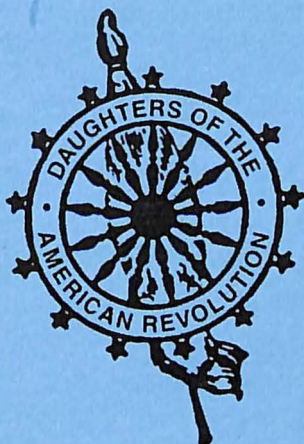

Bylaws of the MARGARET LYNN LEWIS CHAPTER  
of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the  
DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION  
( Revised 2004)

Article I – Name

The name of this chapter shall be the Margaret Lynn Lewis Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution (NSDAR).

ARTICLE II Objects

The purpose of this chapter shall be to promote the objectives of the NSDAR which are:

1. To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots, and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of the Revolutionary soldiers and patriots, and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.
2. To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people: "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge," thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.
3. To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Membership

**Section 1. Eligibility:** Any woman is eligible for membership in the NSDAR who is not less than eighteen years of age, and who is linearly descended from a man or woman who, with unflinching loyalty to the cause of American Independence, served as a sailor, or a soldier or civil officer in one of the several Colonies or states, or in the United Colonies or States, or as a recognized patriot, or rendered material aid thereto; provided an applicant for chapter membership is personally acceptable to the chapter.

**Section 2. Admission.** An applicant for membership through this chapter shall be endorsed by two members of the chapter who are in good standing and to whom the applicant is personally known. The chapter may not discriminate against the applicant on the basis of race or creed. The acceptability of the applicant for chapter membership shall be by a majority vote by ballot of the

chapter at a regular meeting. (Upon favorable action, the applicant shall be given the official application papers for membership in The National Society. Within one year, unless granted extension by the chapter, the applicant shall return to the chapter all required documents, prepared in accordance with instructions established and distributed by the National Society, and accompanied by the prescribed fees and dues.)

**Section 3. Transfers.** A member desiring to unite with the chapter by transfer, either from another chapter or from membership at large, shall be proposed and elected by the chapter in the same manner as a new member.

**Section 4. Resignations.** A member desiring to resign shall present her resignation in writing to the chapter registrar, who shall immediately report the resignation to the Organizing Secretary General. A member whose dues are delinquent shall not be entitled to resign from membership. A resigned member shall not be reinstated with out the unanimous vote of the membership.

**Section 5. Associates.** Upon the written recommendation of two members, the chapter by a majority vote by ballot may elect as associate members, a member of another chapter, providing that any member so elected shall be a chapter member in good standing and may be an associate member in not more than two chapters in a state at the same time.

ARTICLE IV Fees and Dues

The application fee to the National Society shall be determined by the Continental Congress.

**Section 1.** The annual dues, which include National, State and Chapter obligations, shall be payable on or before the November meeting of each year.

**Section 2.** The fees of new members for the first year shall be set by the Executive Committee to include State and Chapter due.

**Section 3.** The dues of a member accepted after May 1 of each year shall be applied to the next succeeding year.

**Section 4.** On January first the Treasurer shall notify all members whose dues have not been paid that their dues are delinquent and that such member is ineligible to vote. Membership is automatically terminated if dues are not received by the last day of February.

**Section 5.** The annual national dues for each member whose dues are non-delinquent shall be sent by the chapter to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General in time to be received in that office before December first. If a member has not paid her dues by December first the chapter treasurer will not submit their dues to NSDAR or VADAR without the approval of the Executive Committee.

**Section 6.** The fees for admission of resigned members or members dropped for non-payment of dues shall be ten dollars.

**Section 7.** The chapter dues of an associate member shall be payable in advance on or before the November meeting. She shall pay no National or State dues through our chapter.

#### ARTICLE V Officers

**Section 1.** The officers of this chapter shall be the Regent, First and Second Vice Regents, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian, Librarian, and Chaplain.

**Section 2. Eligibility:** No member shall be eligible to hold office who has not been a member of the chapter for one year.

**Section 3.** In the year of an election, a Nominating Committee of three members shall be appointed by the Regent in January. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate a candidate, whose consent to serve has been obtained, for each office to be filled. The slate of candidates will be presented at the March meeting and voted on at the next regular meeting. The new officers shall take office at the annual meeting.

**Section 4.** Election shall be by ballot for a term of two years and majority vote shall elect. When there is but one candidate for an office the election may proceed by acclamation. Absentee voting is allowed. Prior notification is sent to the registrar.

**Section 5.** A member who has served more than half a term in any office shall be considered to have served a term.

**Section 6. Vacancies:** In case of a vacancy in the office of Regent, the First Vice Regent shall become Regent. Vacancies in other offices shall be filled by the Executive Committee until the next annual meeting, when the chapter shall fill the vacancy for the expired term.

#### ARTICLE VI Officers & their Duties

The officers shall perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws, by the Bylaws of the National Society, the state organization, by the parliamentary authority and such other duties as shall be ordered by the chapter.

**Section 1. The Regent shall:**

- a. Preside at all meetings of the chapter and the executive committee/board.
- b. Be the chief executive officer of the chapter;
- c. Appoint all committees not otherwise provided for;
- d. Be ex-officio member of all committees except the Nominating Committee;

**Section 2. The First Vice Regent shall:**

- a. In the absence of the Regent perform the duties pertaining to the office;
- b. Shall be chairman of the Hostess Committee.

**Section 3. The Second Vice Regent shall:**

- a. Serve as Program Chairman;

**Section 3. The Chaplain shall:**

- a. Conduct such religious services and DAR ritual as required;
- b. Communicate with members who are ill or in distress;
- c. Plan memorial services for deceased members upon the request of the family.

**Section 4. The Recording Secretary shall:**

- a. Record the proceedings of the meetings of the chapter and executive board;
- b. Keep a roll of members of the chapter

**Section 5. The Corresponding Secretary shall:**

- a. Send notices of meetings;
- b. Conduct such correspondence as requested by the Regent or required by action of the chapter or the Executive Board;

**Section 6. The Treasurer shall:**

- a. Receive all funds of the chapter and deposit them in a bank or banks as may be designated by the chapter;
- b. Disburse funds as directed by the chapter, provided that no bill shall be paid without the written authorization of the Regent;
- c. Remit to the Organizing Secretary General and to the State Treasurer the dues of active member, prior to the first day of December;
- d. Shall make monthly statements to the chapter.
- e. Send dues notices to members prior to the October meeting.
- f. Shall fulfill the requirements in Article IV, Section 4.

**Section 7. The Registrar shall:**

- a. Furnish application papers to candidates whose acceptability has been favorably acted upon by the chapter;
- b. Shall see that these papers are in the proper form before turning them over to the treasurer for mailing;
- c. Keep a record of members of the chapter, including name, address, name and rank of ancestor, national number, date of transfer, resignation or reinstatement, marriage, divorce and death;
- d. Notify new members, the regent, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, and treasurer of election to membership;
- e. Upon transfer out of the chapter, send the required papers in accordance with instructions of the National Society;

**Section 9. The Historian shall:**



- a. Direct such historical work as may be requested by the chapter in accordance with the historical program of the National Society and of the State Organization;
- b. Be custodian of historical and biographical papers which the chapter may acquire.

**Section 10.** The Librarian shall:

- a. Cooperate with the state librarian in securing books for the DAR Library in Washington, DC and such other library work as the National Society and the State Organization may authorize.

**ARTICLE VII Executive Committee & Board**

**Section 1.** The officers of the chapter shall constitute the Executive Committee. The Committee Chairperson and the Executive Committee shall constitute the Executive Board

**Section 2.** The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the chapter between its meetings and shall make recommendations to the chapter.

**Section 3.** Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent, or upon written request of four members of the Board. Five members of the Committee shall constitute a Quorum.

**ARTICLE VIII Meetings**

**Section 1.** Unless otherwise ordered by the Regent or the Executive Committee, regular meetings shall be held on the first Friday of each month from September to May, inclusive.

**Section 2.** The May meeting shall be known as the annual meeting, and shall be for the purpose of installing officers and any other business that may arise.

**Section 3.** Two thirds ( 66%) of active members shall constitute a Quorum.

**Article IX Committees**

**Section 1.** A Finance Committee consisting of the Treasurer, Registrar and Regent shall consider requests for funds and shall plan a budget.

**Section 2.** Committees or chairmen of committees shall be appointed by the Regent as the chapter may authorize or as the State Conference and National Society may require.

