BY LAWS

OF THE

MARGARET LYNN LEWIS CHAPTER NATIONAL SOCIETY, DAUGHTERS OF

THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

(Revised - 1979)

ARTICLE I - Name

The name of this organization shall be the Margaret Lynn Lewis Chapter of the National Society, Daughters of the American Revolution.

ARTICLE II - Objects

The objects of this Society shall be:

1. To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of the . Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2. To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people: "To promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3. To cherish, maintain, and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country, and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III - Eligibility

Any woman is eligible for membership in the Chapter who is not less than eighteen years of age. and who is descended from a man or woman who. with unfailing loyalty to the cause of American Independence, served as a sailor, or as a soldier, or civil officers in one of the several Colonies or States, or in the United Colonies or States, or as a recognized patriot, or rendered material aid thereto; provided the Applicant is acceptable to the Chapter and to the National Society.

ARTICLE IV - Membership

Section 1. An applicant for membership must be endorsed by two members to whom the applicant is personally known. The name of the applicant, with the signatures of her endorsers, shall be proposed in writing at a meeting of the Executive Committee (officers). Having been approved by the Executive Committee, the name shall be presented to the Chapter for consideration at the next meeting, and it shall be voted on at the following Chapter meeting. The vote shall be by ballot and the applicant shall be elected unless more than two negative votes are cast. This reourement applies to both Executive Committee and Chapter.

Section 2. The Chapter Registrar shall send to the applicant upon election a letter of invitation and application blanks to be filled out as designated. The applicant shall return the completed blanks properly endorsed to the Chanter Registrar who shall see that they are in the form required by the National Society. The application blanks thus approved, together with the initiation fee and the annual National dues shall be forwarded by the Chapter Treasurer to the Treasurer General. In case an applicant is not accepted by the National Society, all of the money paid by the applicant shall be returned, to the applicant except the National application fee.

Section 3. Prospective members applying to this Chapter for membership are required to file application papers with the Chapter Registrar within six months from the time accepted unless extended to one year by the Board. Section 4. A member desiring to unite with the Chapter by transfer, either from another Chapter or from membership at large, shall be proposed and elected by the Chapter in the same manner as a new member.

Section 5. Any member desiring to resign from the Chapter shall present her resignation in writing to the Corresponding Secretary, who after consultation with the Chapter Regent and the Chapter Treasurer, shall immediately report the resignation to the Treasurer General. The resignation of a member in arrears for dues shall not be accepted. A resigned member to be reinstated shall be voted upon as a new member.

Section 6. No one person shall propose or second more than one name during the year, unless a member wishes to yield her privilege.

Section 7. Upon recommendation of two members, the Chapter may by a majority vote by ballot elect as Associate Members, members of the National Society in good standing who reside a part of the time in the vicinity. Associate Members shall have the privilege of attending all meetings and of speaking, but they shall not hold office, make motions, vote or represent the Chapter as a delegate or alternate.

ARTICLE V - Officers

Section 1. The officers of this Chapter shall be the Regent, First and Second Vice Regents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar. Historian, Librarian, Chaplain and one Member-at-Large.

Section 2. At the regular meeting in December, a Nominating Committee of three members shall be appointed by the Regent. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate a candidate for each office to be filled at the March meeting. Additional nominations may be made from the floor, provided the consent of the nominee shall first have been obtained. No member shall be eligible to hold office who has not been a member of the Chapter for one year. The new officers shall take office at the annual meeting.

Section 3. Election shall be by ballot and majority vote shall elect. When there is but one candidate for an office, the election may proceed by acclamation. Absentee voting or proxy voting is not allowed.

All Officers shall hold office for two years or until their successors are elected. A member who has served more than half a term in any office shall be considered to have served a term.

Section 4. Vacancies in office shall be filled by the Executive Board until the next annual meeting, when the Chapter shall fill the vacancy for the unexpired term.

ARTICLE VI - Duties of Officers

Section 1. The Regent shall preside at all meetings of the Chapter and of the Executive Committee. She shall be the chief executive officer for the Chapter. She shall appoint all committees not otherwise provided for, and shall be ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee. At the close of her administration she shall send to the State Regent, State Officers. State Chairmen, and the Treasurer General a complete list of the new Chapter Officers and the incoming Regent shall send to the State Chairmen the names of the Chapter committee chairmen, when appointed.

