

## Stun devices protect against prison violence

I MUST respond to your May 23 editorial "Torture has no place in Virginia prisons." Whoever wrote it is seriously misinformed on the use of electric stun devices in our prisons.

Contrary to the many melodramas folks watch at the movies and on the tube, corrections officers — *not guards*, (when will journalists get that straight?) — aren't sadistic beasts schooled in the methods of the Spanish Inquisition and the Marquis de Sade. For the most part, corrections officers are regular people who go to work, get the job done, return home to their families, and try to end the day with a healthy mind and an undamaged body.

Electric stun devices are used to prevent undue violence to the staff and inmates alike. Officers are educated and trained in using these nonlethal instruments. Their actual use is always approved by supervisory staff, and use is videotaped and investigated after

each incident. To imply that they could be used as "routine punishment" and for the "sadistic hell of it" is ludicrous.

I am a corrections officer (not a guard). And while I don't like to wring my hands and moan, yes, it can be a dangerous job. I've been attacked and choked by a violent inmate for no reason, other than violence's sake, and left gasping for air.

The next day, I am interviewed by social services workers. They seem very concerned over the inmate's welfare. Was he provoked or abused in any way? Nary a bit of concern is shown over my well-being.

What is wrong with this picture? Is it any wonder our children cannot play on playgrounds alone without fear when educated professionals are so dead set on playing "I'm OK, you're OK" with dangerous offenders?

If left up to me, it would be acceptable to allow reporters and editorial writers into the prison workplace. In fact, they could try working a violent lock-up ward for awhile, and let us "guards" step aside for a shift. Five will get you ten that they would beg for some form of "torture device" to pull their fat out of the fire before the day is out.

## *Former student's video contrasts the old Breckinridge with the new*

**J**ust days before most of Roanoke's Breckinridge Middle School was gutted in 1996 in preparation for a \$6 million renovation, Amy Cooper strolled through the halls, cafeteria, library and gymnasium, videotaping the inside and outside of the school for a complete visual record.

The school reopened last fall. In January, Cooper returned to film the newly renovated school.

Now, for \$27, students and alumni can see the school as it was and as it appears now.

Cooper said she believes there's plenty of character in both the old Breckinridge and the new.

"I did the video for sentimental reasons," she said. "There are a lot of good memories there."

A Breckinridge student from 1982-85 when it was a junior high school for grades seven through nine, Cooper was president of her ninth-grade class and was a majorette, cheerleader, library worker and member of various clubs.

She still has all her yearbooks, academic certificates, graduation program and other memorabilia from her years at the school.

The video idea came from Cooper's boyfriend, Steve Brusati, who helped her with the project.

"He thought that if I had all these good memories, then other people probably did, too," Cooper said.

Now a junior at Hollins University working on her bachelor's degree in education, Cooper's fond memories

have inspired her to become an elementary or middle school teacher. While working on her degree, she also participates in puppet shows and educational programs at the Mill Mountain Zoo and helps with youth activities at Rainbow Forest Baptist Church.

"I've always liked working with children and youth," Cooper said. "I want to make a difference in their lives."

Breckinridge, at 3901 Williamson Road N.W., was built in 1932 and was William Fleming High School until the 1960s. An open-air atrium with skylights is one highlight of the updated architectural design.

A Roanoke native, Cooper is also working on another video project, featuring the ceremony of her 1988 William Fleming High graduation.

"I'm in the process of getting that ready now," she said. It will sell for \$20.

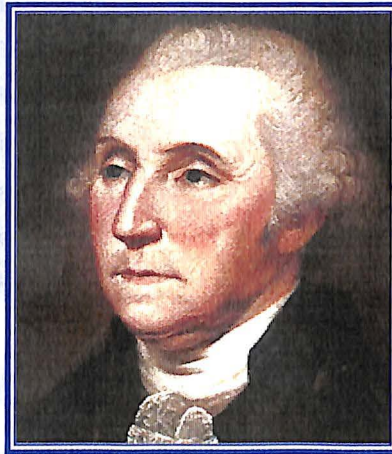