**Article X Parliamentary Authority**

The rules contained in "Robert's Rules of Order Revised" shall govern the chapter in all cases to which these bylaws are not applicable.

**Article XI Amendment**

These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the chapter by two-thirds vote of the members present, provided the proposed amendment has been presented to the chapter and submitted in writing to the Recording Secretary at the previous regular meeting. The bylaws should be reviewed every five years.

**Article XII Dissolution**

Section 1. When it is necessary for a chapter to disband the chapter will comply with the procedures in the bylaws of the National Society.

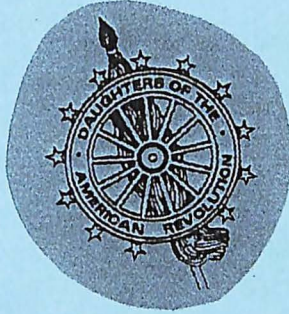

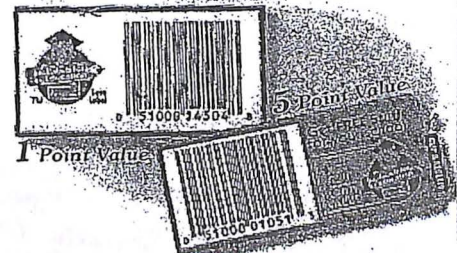

### STATE PARLIAMENTARIAN

When do newly elected officers take office? Must an officer be installed to make the election legal? Who decides? These are a few of the questions your parliamentarian has received lately. Let's see what Robert's Rules of Order Newly Revised tells us. This is the Parliamentary Authority of the NSDAR. An officer-elect takes possession of his office immediately upon his election's becoming final, unless the bylaws or other rules specify a later time. If a formal installation ceremony is prescribed, failure to hold it does not affect the time at which the new officers assume office (RONR, page 430).

Here are the very important words: "unless bylaws...specify a later time." Some bylaws state that the incoming officers take office on a specific date, or after the Annual Meeting, or after installation. Traditionally, for many chapters, an installation is a formality and a lovely custom. Perhaps there is an exchange of pins, symbolic giving of the gavel, or the new regent may adjourn the meeting. Your bylaws should state when officers-elect take office. If they do not, then RONR is the answer. If your chapter has always (custom) had officers take office immediately after installation or any other variation, then this should be in your bylaws or a standing rule to continue your practice.

The National Board of Management unanimously adopted the official insignia on May 26, 1891, and patented it September 22, 1891. The golden wheel of the insignia represents a spinning wheel; the platinum or white gold distaff represents flax; the blue rim and the distaff carry the colors of the society; and the stars represent the original thirteen colonies.

The insignia is the property of the National Society and may not be used for commercial purposes or as an ornament. The use of the insignia is limited by states and chapters to yearbooks, stationery, programs, and when necessary, to the work of the society. The insignia should appear in either top center or upper left hand corner, with no words written or printed above it, except on an official DAR Banner where the insignia may be placed in the center with designation of National Society, state society, or chapter by name above, below, or around the insignia.

Will close for now. Hope this all gets to you OK. We'll keep in touch.

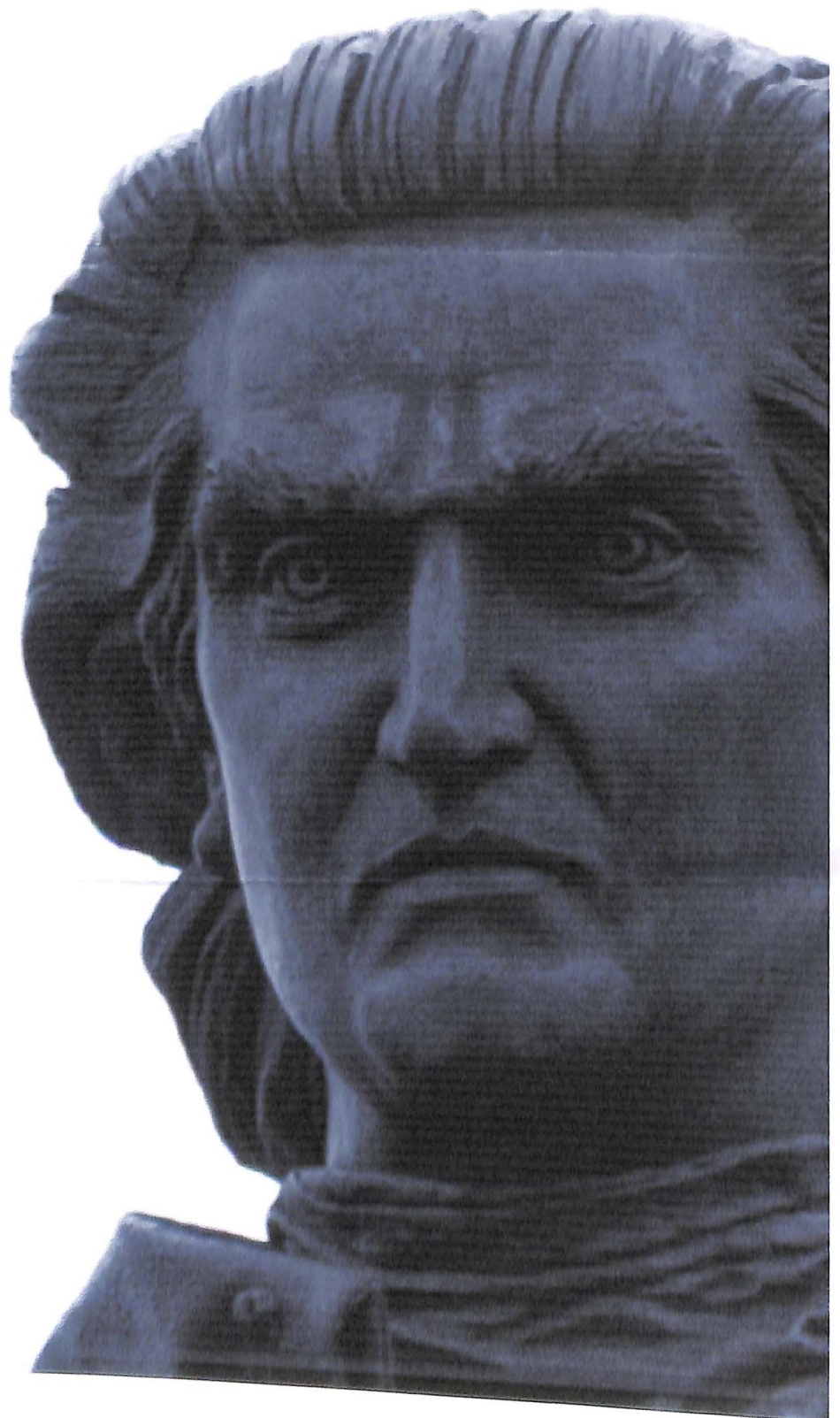

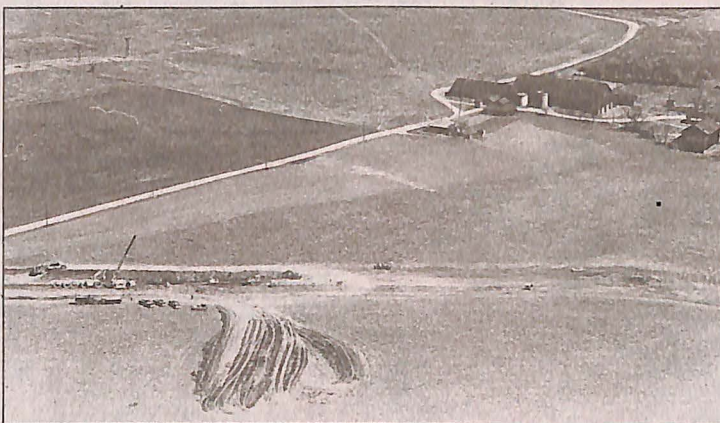

## DR. ANITA PUCKETT EXPLORES APPALACHIAN CULTURE AT MAY 27 SOCIETY LECTURE

"Does Appalachia Really Exist?" will be the theme of Dr. Anita Puckett's lecture to the Historical Society of Western Virginia on Tuesday, May 27, at 7:30 p.m. at Christ Lutheran Church.