Section 2. The Vice Regents in order shall, in the absence of the Regent, perform the duties pertaining to the office. The First Vice Regent shall be chairman of the Hostess Committee, and the Second Vice Regent shall serve as Program Chairman and shall also prepare the year book. Section 3. The dues of all members accepted by the National Society after May 1 of each year shall be applied to the next succeeding year.

Section 4. On February first the Treasurer shall notify all members in arrears for dues. In March and in May she shall forward to all delinquents the notices of the National Society sent for all members in arrears for dues. On June first, the names of all members whose dues are not paid shall be automatically dropped from membership.

Section 5. The annual national dues of each member shall be sent by the Chapter Treasurer to the Treasurer General in time to be received in Washington i before December first.

before the first of December the annual dues of each member shall be sent to the State Treasurer.

Section 6. The fees for readmission of resigned members and of members dropped for non-payment of dues shall be prescribed by the By-Laws of the National Society.

Section 7. Associate members shall pay no initiation fee and no State or National dues except through the Chapter in which they hold membershin in the National Society. The annual dues of Associate Members shall be five (\$5.00) dollars payable on or before the first autumn meeting.

ARTICLE IX - Executive Committee

Section 1. The officers of the Chapter shall constitute the Executive Committee, Committee Chairmen and the Executive Committee (officers) shall constitute the Executive Board.

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Chapter between meetings. It is subject to the orders of the Chapter and none of its acts shall conflict with action taken by the Chapter. Section 3. The Recording Secretary shall keep a record of the proceedings of the meetings of the Chapter and of the Executive Board. She shall notify officers of their election and committees of their appointment. She shall keep a roll of the members of the Chapter.

Section 4. The Corresponding Secretary shall send out notices of meetings when necessary and shall conduct such other correspondence as may be requested by the Regent, the Chapter, or the Executive Board.

Section 5. The Treasurer shall receive all funds of the Chapter and shall deposit them in such bank or banks as may be designated by the Chapter. She shall disburse these funds as directed by the Chapter, provided that no bill shall be paid without the authorization of the Regent. She shall make monthly statements of all receipts and disbursements, and shall send dues notices to members previous to the October meeting. Before each annual meeting her account shall be audited by the Finance Committee and one other member appointed by the Regent.

Section 6. The Registrar shall furnish a letter of invitation and application papers to candidates, and shall see that these papers are in proper form before turning them over to the Treasurer for mailing. She shall keep a file of members of the Chapter, including name, address, name and rank of ancestor, national number, date of admission to National Society, date of transfer, resignation, reinstatement, marriage and death. She shall notify the Regent, the Recording Secretary. the Corresponding Secretary and the Treasurer. of the election of new members by the National Society. She shall be the custodian of duplicate application papers of members.

Section 7. The Historian shall direct such historical work as may be requested by the Chapter in accordance with the historical program of the National Society. She shall be custodian of historical and biographical papers of which the Chapter may become possessed. She shall continue the Chapter's scrap book and act as its custodian during her term of office.

Section 8. The Librarian shall cooperate with the State Librarian in securing books for the D.A.R. Library, and shall procure books of historical interest for the local library.

Section 9. The Chaplain shall conduct such religious services as occasion may require. She shall communicate, whenever possible, with members who are ill or in distress. Upon death of a chapter member the Chaplain shall notify the State Chaplain.

ARTICLE VII - Meetings

Section 1. Unless otherwise ordered by the Chapter Regent or by the Executive Committee, regular meetings shall be held on the first Friday of each month from October to May, inclusive.

Section 2. The last regular meeting of the year shall be known as the annual meeting, and shall be for the purpose of receiving reports of officers and committees and for any other business that may arise.

Section 3. Special meetings may be called by the Regent or upon written request of five members.

Section 4. Fifteen (15) members shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE VIII - Fees and Dues

Section 1. The annual dues which include National, State and Chapter obligations, shall be payable on or before the first autumn meeting each year.

