7.00, Associate Members shall be \$5.00, Life Members, \$100.00.

(b) Dues of new members coming into the club after January meeting will be one-half the annual dues for active members, plus the initiation fee.

Section 2. There shall be an Initiation Fee of \$5.00 for all new members coming into the Club.

SECTION 3. The fiscal year of the Club shall end May 31.

SECTION 4. Dues shall be payable at the beginning of the fiscal year June 1st. The names of those members having paid dues by July 31st shall constitute the Club Roll to be printed in the YEAR BOOK. After due notice members whose dues are not paid by July 31st will be automatically dropped from the membership.

SECTION 5. Members in good standing who resign in writing may have the privilege of reinstatement on application to the Executive Board and payment of one half the Initiation Fee of \$5.00 plus the yearly dues.

SECTION 6. Membership cards shall be issued by the Treasurer to all members upon payment of their dues. Permanent Honorary membership eards in Club colors of blue and gold shall be issued to all Honorary Members. These eards shall serve as admission to all Club activities.

SECTION 7. No member shall vote at the annual meeting or on any question or matter, if she is in arrears for any dues or fees.

ARTICLE IX—Guest Privileges

Section 1. Members may bring guests on payment of fifty cents for each. No charge shall be made for out-of-town guests, members of our Junior Woman's Clubs or husbands of club members.

Section 2. Open meetings of the membership shall be held at the discretion of the Board of Directors.

Section 1. Robert's Rules of Order Revised shall be authority in all questions of Parliamentary Law not covered by these By-Laws.

ARTICLE XI-Amendments

Section 1. These By Laws may be amended at the Annual Meeting of the Club by a two-thirds vote of the members present and voting, provided the proposed amendment has been submitted at the previous regular meeting.

- 3. At a meeting in February, 1947, the money that the Club had at that time was voted to be held in reserve for a building fund or club house.

- 5. The files of the club shall be in the custody of the President. A list of all important documents shall be carried in the files.
- 6. Junior Club members who transfer into the club in the same year shall be received without the customary initiation fee.

- 7. Expenses incurred by members representing the club at authorized functions shall be reimbursed by the club upon approval by the Board.
- 8. The President, Corresponding Secretary and the Courtesy Chairman shall constitute a committee to extend courtesy to members and families in case of illness or death. Also serve in courtesy to state visitors. Please notify the President of any illness or sorrow.



Club Cites Frances Long

Many roads and many roles brought Frances Holland Long to what she describes as "one of the most wonderful things ever to happen to me."

As a student nurse, graduating from Lewis-Gale Hospital, she learned the beauty and sacrifice of service and those traits followed her through her later days as wife and mother, as a widow and finally, since 1960, as a business executive and community leader.

Last night at Hotel Roa-noke she became the eleventh Roanoker to claim the Busi-ness & Professional Women's Club "Woman of the Year" award and the very title has the ring of enthusiasm, lead-ership and sincerity that this native of Rocky Mount has long displayed.

Her citation reads well, re-calling "her excellent perform-ance of duties, her thoughtful-

ness, her usefulness, her willingness to do more than is expected and the joy she brings to the doing of these jobs."

"I feel very insecure in accepting this high honor," Mrs. Long said today. "I feel so many others deserve it more. Hundreds did this for me as I've never accepted anything on my own; I've always had the help of my family and friends."

Neither the coveted title nor the glowing presentation reveal, however, the brightest facet of this active woman's life; her courage.

Few could survive as well as she the tragedy which struck March 25, 1959, when her husband, James W. Long, a prominent businessman, civic leader and president of the Virginia Jaycees, was killed in an autotrain collision.

Her particular sort of bravery carried her and two sons, Jimmy and Sammy, through day after day of a good life half alone. She entered school affairs and parent-teacher work and later turned to community interests as president of the Junior Woman's Club of Roanoke.

In 1951 that organization gave her her first city-wide award, naming her "Outstanding Junior of the Year," and since then the term has matched her growth to the top of

the city's select group of leaders.

She has been president of the Woman's Club of Roanoke and of the city-county chapter of the Virginia Division, American Cancer Society. She has served on the boards of many local organizations including the Children's Home Society, the Arth-

ritis and Rheumatism Associa-tion and the Central Council years.



"It's a favorite of mine. Isaiah lived in troubled times and he called on the laws of God that would make them a stronger

people.
"We live in troubled times too. If we can become stronger people, I think we have little to fear from without. Truly, I think that and I believe that." Mrs. Riggins selected con-

servation of natural and human resources, she said, because "it is so timely and so necessary."
"We've always had such

abundance in this land that it's. hard for us to believe that there could ever be a shortage of water or fresh air."

The economy of this country and life itself, Mrs. Riggins asserted, depend on conserva-

In the area of human con-servation, Mrs. Riggins said, "It is the birthright of every child in the society to attain his po-tential. The handicapped must be made self-sufficient to help

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



in establishing a Homemaker Service in Roanoke.
Homemaker Service is a community service sponsored
by a public or voluntary health or welfare agency that employs
personnel to furnish home help services to families with children;
to convalescent, aged, acutely or chronically ill, and disabled persons
or to all of these. Its primary function is the maintenance of household routine and the preservation or creation of wholesome family living in times of stress.


THE PRIMARY GOALS OF HOMEMAKER SERVICE ARE:


- 1. To hold the family intact while the natural homemaker is incapacitated.
- 2. To enable the ill or disabled individual to remain in his own home whenever possible.
- 3. To lessen the physical, mental, emotional and economic burden of chronic illness.
- 4. To hasten convalescence and reduce the length of stay in an institution by permitting the patient to remain at home. It will help, too, to offset the cost of institutional care.
- 5. To enable a person to remain at work instead of having to leave to care for a child, elderly parent or ill relative.
- 6. To help assess family strength and weaknesses so that a means may be developed to promote its best interests.
- 7. To help teach the family more efficient methods of management and self care.

We have formed a steering committee to advise and guide us in every step. In August, the committee formulated a survey to be taken in the Roanoke area to determine the extent of the need of such a service.

The survey proved that there is an overwhelming demand for a Homemaker Service in Roanoke. The results of this survey were taken to the Roanoke Valley Council of Community Services and their help was asked to further study of the service.

Community Services and their help was asked to further study of the service. At present, a study is under way to determine how a Homemaker Service can be set up to most effectively serve our community. Once the study is completed, The Junior Woman's Club of Roanoke will act on the recommendations and take the definite steps necessary to establish and maintain this service. The proceeds from the '64 Folies will be used in establishing this service.






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