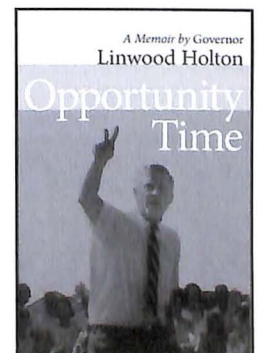
Dr. Puckett, an associate professor and linguistic anthropologist at Virginia Tech, will explore how the concept of Appalachia has been invented and perpetuated by nostalgic and escapist needs of society, government and media. Her Powerpoint presentation will compare this region to the complex mosaic of cultures in the nation's eastern uplands.

Puckett, a native of Dayton, Ohio, has taught at Virginia Tech for 14 years. A graduate of the University of Kentucky, she earned a master's degree from the University of North Carolina and a doctorate at the University of Texas. She taught at Southeast Community College in Harlan County, Ky., before moving to Blacksburg. Her first book was *Seldom Ask, Never Tell, Labor and Discourse in Appalachia*, published by Oxford University Press, and she is working on a book on the word, "Melungeons." Puckett also is working with students on such regional projects as mine safety and cemeteries.

## FORMER GOVERNOR LINWOOD HOLTON SHARES HIS MEMOIRS ON JUNE 11

June will be a bonus month for Historical Society lectures—two in one month, both at Christ Lutheran Church. On Wednesday, June 11 at 7:30 p.m. former Gov. Linwood Holton, longtime Roanoke resident, will talk about his new autobiography, *Opportunity Time*. Holton, remembered as a moderate governor after he lived here in the 1950s and 1960s, writes about his legacy of integrating Virginia's public schools and building the state Republican party.

On Tuesday, June 24 at 7:30 p.m., Dr. John d'Entremont, history professor at Randolph (formerly Randolph-Macon) College in Lynchburg, will talk about John Randolph of Roanoke, a prominent early Virginian who lived about 150 miles downstream from our Roanoke.

Prior to 1976, I was Restoration Curator for the Historic St. Augustine Preservation Board in Florida and Associate Curator of Exhibits at the Arizona State Museum in Tucson. I am a graduate of the University of Arizona and have a Master of Arts degree in Anthropology.

I look forward to working with all of you over the next few months and invite each of you to call on me and help me to continue the excellent work that is being done at the Historical Society.

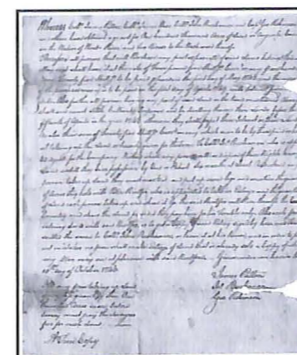

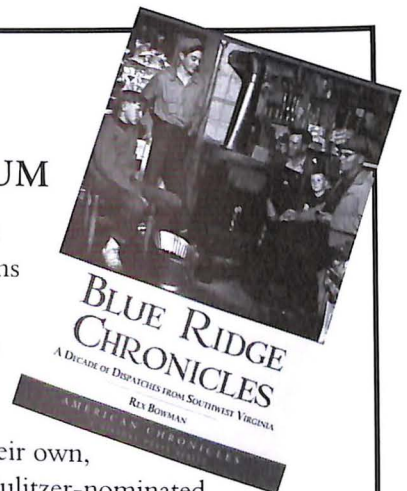

This year the DAR Chapters in the Roanoke Valley would like to encourage citizens to participate in the "Bells Across America" project. They ask that individuals contact churches, schools, courthouses, etc. and request that at 4:00 p.m., EST, on Wednesday, September 17th, all available bells be rung in celebration of the signing of a document so famous it is revered around the world.

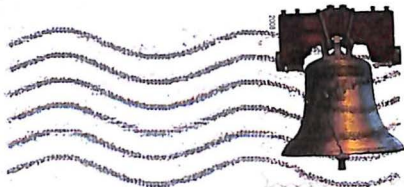

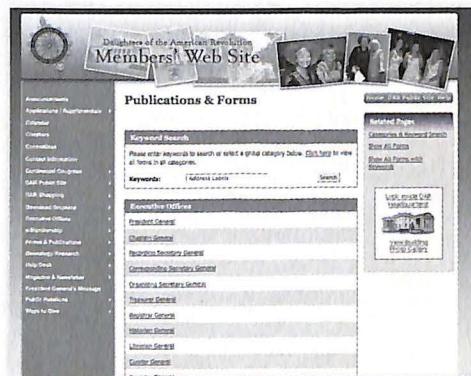
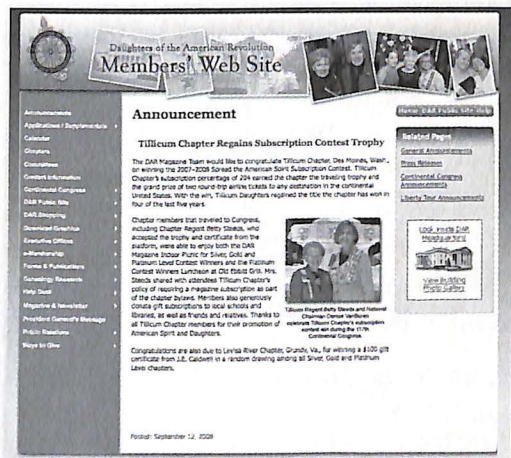
## MEMBERS' WEB SITE REDESIGN Launched in October

Nearly 10 years after its creation, the DAR Members' Web Site has undergone a substantial redesign, increasing its usability and visual appeal. The Volunteer Information Specialists (VIS) Committee and National Headquarters collaborated to bring a fresh look and enhanced navigation to the new site, which was launched in October. The redesign responds to member feedback and incorporates exciting new features.

The Members' Web Site has grown dramatically since its original launch, with additional resources and increasingly dynamic content. Announcements, which provide important news from Headquarters, have increased from just a scattered few in the early years of the site to more than 30 announcements a year. New research resources, project updates, and downloadable forms and documents are constantly being added. Other new features make the site as dynamic and compelling as the work of the Society it represents. (For a guide to new features, see page 413.) 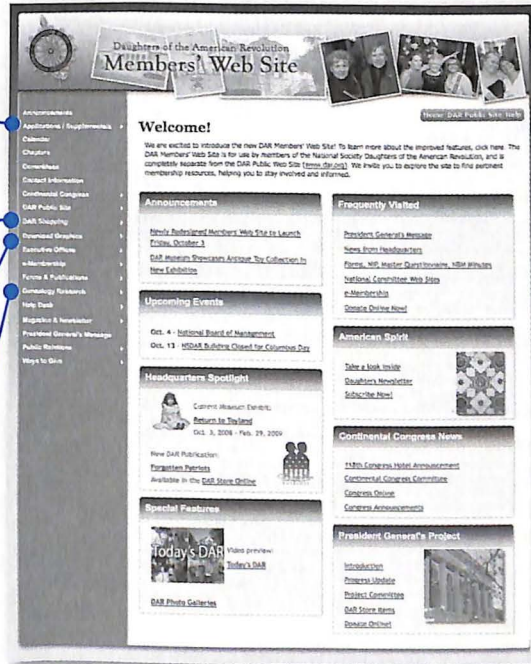
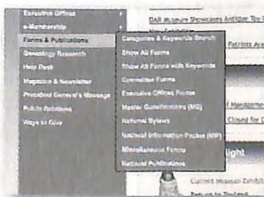

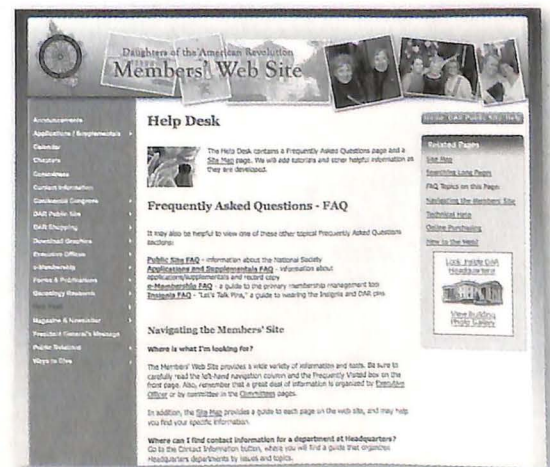

## DAR Genealogy Preservation

This committee provides an opportunity to support the National Society, and the only cost to you is your time. Preserving and making accessible our DAR records is the mission of the DAR Genealogy Preservation Committee. The goal of the committee's Descendants Project is to enter the information found on the lineage page of every DAR application into a searchable database which, once completed, will contain every name on the lineage page of every DAR application.