Section 2. The fees of new members for the first year shall be set by the Executive Committee to include State and Chapter dues, and National application fee and dues.

Section 3. The dues of all members accepted by the National Society after May 1 of each year shall be applied to the next succeeding year.

Section 4. On February first the Treasurer shall notify all members in arrears for dues. In March and in May she shall forward to all delinquents the notices of the National Society sent for all members in arrears for dues. On June first. the names of all members whose dues are not paid shall be automatically dropped from membership.

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Before the first of December the annual dues of each member shall be sent to the State Treasurer.

Section 6. The fees for readmission of resigned members and of members dropped for non-payment of dues shall be prescribed by the By-Laws of the National Society.

Section 7. Associate members shall pay no initiation fee and no State or National dues except through the Chapter in which they hold membership in the National Society. The annual dues of Associate Members shall be five (\$5.00) dollars payable on or before the first autumn meeting.

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Section 2. The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the Chapter hetween meetings. It is subject to the orders of the Chapter and none of its acts shall conflict with action taken by the Chapter.

Section 3. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent, or upon written request of four members of the Board. Five members of the Committee shall constitute a quorum.

ARTICLE X - Committees

Section 1. A Finance Committee consisting of the Treasurer and three members to be appointed by the Regent shall consider requests for funds.

Section 2. Such other committees, or chairmen and shall plan a budget. of committees, shall be appointed by the Regent as the Chapter may authorize, or as the State Conference and National Society may require.

ARTICLE XI - Parliamentary Authority The rules contained in "Roberts' Rules of Order Revised" shall govern the Chapter in all cases to which these By-Laws are not applicable.

ATICLE XII - Amendment

These By-Laws may be amended at any regular meeting of the Chapter by two-thirds vote, provided the proposed amendment has been presented to the Chapter and submitted in writing to the

Recording Secretary at the previous regular meeting.

STATE REGENT'S MESSAGE

Dear Virginia Daughters:

Hear ye! Hear ye! Our silver and gold ship's bell is ringing with absolutely astounding news! In July of 2004, Virginia Daughters set sail from Lynchburg, exploring waters well beyond the shores of the Commonwealth, dreaming of a successful voyage and discovering others interested in Historic Preservation willing to join our growing fleet of ship owners. In a little over a year before we gather to celebrate the 225th anniversary of the Victory of the Battle of Yorktown, October 19th, 1781, we have found treasure well beyond original expectations. Excavation around the foundation of the Yorktown Customhouse by Compass Contracting, Inc. of Hampton should begin by mid-August. Barring any unforeseen underground surprises, the approximate projected time for completion is 5 1/2 months. That means early in the New Year we will have completed this phase of our State Project.

Many of you have "Sailed our Ships" supporting in a huge way the jewelry sales, as have many of your friends across the country. Credit also should be given to two State Chairmen -- State Regent's Project, Jackie Myers, and Yorktown Customhouse, Ann Clark - Jackie for her constant oversight of the jewelry inventory, the mail/phone orders, and consignment matters and Ann for her successful drafting of a grant request from the Lettie Evans Pace Foundation. whose unforeseen generosity allows us to move forward sooner than we had thought possible. The dedication of these two women should not go unrecognized. Thank you, Jackie and Ann, and thank you, Virginia Daughters.

This does not mean that the jewelry sales will cease. 2007 is just around the corner, and there are other projects needing attention at the Customhouse, primarily replacement of wooden beams in the basement area and a generator to maintain a steady flow of electricity during times of need.

I know all of you wonder about the project of our late State Regent, Mary Jane Irwin Davis. Plans are underway for the dedication of the Battle of Great Bridge Monument sited on the banks of the Albemarle and Chesapeake Canal to take place on Sunday, March 19th, the final day of our 2006 State Conference in Portsmouth. If the St. Patrick's Day theme of the conference doesn't entice you to Portsmouth, perhaps completion of this project will. I share this with you now so you may begin thinking about your Sunday travel plans.

VALLEY FORGE BUS TOUR

Travel plans are also in order for the weekend of November 12th and 13th. Sunday, the 13th has been scheduled as the Commonwealth of Virginia State Day at the Washington Memorial Chapel at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania. Specific information was unavailable by State Conference but some of you were aware of a tentative plan for such a bus voyage when a signup list was available in Roanoke. We have now been informed that the service begins at 11:15am. More information will be given at our Fall Musters beginning the third week in September. The word MUSTER is defined "to assemble or summon (troops, etc.) as for inspection, roll call, or service." What could be more fitting than to have a Fall Muster? In the fall the DAR Museum staff will begin the renovation of the Virginia

A Fry-Jefferson map recently acquired by the Museum will hang over the mantle. The renovation should be completed by Continental Congress, 2006. Even though it has been more than 50 years since the Academy of Music was torn down, Dorothy Piedmont still laments the building's demise.

"People are so anxious to get rid of things," she said after explaining that she wrote letters to the city begging officials not to tear down the Salem Avenue theater. "From then on I became aware of the significance of buildings."

A lifelong artist by trade and disposition, Piedmont pent nearly 30 years of her life drawing buildings and other historical sites that have been torn down, burned or restored in Roanoke, where she was born and raised.

"I started sketching after Roanoke was tearing down significant landmarks and buildings," said Piedmont, 78. "Or they seemed to be headed in that direction."

Some of her portraits, such as the oak tree that toppled on Carolina Avenue in late August, are not buildings. But she has deemed them all worthy of being captured in

a series of black-and-white notecards that Piedmont has dubbed the Vanishing Valley series. Her notecards are available at the History Museum of Western Virginia gift shop located at the Market

Square building in downtown Roanoke.

"We've lost so many good buildings that she's got some sketches of those that aren't here anymore. We need that," said George Kegley, editor of the Journal of the Historical Society for Western Virginia. Piedmont thought of

the name Vanishing Valley because of "the way things

were progressing," she said.

Anne House in Old Southwest was razed in 1989, "people would say, 'Why don't you do so and so,' " to remember the building that once stood. Pied-

mont said she felt these were drawings she had to do.

Her collection includes the Rockledge Inn-Mill Mountain Playhouse before it burned down in October 1976. There's also Jefferson High School on an 8-by-12 print before the building was renovated. She drew it because she was concerned that it would eventually be razed. It became the Jefferson Center in 1993.

"One that I always wanted to do was the YWCA," Piedmont said, adding to the list of other buildings she would have liked to have drawn over the years. "That building was going to be torn down."

Piedmont began drawing historical buildings and other cherished mainstays in 1977, when she lived in Glen Ridge, N.J., with her late husband, Joseph "Don" Piedmont.

Her husband, who worked in public relations and was a writer, observed Piedmont's sketches one day and asked her, "Why don't you do some on notepaper?"

"He thought I was going to draw some lines," Piedmont said.

Instead, she illustrated the Woman's Club building in Glen Ridge. The print was so

successful that the organization bought the rights to her drawing to use for company letterheads.

When Piedmont returned to Roanoke in 1979 she continued to paint and draw, carrying sketch pads with her on family vacations.

In her living room hang half a dozen portraits of her son, who is in the Marine Corps, and five daughters. A self-portrait sits above the fireplace mantel.

Anne Piedmont, her eldest daughter, was 9 years old when she would finally sit still for her portrait. She would wear the same blue blouse for about a month until the portrait was done. "I don't think I appreciated it as much as I do now," Anne Piedmont said. "I treasure [the portrait] because it captures a moment in time when I was a young child."

Dorothy Piedmont is working on a portrait of her husband, who died last month. She uses pastels, watercolors and oils for paintings, usually commissioned by close friends. Many of these paintings are of their homes.

"I wanted a watercolor of my house, and being a friend of an artist, I, of course, asked her first," said **Sara Airheart,** who has known Piedmont since she was 10. "When my father turned 90, instead of giving him a gift, I got her to draw two different views of First Presbyterian Church, which I gave to the church in his honor."

For the buildings in her series, Piedmont uses quill inks and Bristol board type paper.

She said it takes her a couple of hours each day standing in the same spot she was the previous day to draw the buildings accurately.

"Generally, I try to pick the spot that was most familiar to people," she said. "I could have picked some odd angle that interested me, but it might not have been familiar."

She hopes to finish each portrait before the seasons change.