When the project started in the fall of 2004, more than 1.2 million applications were waiting to be entered. This includes all original and supplemental applications. The lineages from more than 500,000 applications have been added to the database by beginning with the original application number 400,000 and working forward into the 820,000s. Supplemental applications from Add Volumes 362 into the 700s have also been entered. As lineages are entered by DAR member volunteers, they are automatically uploaded

and available to the general membership to search.

You can see the results of this project in the Genealogical Research System portion of the Genealogy Research section of the Members' Web Site. The Descendants Project is making the lineage of proven Patriots more accessible. Chapter Registrars and Membership Chairman comment about how the results help chapters obtain new members.

Volunteering is easy. Just visit the committee Web site to find out more and become involved. Support is available seven days a week. The only requirements are your time and Internet access. We hope you will join our team.

### Remains identified as Stuart woman

The human remains found Sunday in the Walnut Knob section of Franklin County have been identified as those of Letisha M. Faust.

Faust, 50, of Stuart was last seen at a Floyd County pharmacy Dec. 9, the Franklin County Sheriff's Office said. Her car was found in late December unoccupied in Walnut Knob near the Floyd County line.

The cause of death has not been determined, and no evidence of foul play was found Sunday, said Lt. Steve McGuire of the sheriff's office. Further examinations of the remains are pending.

The primary search area was in and around a pond near which Faust's vehicle and shoes were found. A search team with a cadaver dog found the remains 350 yards from the pond, at the bottom of a ravine.

McGuire said weather conditions had previously hampered efforts to extend the search.

## HAMPTON

### Inmates to undergo detailed eye scans

All inmates at the Hampton City Jail will undergo biometric eye scans, with the information going into a database that includes fingerprints, photographs and other data.

The new system comes courtesy of a \$10,000 federal grant through the Department of Justice's community-policing program. It takes a high-resolution picture of each inmate's eye, and is able to detect differences in the irises of identical twins, according to Biometric Intelligence & Identifications Technologies, the Plymouth, Mass., maker of the system.

Sheriff's office spokesman Alonzo Cherry said the system eventually will be linked to sex offender databases nationwide that use iris-scanning technology. The office also is considering using the system as a voluntary way to register children and medical patients at risk of going missing.

# A man of mettle — rendered in metal

RICHMOND — The Old Hall of the Virginia House of Delegates could barely contain the civic and ancestral pride that accompanied the unveiling of a bust of Gen. Andrew Lewis, the Revolutionary War-era hero that Salem claims as its own.

In a dignified ceremony Monday, the Lewis bust took its place in the old House chamber among likenesses of historic figures such as John Marshall, Patrick Henry and George Mason, and a large statue of Confederate Gen. Robert E. Lee.

### Inmates to undergo detailed eye scans

All inmates at the Hampton City Jail will undergo biometric eye scans, with the information going into a database that includes fingerprints, photographs and other data.

The new system comes courtesy of a \$10,000 federal grant through the Department of Justice's community-policing program. It takes a high-resolution picture of each inmate's eye, and is able to detect differences in the irises of identical twins, according to Biometric Intelligence & Identifications Technologies, the Plymouth, Mass., maker of the system.

Sheriff's office spokesman Alonzo Cherry said the system eventually will be linked to sex offender databases nationwide that use iris-scanning technology. The office also is considering using the system as a voluntary way to register children and medical patients at risk of going missing.

## Andrew Lewis takes his place in Richmond

The stern visage of frontiersman and American Revolutionary War Brig. Gen. Andrew Lewis will soon regard politicians and passers-by in the Old Hall of the House of Delegates at the Virginia State Capitol.

Monday, a new bust of Lewis will be unveiled in Richmond, sculpted by Florida artist and former Roanoke resident Anne Bell.

According to the Salem Educational Foundation and Alumni Association, the driving force behind the commission and installment of the statue, a 1932 resolution by the General Assembly called for a bust of Lewis to stand in the hall alongside other prominent figures from state history such as Patrick Henry, Meriwether Lewis and Thomas “Stonewall” Jackson. Yet until now, the sculpture was never com-

missioned.

The Virginia Daughters of the American Revolution and the Roanoke Symphony Orchestra assisted in the foundation’s campaign to raise funding for the statue.

Because no images of Lewis taken from life exist other than a crude silhouette, Bell based her sculpture on a written visual description, previous likenesses in older sculptures and images of Lewis’ descendants.

In the mid-1700s Lewis founded a homestead near what’s now Salem, and is buried in Salem’s East Hill Cemetery. The Revolutionary War hero’s name is nearly synonymous with Salem.

One of Lewis’ most well-

known admirers, House Majority Leader Morgan Griffith, R-Salem, will be at the 2 p.m. ceremony at the Capitol, as will several descendants of Lewis, including former U.S. Sen. Chuck Robb.

A reproduction of the flag flown by Lewis’ Revolutionary War regiment that was commissioned by his descendants will be on display at the ceremony. Afterward it will be given to the Virginia Historical Society.

## “Dear Abe” darkly funny

The latest offbeat theatrical production from Studio Roanoke involves a collaboration between a director from Washington, D.C., and

a writer from Los Angeles.

“Dear Abe” probes the dark side of advice writing. The play centers around two brothers whose father wrote a friendly column akin to “Dear Abby,” but treated his children very differently.

Banno and Hahn have worked together before. Ristau asked Banno to participate in Overnight Sensations, a Mill Mountain Theatre event that involved creating a finished, ready-to-perform play in 24 hours. Banno directed a piece written by Hahn.

“I think of this as a drama in which a few funny things happen,” he said of the play.

Banno immediately added, “And I would describe it as a comedy with a really dark undercurrent.”

Hahn also stars in the play as the back-to-nature brother and has grown an impressive beard for the part.

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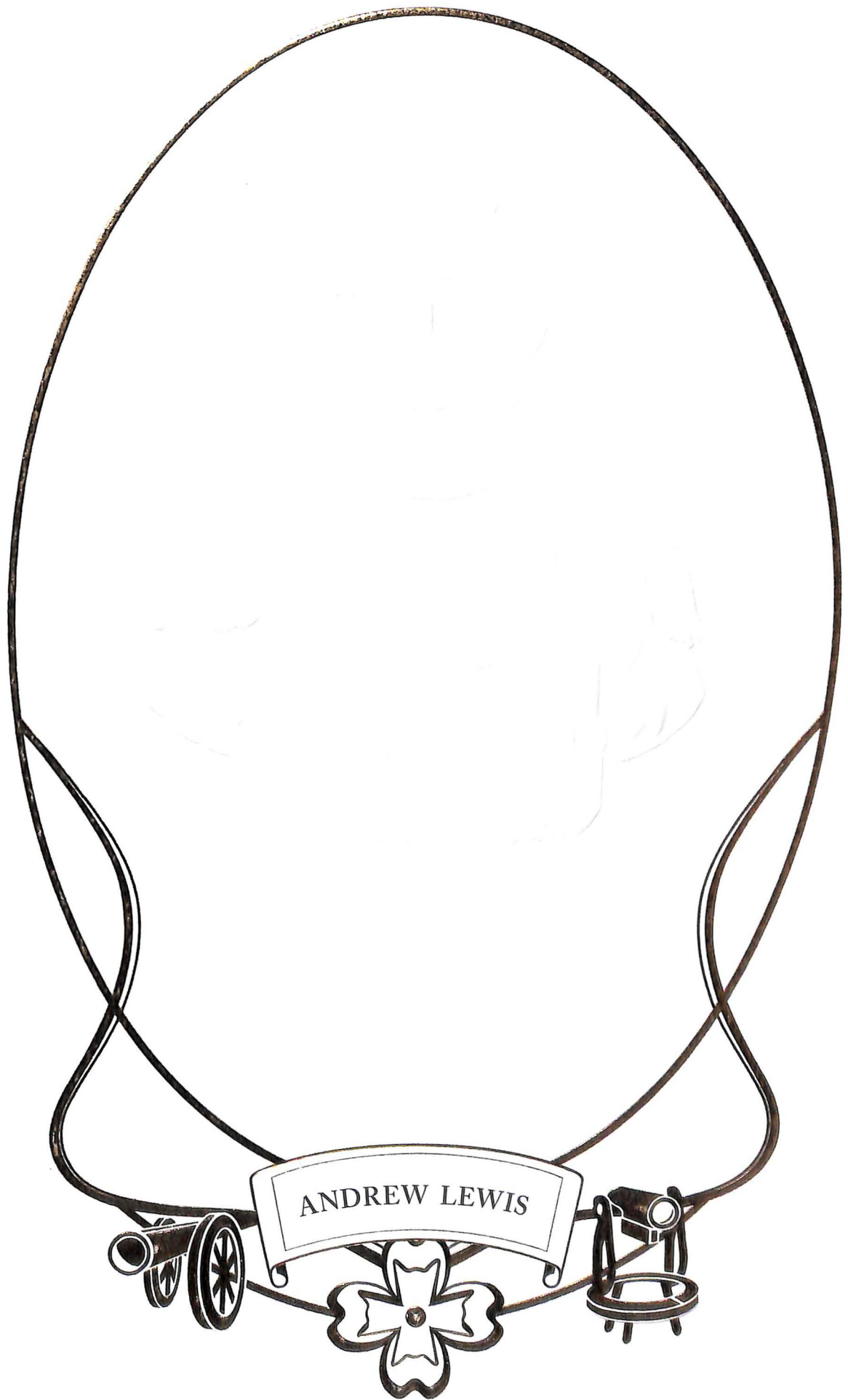

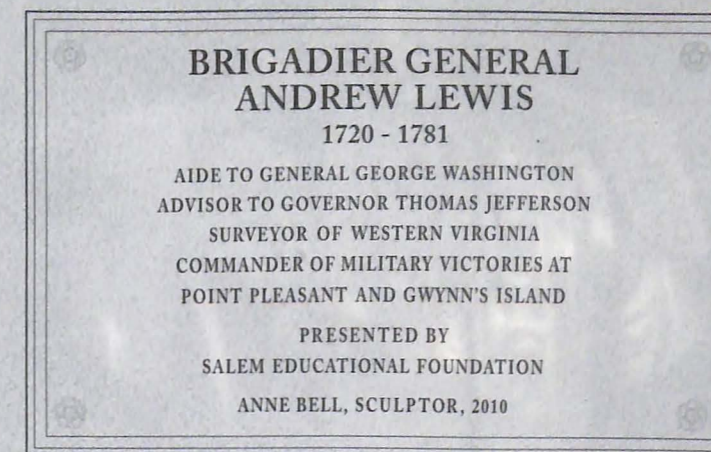
The Salem Educational Foundation and Alumni Association in Salem, Virginia was incorporated as a 501C (3) organization in 1983 to develop endowments and to provide scholarships for graduates of Salem High School. Since 1983 the Foundation has awarded scholarships valued at more than two million dollars and has developed more than 80 fully-funded endowments, one of which is the General Andrew Lewis Endowment.

On December 31, 1999 the Foundation sponsored a Millennium Gala as part of a strategic plan to enhance the public understanding and appreciation of the life and legacy of General Andrew Lewis. In partnership with local chapters of the Daughters of the American Revolution, the Foundation sponsors community events designed to preserve local and state cultural history for future generations, including programs for students at Andrew Lewis Middle School, formerly the high school named for Lewis in 1931.

On September 9, 2000 at the Salem Civic Center, the Foundation dedicated a life-size, bronze statue of General Lewis, sculpted by Anne Bell. Inside, visitors discover a large painting depicting Lewis at Gwynn's Island. An eight-minute recording provides an explanation. Thousands of visitors descend on the city in September for Old Salem Days. Many visit the statue, now a landmark featured on brochures and in tourist information throughout the region.

The Foundation proudly supports special projects related to General Andrew Lewis. It is with great pride that, exactly 78 years since the General Assembly passed the resolution to do so, we present the Bust of Andrew Lewis to the Commonwealth of Virginia to be placed in the Old Hall of the Virginia House of Delegates.

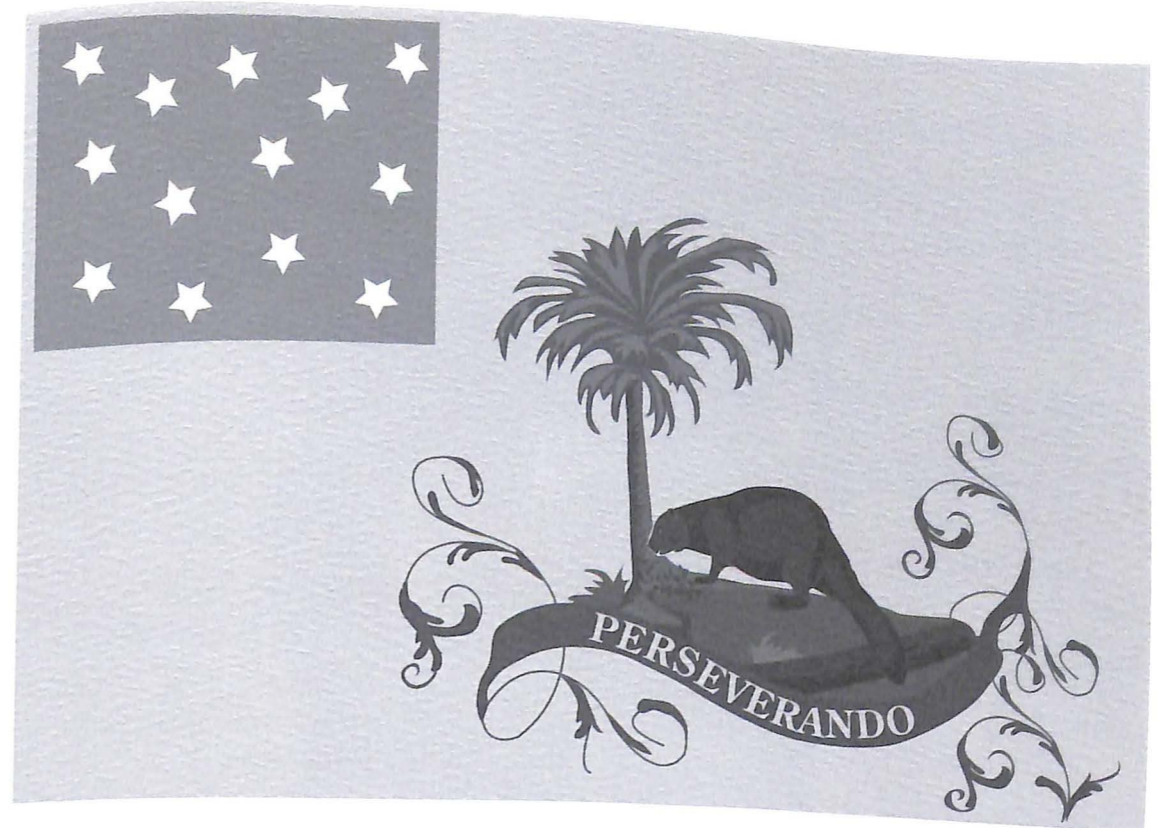

## The 3rd Virginia Regiment Battle Flag: a restoration in tribute to Andrew Lewis

In researching an appropriate battle flag that represented the southwestern part of Virginia where Gen. Andrew Lewis made his home, the Sons of the Revolution in the Commonwealth of Virginia and Andrew Lewis family descendants found a wonderful example in the flag of the 3rd Virginia Regiment, commanded by Col. Abraham Buford (1747-1843). Buford originally commanded the 11th Virginia Regiment, organized in September 1776 and later reorganized as the 7th Virginia Regiment in May 1779. The same year, Col. Buford also became acting commander of the 3rd Virginia Regiment and saw considerable service in the Southern theatre.

The 3rd Virginia Regiment flag was one of three regimental flags captured by British Col. Banastre Tarleton at the Battle of Waxhaws, South Carolina, also known as "Buford's Massacre", on May 29, 1780. The flag remained in the Tarleton family until it was sold along with the two other captured flags at private auction in 2006 for \$5.085 million.

Using a photo of the actual 230-year-old silk flag – much faded and worn – the flag was re-created in 2009 and features a beaver chipping away at a palmetto over the phrase "PERSEVERANDO" ("By Perseverance") on a yellow-gold background. The canton features 13 five-pointed white stars on a background of light blue and is the earliest known example of an American flag bearing 13 stars. The 3rd Virginia Regiment flag was made by Flagcentral of Richmond and was presented to the Sons of the Revolution in the Commonwealth of Virginia at a dinner honoring George Washington's Birthday on February 20, 2010 by the Lewis A. Pitzer family, descendants of Andrew Lewis. The flag will join more than fifty national and regimental flags and colors in the Society's permanent collection at the Virginia Historical Society in Richmond.