"It's real hard," she said. "Why in the world I do it, I don't know. I have a daughter that's an architect. It's something innate about drawing buildings."



Men fought the battles of the Revolutionary War, but American women helped, too. Some knitted stockings and spun wool for uniforms. Others spied on the British. Like Paul Revere, Sybil Ludington even made a midnight ride to warn of approaching English soldiers.¹

In addition, thousands of women became "camp followers" for the Continental Army. They traveled with the soldiers, cooked, and nursed the wounded. Some even went out on battlefields to bring the men water. These women were nicknamed "Molly Pitcher," for the pitchers of water they carried. The original Molly Pitcher was probably a woman named Mary Hays. Legend has it that when her husband fell wounded at her feet during the Battle of Monmouth, she took over his position and continued firing his cannon.²



Perhaps the most famous woman in the war effort was Deborah Sampson. She was not content to be a camp follower. Instead, she dressed as a man and enlisted in the 4th Massachusetts Regiment under the name of Robert Shurtleff. She tried to hide the fact that she was a woman. But her secret was discovered when she fell ill and a doctor examined her. Sampson was discharged from the army, but received a military pension for her war wounds.³ When she died many years later, her husband continued to receive a pension as her "widow."⁴



6 6 THE UNITED STATES was created in Philadelphia on July 4, 1776, when the Continental Congress voted the final form of the Declaration of Independence. The United States was perpetuated on September 17, 1787, when the Federal Convention completed its work on the Constitution and referred it, through Congress, to the individual states for ratification. Both these great decisions were made in the same chamber in what is now called Independence Hall, but was then the Pennsylvania State House. It would still be merely the old State House if independence had not been achieved and if the Constitution had not been ratified and put into effect. The noble building, so venerable to later ages, might not even have survived, but might have been swept away in the surging growth of a modern city. In that case, a few students of history would sometimes remember the site as the stage of those lost causes. Instead, Pennsylvania's State House has become Independence Hall for the entire United States. Nor is that all. On account of the Declaration of Independence, it is a shrine honored wherever the rights of men are honored. On account of the Constitution, it is a shrine cherished wherever the principles of self-government on a federal scale are cherished. "-CARL VAN DOREN.

On Sept. 13, 1814, Francis Scott Key visited the British fleet in Chesapeake Bay to secure the release of Dr. William Beanes, who had been captured after the burning of Washington, DC. The release was secured, but Key was detained on ship overnight during the shelling of Fort McHenry, one of the forts defending

Baltimore. In the morning, he was so delighted to see the American flag still flying over the fort that he began a poem to commemorate the occasion. First published under the title "Defense of Fort M'Henry," the poem soon attained wide popularity as sung to the tune "To Anacreon in Heaven." The origin of this tune is obscure, but it may have been written by John Stafford Smith, a British composer born in 1750. "The Star-Spangled Banner" was officially made the national anthem by Congress in 1931, although it already had been adopted as such by the army and the navy.





INSIGNIA

The Official Insignia was unanimously adopted by the National Board of Management on May 26, 1891, and patented September 22, 1891. The golden wheel of the Insignia represents a spinning wheel, the platinum or white gold distaff represents flax, the blue rim and the distaff carry the colors of the Society, and the stars represent the original thirteen colonies.

The Insignia pin should be worn over the left breast and only by active members. The Insignia and pins are worn with 1 1/4 " wide ribbon, which is the same as the ribbon used to create the State Regent's sash ribbon. By ruling of the National Board of Management a flag pin may be worn on the left lapel when wearing the DAR Insignia. No other jewelry is to be worn on the left side when wearing the Insignia pin.

KENMORE

Kenmore restoration is due to be completed in 2006 with the house looking much as it did in the 1770's when Fielding and Betty Lewis built it. As the final touches are being completed, plans for furnishing Kenmore are developing through source documents such as the Lewis probate inventories.

Based on archaeological study and evidence, the current 1929 kitchen dependency is situated in the same location as its 18th century predecessor and was recently refurbished with Lewis-era replicas.

Last year Ferry Farm was one of the two largest archaeological digs in the mid-Atlantic region. A new archaeology laboratory and gallery is open for viewing artifacts found at the dig as they are being cleaned, mended and studied.