“Although General Andrew Lewis...was a leading actor in the events in which he figured, fame has trumpeted to the world his brave exploits with far feebler tone than the deeds of many other heroes of lesser note.”

So said historian William McCauley in 1877 about the great pioneer patriot of the Roanoke Valley. Indeed, Lewis played an indispensable role in developing the Virginia frontier and securing the independence of the Commonwealth; yet his historical imprint pales in comparison to those of contemporaries and friends like George Washington, Thomas Jefferson, or Patrick Henry.

Born in 1720 in Ireland, from which his family (according to legend) had to flee after a violent dispute with a landlord, Lewis grew up on the Virginia frontier. Living in the untamed wilderness necessitated learning to fight, and in adulthood Andrew entered service in the Augusta County militia, rising to a leadership role. He served with distinction during the French and Indian War. Afterwards, he moved to the Roanoke Valley to build his estate Richfield, in modern day Salem.

In October 1774, he led a force of Virginia frontiersmen to the confluence of the Kanawha and Ohio rivers, where they were unexpectedly attacked by an army of hostile Shawnee Indians. In the day-long Battle of Point Pleasant, Lewis' men prevailed, ending the Shawnee threat to the frontier and securing the Ohio Valley for the coming war with Britain.

Two years later, within days of the colonies declaring their independence from Britain, Lewis again led men into battle. The time was July 1776, and the enemy this time was Lord Dunmore, the last British governor of Virginia. At the Battle of Gwynn's Island (modern Mathews County), Lewis' artillery shredded the flotilla of Dunmore loyalists anchored in the channel, forcing the governor to withdraw and never return. So it was this widely respected soldier who ended the Indian threat to the frontier of Virginia and secured her independence by evicting the last royal governor.

Lewis' smaller role in the Revolution itself and his prosaic death by “bilious fever” in October 1781, weeks short of victory, probably doomed him to historical obscurity. Buried on his estate, his grave, like his memory, was soon overgrown and neglected for a century. But the time has now come to bring this forgotten founding father out of the historical shadows and pay him the respect due a hero of Virginia.

CHAP. 174.—An ACT to authorize the Governor under certain conditions to receive gifts of busts or other memorials of certain great Virginians to be placed in the Old Hall of the House of Delegates in the Capitol, in such a manner as not to interfere with the utility of said hall as a place of meeting. [ HB 298 ]

Approved March 22, 1932

Whereas, the statues of Robert E. Lee and Henry Clay and the busts of John Marshall, Matthew Fontaine Maury, Fitzhugh Lee and J. E. B. Stuart are now in the Old Hall of the House of Delegates, in the Capitol; now, therefore,

1. Be it enacted by the General Assembly of Virginia, That the Governor, by and with the approval of the Art Commission, may receive gifts of busts or other memorials of the following great Virginians, to be placed in the Old Hall of the House of Delegates in the Capitol in such a manner as not to interfere with the utility of said hall as a place of meeting: Patrick Henry, George Mason, Stonewall Jackson, George Rogers Clark, George Wythe, Richard Henry Lee, Cyrus H. McCormick, Edmund Pendleton, Joseph E. Johnston, Sam Houston, Meriwether Lewis and Andrew Lewis.

2. The Governor shall not receive gifts of other busts and memorials to be placed in said hall except and until the same be approved by a committee, consisting of the Governor, the State Librarian, and the president of the Virginia Historical Society, who shall pass on the fitness of the subject of the memorial from a historical standpoint, but no bust or memorial shall be placed in said hall to any Virginian who reached distinction after the close of the War Between the States.

# Woman's generosity reveals itself

The Helen C. Cobbs Foundation recently doled out nearly \$200,000 to area organizations.

Helen Cobbs, a longtime secretary at Hollins University and an active member of First Presbyterian Church, never appeared to lead an extravagant lifestyle.

But two years after Cobbs died, her \$4.5 million fortune is revealing itself in the form of a foundation she established to benefit some of the causes she

quietly championed.

"You would never know that Helen had money," said her cousin, Kathryn Tucker.

Never married, Cobbs spent her life in the same South Roanoke house where she had lived since she was 4, apparently feeling no need for more lavish quarters after coming into family money.

"Helen just wasn't like that," Tucker said. "If somebody needed something, she provided it. But she didn't make

Among the beneficiaries: First Presbyterian Church, Roanoke College, Hollins University, local Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts, the Roanoke Rescue Mission, Roanoke Area Ministries and the Child Health Investment Partnership.

An advisory committee will make recommendations for additional future recipients, following Cobbs' directive to focus on the underprivileged, elderly and mentally disabled residents of the region.

A graduate of Longwood College, Cobbs was active in the Daughters of the American Revolution and volunteered at

her church's community center and the History Museum of Western Virginia.

At Hollins, she worked as an administrative assistant to the dean of women and the president from 1945 to 1986.

"She was just a fantastic person, and so easy to get along with," said Libby Dungan, a former secretary in the treasurer's office. "You never heard her say anything ugly about anybody."

Melchionna said the funds in the foundation are expected to last for generations — with gifts each year that will serve as a permanent memorial to Cobbs' life.

Mary Burnett (Peg, Peggy) Hatch, 87, of Roanoke, Va., died on Wednesday, November 17, 2010, in an automobile accident. Mrs. Hatch was born on March 9, 1923, in Fort Worth, Texas, the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. William Edwin Burnett. Her family later relocated to Roanoke, where she was raised.

Peg graduated from Jefferson High School in 1940, attended Salem College, Roanoke College and while pursuing her studies attended Naval Training and received officer status as Ensign in the United States Navy. She went on to graduate from Roanoke College in 1950 with degrees in History and Political Science. She was called to serve in the Navy in communications until her Honorable Discharge as Lieutenant in 1953. She then attended Georgetown Law School from 1955 to 1959, receiving her Law Degree.

While attending Georgetown University in Washington, D.C., she worked full time on Capitol Hill for four members of Congress and later as a Legal Digester in the Library of Congress American Law Division writing speeches, preparing legal studies, and research for Congressional Committees and Members of Congress. She held various positions in Washington, D.C., including Law Clerk to the Honorable Burnita Matthews, as an incorporator and Board Member of National Capital, USO. The Honorable Burnita S. Matthews was the first woman to be appointed to the Federal District. Through Judge Matthews she met many women who were responsible for the women obtaining the right to vote.

She served as Secretary in the National Women's Party and had the honor of presenting the Equal Rights Amendment to the Democratic Platform Committee at the inauguration of President Lyndon Johnson in Atlantic City in 1964.

When Judge Matthews retired, Peg was offered the position of Assistant Chief Counsel for the Senate Judiciary Subcommittee on Constitutional Law because of her great interest in Constitutional Law. Instead of accepting this position, she went into law practice with two Georgetown classmates.

Peg opened a law office in Washington, D.C. As an attorney, she practiced both civil and criminal law and had been both a trial and appellate attorney. Notoriety became hers when she won a six year case against J. Edgar Hoover and the FBI, the first such case even won.

Peg practiced until her marriage to John Woods in 1967. Peg lived in the Virgin Islands and Orlando, Fla., during her marriage to John. While in Orlando she obtained her Real Estate license and was active in the local market. Peg was married to Mr. John Woods from 1967 until his death in 1971. Then to Mr. Bev Hatch from 1972 to 1975. After her return to Roanoke in 1990, Peg continued her law practice until her untimely death.

Peg loved her numerous pets, golf, tennis and Bridge club, shared with many friends and was an active member of the Roanoke Valley Democratic Women's Club. She was an intelligent, eloquent writer who lived life to the fullest. She will be missed.

She is survived by two nieces, Beverly H. Lumsden and Margaret Hobbie, both of Roanoke; two nephews, J. Dexter Hobbie IV, of Roanoke, and Edwin (Bo) Hobbie, of Harrisonburg, Va.; and numerous grand nieces and nephews and great-great-nephews. A memorial service to honor her life will be held at a later date.

Even her grandson's name is Lennon. "I gave a good round of their music to my children," she said.

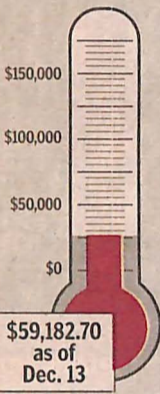
Dec. 8 marked the 30th anniversary of Lennon's death. "I remember when he died. It was one of those shocks like JFK. He meant so much."

From the Minutes of the Margaret Lynn Lewis Chapter, National Society,  
Daughters of the American Revolution –

A HISTORY OF THE ARGONNE CIRCLE MONUMENT - which we  
rededicate here today, Veterans Day, November 11, 2012

December 5, 1924 – Margaret Lynn Lewis sponsored a concert raising \$153.25 (clearing \$128.15) to help finance project. Mrs. H. A. Dudley, Miss Julia Carrson, and Mrs. Arthur Richardson were appointed to form a committee with Mrs. Gooch of the Arts Club. They were charged with deciding upon an appropriate marker for Argonne Park as a memorial to the World's War Soldiers.

January 2, 1925 – A report from Miss Julia Carson made from the Argonne Park Memorial Committee. The Committee had not come to a definite conclusion in recommending an appropriate memorial.

February 6, 1925 – Miss Carson, Chairman of the Argonne Memorial Committee made a report and showed a miniature model of the proposed memorial made by Mr. Warren, a local sculptor. The proposal was that Mr. Warren thought the sculpture could be done for \$150.00. Ms. Schick moved that the chapter accept Mr. Warren's offer. Mrs. Penn seconded the motion which was adopted.

March 23, 1925 – Regent Caldwell called a special meeting at the home of Mrs. A. B. Richardson for the purpose of some special business in regard to the memorial to be placed on Argonne Hill. The cast of the "Dough Boy" was accepted and an announcement was made that the committee wanted this work done on a better piece of stone than that first planned. To do this would cost \$100.00 extra. Mrs. Schick and Mrs. Fry very graciously turned over \$50.00 to complete the \$100.00 additional money.

April 3, 1925 – A report was made showing a number of pledges for the completion of the Argonne Monument. Subscriptions to the amount of \$57.00 were paid at the meeting and a number of enthusiastic talks were made in favor of this commendable work.

May 8, 1925 – Mrs. Hairston moved that the Chapter cooperate with the American Legion on Decoration Day and assist in any way that we can. Motion carried.

October 2, 1925 – The new Chapter Regent, Mrs. Schick, reported the Memorial Monument as being about finished. The Committee on Armistice Day was requested to meet with Mrs. Caldwell on Saturday, October 3<sup>rd</sup> at 4:00 p.m. to arrange a program.

November 13, 1925 – The Regent reported an item of \$29.00 for the concrete base of the Memorial on Argonne Hill.

December 4, 1925 – Miss Carson, Historian, made a most interesting report on the unveiling of the Memorial boulder on Argonne Hill, Armistice Day, and the attendant exercises.

Regent Schick called attention to the desecration of Argonne Hill as practiced daily by certain youths. At this meeting, a letter was read from Governor Trinkle concerning assistance for Stone Mountain.

January 8, 1926 – Mrs. Schick, Regent, stated that Col. Spiller, at the request of Mrs. Carleton Penn, wished to be informed whether the monument recently erected on Argonne Circle was a memorial to Roanoke Post No. 1 or to all Roanoke World War Veterans. Regent Schick reported that she had spoken to the members of the City Council asking for protection for the Argonne Circle Monument.

\*\*\*\*\*

Note: It appears that by 1930, the monument had been desecrated to the point that Margaret Lynn Lewis Chapter found it necessary to appeid the monument by attaching the bronze plaque on the opposite side of the monument from the Dough Boy's face sculpture. The original date mentioned on the plaque is May, 1925, but obviously from the Minutes, the first dedication was on Armistice Day, November 11, 1925. The date for the erection of the beautiful bronze plaque is 1930.

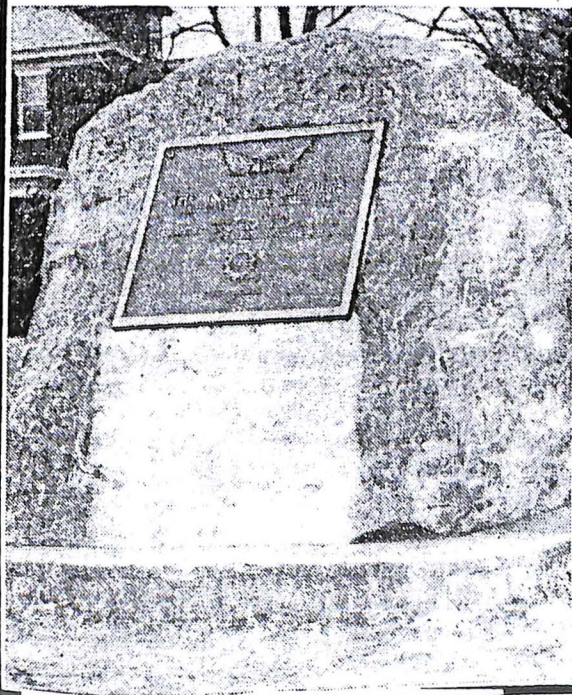
When the present members of Margaret Lynn Lewis Chapter considered that no honor naming the service men of Roanoke since 1925 had been done, it was decided that an effort would be made. Upon the notice of grants available through the Virginia DAR, it was decided that a grant application should be made through the 2012-2013 Historic Preservation Grants Program, Mrs. Judith Joy Surber, State Historian, Chairman. Mrs. Surber worked with the present Margaret Lynn Lewis Regent and gratefully, the requested grant for \$700.00 was approved by the Executive Board of the VADAR.

After the funding was received, Blue Ridge Monuments in Salem, VA was approached and work began with Mr. Kenny Reid, owner. Contact was made with Mayor Bowers office requesting the cleaning of the original Indiana limestone boulder. This was accomplished through the Dept. of Parks and Recreation of Roanoke. Mr. Reid finished installing the new bronze plaque day before yesterday (Nov. 9, 2012). We hope to continue Chapter and community interest in this small, but very beautiful park in this historic part of our city. Perhaps with added pavers, benches and landscaping, it will remain a place of quiet and beauty where people may sit and reflect, or enjoy the company of neighbors and think on the great blessings bestowed on our nation through the military efforts of the brave men and women who have fought to preserve our freedom and liberties.

# Sculpted Doughboy Was Loving Tribute



Chemist Dudley Thompson Warren carved the likeness of an American soldier from World War I on the granite memorial (above) sponsored by the Margaret Lynn Lewis DAR chapter 52 years ago. Time took its toll, and the face was eventually replaced with a bronze plaque. The monument stands at King George Avenue and Fourth Street S.W. in Roanoke.



It was called Argonne Circle then, the old Southwest Roanoke site where, on an Armistice Day 52 years ago, the first great monument to Roanoke soldiery was unveiled.

It was seven years after the sullen boom and staccato bark of the world's angry guns had been stilled; seven years after the signing of the armistice in Europe, and the doughboys had come home, leaving a fair continent smeared with grief and sullied with death.

Argonne Circle, they called the large plot of ground at the intersection of King George Avenue and Fourth Street S.W., and the name harkened to the fierce combat among the trees of Argonne Forest where the American doughboys struggled against the German foe and helped push them into defeat.

Countries continued in solemn communions with their dead on Armistice Day long years after the battlefields emptied, and the valor of Roanoke's men in war was remembered, too. But the armistice anniversary of 1925 was the special one, when the great monument went up and war buddies marched again in uniform while Gold Star mothers in the black garb of sorrow rode in special parade automobiles.

The day was fine and the memorial procession mustered at Elmwood Park. There were bursts of familiar wartime marches as the 116th Infantry Band set the pace for patriotic organizations and long lines of old soldiers on the march to the monument.

And there it sat, 13 tons of rough-hewn granite wrestled into the center of the Argonne plot after more than a year of fashioning in the yard of a chemist, Dudley Thompson Warren. The huge boulder was tempered by his chisel into a fitting memorial, and the head of a doughboy in a pie-plate helmet stood forth in bold relief from the rock's northern face.

The sculpted likeness stared solemnly over the inscription: "In honor of the Roanoke soldiers who served in the World War." The self-taught Roanoke sculptor who created the tribute did so on commission from the Margaret Lynn Lewis DAR chapter.

The granite composition they dedicated that day was the city's first recognition of its kind for its sons who had left it to fight. The idea was conceived by Mrs. M. M. Caldwell, grandmother of U.S. Rep. M. Caldwell Butler of Roanoke, and was so cherished by the DAR that members avoided any public appeal for funding as the project neared completion.

Curiously, no one knows what honorarium the sculptor received or, indeed, where he acquired the stone nearly six feet tall. He was a mild man, happier with his carvings than with his chemicals at the American Viscose plant,

and he died, his daughter says, when he was 44.