STATE SPECIAL COMMITTEES VIRGINIA LADIES

At the outset, the plan was to develop the Virginia Ladies as an internal Virginia DAR project without military involvement. Guidelines for Districts were to be developed, so chapters could participate in the project and be involved with military funerals of our nation's veterans. Burial sites in the Commonwealth are at a premium. Most of the venues where Virginia DAR could assist are private cemeteries, for which there is no common communication thread. In addition, there is no identifiable process for training participants without military assistance, since there are strict military procedures for participants. If a training plan could be developed it would need to be conducted at the District level. At this time, until these decisions can be resolved, it is unlikely that this project will move forward.



Bylaws of the MARGARET LYNN LEWIS CHAPTER of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION

Article I - Name

The name of this chapter shall be the Margaret Lynn Lewis Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (NSDAR).

ARTICLE II Objects

The purpose of this chapter shall be to promote the objectives of the NSDAR which are:

1. To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of the Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2. To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people: "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3. To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Membership

Section 1. Eligibility: Any woman is eligible for membership in the NSDAR who is not less than eighteen years of age, and who is linearly descended from a man or woman who, with unfailing loyalty to the cause of American Independence, served as a sailor, or a soldier or civil officer in one of the several Colonies or states, or in the United Colonies or States, or as a recognized patriot, or rendered material aid thereto; provided an applicant for chapter membership

Section 2. Admission. An applicant for membership through this chapter shall be endorsed by two members of the chapter who are in good standing and to whom the applicant is personally known. The chapter may not discriminate against the applicant on the basis of race or creed. The acceptability of the applicant for chapter membership shall be by a majority vote by ballot of the chapter at a regular meeting. (Upon favorable action, the applicant shall be given the official application papers for membership in The National Society. Within one year, unless granted extension by the chapter, the applicant shall return to the chapter all required documents, prepared in accordance with instructions established and distributed by the National Society, and accompanied by the prescribed fees and dues.)

Section 3. Transfers. A member desiring to unite with the chapter by transfer, either from another chapter or from membership at large, shall be proposed and elected by the chapter in the same manner as a new member.

Section 4. Resignations. A member desiring to resign shall present her resignation in writing to the chapter registrar, who shall immediately report the resignation to the Organizing Secretary General. A member whose dues are delinquent shall not be entitled to resign from membership. A resigned member shall not be reinstated with out the unanimous vote of the membership.

Section 5. Associates. Upon the written recommendation of two members, the chapter by a majority vote by ballot may elect as associate members, a member of another chapter, providing that any member so elected shall be a chapter member in good standing and may be an associate member in not more than two chapters in a state at the same time.

ARTICLE IV Fees and Dues

The application fee to the National Society shall be determined by the Continental Congress.

Section 1. The annual dues, which include National, State and Chapter obligations, shall be payable on or before the November meeting of each year.

Section 2. The fees of new members for the first year shall be set. by the Executive Committee to include State and Chapter due.

Section 3. The dues of a member accepted after May 1 of each year shall be applied to the next succeeding year.

Section 4. On January first the Treasurer shall notify all members whose dues have not been paid that their dues are delinquent and that such member is ineligible to vote. Membership is automatically terminated if dues are not received by the last day of February

Section 5. The annual national dues for each member shall be sent by the chapter to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General in time to be received in that office before December first.

Section 6. The fees for admission of resigned members or members dropped for non-payment of dues shall be ten dollars.

Section 7. The chapter dues of an associate member shall be payable in advance on or before the November meeting. She shall pay no National or State dues through our chapter.

ARTICLE V Officers

Section 1. The officers of this chapter shall be the Regent, First and Second Vice Regents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian, Librarian, and Chaplain.

Section 2. Eligibility: No member shall be eligible to hold office who has not been a member of the chapter for one year.

Section 3. In the year of an election, a Nominating Committee of three members shall be appointed by the Regent in January. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate a candidate, whose consent to serve has been obtained, for each office to be filled. The slate of candidates will be presented at the March meeting and voted on at the next regular meeting. The new officers shall take office at the annual meeting.

Section 4. Election shall be by ballot for a term of two years and majority vote shall elect. When there is but one candidate for an office the election may proceed by acclamation. Absentee voting is allowed. Prior notification is sent to the registrar.

Section 5. A member who has served more than half a term in any office shall be considered to have served a term.

Section 6. Vacancies: In case of a vacancy in the office of Regent, the First Vice Regent shall become Regent. Vacancies in other offices shall be filled by the Executive Committee until the next annual meeting, when the chapter shall fill the vacancy for the expired term.

ARTICLE VI Officers & their Duties

The officers shall perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws, by the Bylaws of the National Society, the state organization, by the parliamentary authority and such other duties as shall be ordered by the chapter.

Section 1. The Regent shall:

- a. Preside at all meetings of the chapter and the executive committee/board.
- b. Be the chief executive officer of the chapter;
- c. Appoint all committees not otherwise provided for;
- d. Be ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee;

Section 2. The First Vice Regent shall:

- a. In the absence of the Regent perform the duties pertaining to the office:
- b. Shall be chairman of the Hostess Committee.

Section 3. The Second Vice Regent shall:

a. Serve as Program Chairman;

Section 3. The Chaplain shall:

- a. Conduct such religious services and DAR ritual as required;
- b. Communicate with members who are ill or in distress:
- c. Plan memorial services for deceased members upon the request of the family.

Section 4. The Recording Secretary shall:

a. Record the proceedings of the meetings of the chapter and executive board;

b. Keep a roll of members of the chapter

Section 5. The Corresponding Secretary shall:

- a. Send notices of meetings;
- b. Conduct such correspondence as requested by the Regent or required by action of the chapter or the Executive Board:

Section 6. The Treasurer shall:

a. Receive all funds of the chapter and deposit them in a bank or banks as may be designated by the chapter;

b. Disburse funds as directed by the chapter, provided that no bill shall be paid without the written authorization of the Regent: c. Remit to the Organizing Secretary General and to the State Treasurer the dues of active member, prior to the first day of December;

d. Shall make monthly statements to the chapter.

- e. Send dues notices to members prior to the October meeting.
- f. Shall fulfill the requirements in Article IV, Section 4.

Section 7. The Registrar shall:

a. Furnish application papers to candidates whose acceptability has been favorably acted upon by the chapter;

b. Shall see that these papers are in the proper form before turning them over to the treasurer for mailing;

c. Keep a record of members of the chapter, including name, address, name and rank of ancestor, national number, date of transfer, resignation or reinstatement, marriage, divorce and death; d. Notify new members, the regent, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, and treasurer of election to membership: e. Upon transfer out of the chapter, send the required papers in accordance with instructions of the National Society;

Section 9. The Historian shall:

a. Direct such historical work as may be requested by the chapter in accordance with the historical program of the National Society and of the State Organization;

b. Be custodian of historical and biographical papers which the chapter may acquire.

Section 10. The Librarian shall:

a. Cooperate with the state librarian in securing books for the DAR Library in Washington, DC and such other library work as the National Society and the State Organization may authorize.

ARTICLE VII Executive Committee & Board

Section 1. The officers of the chapter shall constitute the Executive Committee. The Committee Chairperson and the Executive Committee shall constitute the Executive Board

Section 2. The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the chapter between its meetings and shall make recommendations to the chapter.

Section 3. Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent, or upon written request of four members of the Board. Five members of the Committee shall constitute a Quorum.

ARTICLE VIII Meetings

Section 1. Unless otherwise ordered by the Regent or the Executive Committee, regular meetings shall be held on the first Friday of each month from September to May, inclusive,

Section 2. The May meeting shall be known as the annual meeting, and shall be for the purpose of installing officers and any other business that may arise.

Section 3. Two thirds (66%) of active members shall constitute a Quorum.

Article IX Committees

Section 1. A Finance Committee consisting of the Treasurer, Registrar and Regent shall consider requests for funds and shall plan a budget.

Section 2. Committees or chairmen of committees shall be appointed by the Regent as the chapter may authorize or as the State Conference and National Society may require.

Article X Parliamentary Authority

The rules contained in "Robert's Rules of Order Revised" shall govern the chapter in all cases to which these bylaws are not applicable.

Article XI Amendment

These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the chapter by two-thirds vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment has been presented to the chapter and submitted in writing to the Recording Secretary at the previous regular meeting. The bylaws should be reviewed every five years.

Article XII Dissolution

Section 1. When it is necessary for a chapter to disband the chapter will come will comply with the procedures in the bylaws of the National Society.





His patriotic pride and love of America is reflected in this brief passage included in Chen's application. He wrote, "Since the age of one, I have lived in America and I am now a U.S. citizen. I have always been proud of this country because of all the opportunities and freedom this nation has to offer."

Written words were just one factor considered in choosing Chen. Bryan noted, "This boy, I think, is truly remarkable because he's interested in so many things in so many areas."

CSHS guidance counselor **David Nedrow**, who coordinated the scholarship at the school level, referred to Chen as a Renaissance man. "Chen is a very multi-talented young man. He has the academic, the music, and the athletics. He's just very well rounded. Any father would love to have him as a son." Born in Beijing, Chen didn't meet his father until he was 1 year old. cially out in the country. I'm really grateful that my dad brought me here and has been able to provide me with the opportunities here


years and performs with the Roanoke Youth Symphony.



Longtime Roanoke judge dies at age 83

Jack Coulter practiced law here for 58 years and was nominated to the state Supreme Court.

Jack Coulter, a retired judge and attorney who practiced law in the Roanoke Valley for 58 years, died Thursday evening.

Coulter broke his back during a fall in July. He had complications from the sur-

gery and was treated at Carilion Roanoke Memorial Hospital for about two months. He was transferred to Roanoke Rehabilitation Center on Thursday to undergo physical therapy, said his son Philip Coulter. Jack Coulter died about 7 p.m.

He was 83 years old.

"He was bigger than life," said Philip Coulter, who opened the Coulter and Coulter law firm with his father in 1990. "He had a reputation for integrity and scholarship that was bar none."

As a judge, the elder Coulter always kept a list of his rules for sentencing — such as avoiding unnecessarily long sentences — beneath his glass on the bench, said Cliff Weckstein, a Roanoke circuit judge.

Coulter was twice nominated for seats on the Virginia Supreme Court, the second coming down to the flip of a coin. In 1987, Roanoke-area legislators flipped a coin to break a deadlock over whether to back Coulter or Chief Appeals Court Judge Lawrence Koontz for the state Supreme Court.

That seat eventually went to the Winchester Circuit Court Judge Henry Whiting. Koontz succeeded Whiting in 1995.

"That was regrettable, unfortunate and should have never been done," former state Sen. Granger Macfarlane said of the incident. Macfarlane nominated Coulter for the seat. "In my view, judges should be selected on the basis of their training, experience, education and judicial temperament.

"Jack met all those with flying colors."

Coulter retired from the judgeship in 1989, but remained active in Roanoke civic groups and in legal circles. Coulter, a World War II Navy veteran, remained "very dedicated to many of his friends who did not survive the Second World War," Philip Coulter said.

Jack Coulter was a driving force behind the

ing force behind the erection of the Lee Plaza War Memorial and was vocal about preserving Victory Stadium. He also persuaded the Roanoke

City Council to hang flags at the memorial on holidays, particularly Flag Day and Independence Day,

Macfarlane said.

Coulter also was instrumental in the installation of justice-themed art inside and outside the Roanoke courthouse, Weckstein said.

Philip Coulter said he didn't think there was a civic project in Roanoke Valley "that did not have his [Jack Coulter's] fingerprint on it in some way."

During his Navy career, Coulter witnessed the Bikini atomic bomb testing and was at Tokyo Bay during the Japanese surrender. He graduated from the U.S. Naval Academy in 1946. He later graduated with honors from Washington and Lee University Law School.

Coulter became a civil trial lawyer in 1949 and was named a judge in 1973. In 1985, he was named chief judge of the 23rd Circuit, which includes Roanoke, Salem and Roanoke County. He also was a member of the Roanoke School Board from 1964 to 1969.

Jack Coulter is survived by his wife of 62 years, Jeanne; their children David, Philip and Kathy; and seven grandchildren.