Mrs. W. W. Finch, the only one of his three children living now in Roanoke, remembers the memorial stone was like a square mountain resting on railway ties in the family's back yard. But she cannot dredge other memories of her infant days when her father struck at the stone and created his commemorative work.

It stood in Argonne Circle long after the name was forgotten and garden clubs placed bushes and sweet flowers all around. It suffered the days of playing children who made the marker their sanctuary and their fortress; home base for their games, and the symbol of their rise from infancy.

Steadfastly the doughboy stared as careless feet used chin, bridge of nose, and helmet tip to step to the top of his world. Careless feet danced in the smooth place there where holes had been ground to hold flags, and careless feet dangled over the rough sides where the long-ago chemist carved his personal mark.

The day when "I can do it" succeeded "Help me to the top" was the day neighborhood children came of age, and they loved their doughboy in their defacing, chattering attention, which gave him rouged lips and cigarette stubs and chalk marks in his eyes.

The years have brought changes, alas. The monument still stands, but the doughboy has disappeared, losing his lonely battle with cruel weather and children. The succeeding bronze marker does not evoke the long memories that seemed stored in his vacant eyes.

The doughboy seemed the symbol of valor everywhere; of the poets who romanticized the war and the men who hated and died in it. It was erected in the spirit of the grieving unknown who carved his poignant tribute near Verdun.

"*A mon fils,*" the inscription on the grave reads in French. "*Deputs que tes yeux sont fermes, les miens n'ont cesse de plurer.*" It is equally as lovely in English:

"To my son," it says. "Since your eyes were closed, mine have not ceased to weep."

**FROM THE MINUTES OF MARGARET LYNN LEWIS CHAPTER,  
FACTS REGARDING BRONZE PLAQUE PLACED MAY, 1930 –  
ARGONNE CIRCLE, ROANOKE, VIRGINIA**

January 4, 1929 – After some discussion of the Memorial Marker, Mrs. Caldwell made a motion that at the earliest possible date, a bronze plate be placed over the face of the soldier boy, as it has become so unsightly due to stone chipping away. Motion seconded and carried.

February 1, 1929 – Marker Committee presented several cuts of suitable bronze plates. Committee was asked to continue its investigation and report

March 1, 1929 – After discussion, motion was made to table the question regarding the Monument Marker until the next meeting.

May 3, 1929 – Mrs. Pitzer, Chairman of the Marker Committee submitted blue prints for the bronze plate and prices for the addition to the Argonne Monument. Postponed until fall.

October 4, 1929 – Mrs. H. A. Dudley, Regent, reported that she and the treasurer had investigated and found that the chapter had adequate funds for the continuing work of acquiring and installing the bronze plaque. The balance was to be \$156.75.

January 30, 1930 - The marker for the monument was ordered. It was reported that the Chapter would see the plaque in March.

March 7, 1930 – Bronze plaque had arrived, but “such bad weather” had prevented its installation. Chapter balance at this time was \$205.84.

March 12, 1930 Margaret Lynn Lewis paid the Newman Mfg. Co. \$126.65 for the bronze plaque and the installation on the Argonne stone. This is what we see today.

NOTE – The plaque was not placed over the doughboys face, but on the opposite side of the boulder. I believe that the remainder of the face was removed, but the inscription was left in place on the Indiana limestone, but it has faded away these 82 years later.

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Bylaws of the MARGARET LYNN LEWIS CHAPTER  
of the NATIONAL SOCIETY of the  
DAUGHTERS OF THE AMERICAN REVOLUTION  
(revised 2010)

ARTICLE I Name

The name of this chapter shall be the Margaret Lynn Lewis Chapter of the National Society of the Daughters of the American Revolution. (NSDAR)

ARTICLE II Objects

The purpose of this chapter shall be to promote the objectives of the NSDAR which are:  
1. To perpetuate the memory and spirit of the men and women who achieved American Independence by the acquisition and protection of historical spots and the erection of monuments; by the encouragement of historical research in relation to the Revolution and the publication of its results; by the preservation of documents and relics, and of the records of the individual services of the Revolutionary soldiers and patriots and by the promotion of celebrations of all patriotic anniversaries.

2. To carry out the injunction of Washington in his farewell address to the American people: "to promote, as an object of primary importance, institutions for the general diffusion of knowledge", thus developing an enlightened public opinion, and affording to young and old such advantages as shall develop in them the largest capacity for performing the duties of American citizens.

3. To cherish, maintain and extend the institutions of American freedom, to foster true patriotism and love of country and to aid in securing for mankind all the blessings of liberty.

ARTICLE III Membership

**Section 1. Eligibility:** Any woman is eligible for membership in the NSDAR who is not less than eighteen years of age, and who is linearly descended from a man or women who, with unflinching loyalty to the cause of American Independence, served as a sailor, or a soldier or civil officer in one of the several Colonies or States, or in the United Colonies or States, or as a recognized patriot, or rendered material aid thereto; provided an applicant for chapter membership is personally acceptable to the chapter.

**Section 2. Admission:** An applicant for membership through this chapter shall be endorsed by two members of the chapter who are in good standing and to whom the applicant is personally known. The chapter may not discriminate against the applicant on the basis of race or creed. The acceptability of the applicant for chapter membership shall be by a majority vote by ballot of the chapter at a regular meeting. (Upon favorable action, the applicant shall be given the official application papers for membership in the National Society. Within one year, unless granted extension by the, chapter, the applicant shall



return to the chapter all required documents, prepared in accordance with instructions established and distributed by the National Society, and accompanied by the prescribed fees and dues.)

a. During the year an applicant is preparing papers, she shall receive notice of all general meetings and be encouraged to participate; she shall not have voting privileges.

**Section 3. Transfers:** A member desiring to unite with the chapter by transfer, either from another chapter or from the membership at large, shall be proposed and elected by the chapter in the same manner as a new member.

**Section 4. Resignations:** A member desiring to resign shall present her resignation in writing to the chapter registrar, who shall immediately report the resignation to the Organizing Secretary General. A member whose dues are delinquent shall not be entitled to resign from membership. A resigned member shall not be reinstated without the unanimous vote for the membership.

**Section 5. Associates:** Upon the written recommendation of two members, the chapter by a majority vote by ballot may elect a member of another chapter as an associate member, providing that any member so elected shall be a chapter member in good standing and may be an associate member in not more than two chapters in a state at the same time.

#### ARTICLE IV Fees and Dues

The National Society application fee shall be determined by the Continental Congress.

**Section 1.** The annual dues, which include National, State and Chapter obligations, shall be payable on or before the November meeting of each year.

**Section 2.** The fees of new members for the first year shall be set by the Executive Committee to include State and Chapter dues.

**Section 3.** National dues of a member accepted after October 1 of each year shall be applied to the next succeeding year.

**Section 4.** On January 1 the Treasurer shall notify all members whose dues have not been paid that their dues are delinquent and that such member is ineligible to vote. Membership is automatically terminated by NSDAR if dues are not received by the last day of February.

**Section 5.** The annual national dues for each member whose dues are non-delinquent shall be sent by the chapter treasurer to the Office of the Organizing Secretary General in time to be received in that office before December 1. If a member has not paid her dues by December 1 the chapter treasurer will not submit their dues to NSDAR or VADAR without the approval of the Executive Committee.

**Section 6.** The chapter fees for admission of resigned members or members dropped for non-payment of dues shall be ten dollars.

**Section 7.** The chapter dues of an associate member shall be payable in advance or before the November meeting. She shall pay no National of State dues through our chapter.

#### ARTICLE V Officers

**Section 1.** The officers of this chapter shall be the Regent, Vice Regent, Recording Secretary, Corresponding Secretary, Treasurer, Registrar, Historian, Librarian and Chaplain.

**Section 2. Eligibility:** No member shall be eligible to hold office as Regent or Vice Regent who has not been a member of the chapter for one year.

**Section 3.** In the year of an election, a Nomination Committee of three members shall be appointed by the Regent in January. It shall be the duty of this committee to nominate a candidate, whose consent to serve has been obtained, for each office to be filled. The slate of candidates will be presented at the March meeting and voted on at the next regular meeting. The new officers shall take office at the annual meeting.

**Section 4.** Election shall be by ballot for a term of two years and majority vote shall elect. When there is but one candidate for an office the election may proceed by acclamation. Absentee voting is allowed. Prior notification is sent to the registrar.

**Section 5.** A member who has served more than half a term in any office shall be considered to have served a term.

**Section 6. Vacancies:** In case of a vacancy in the office of Regent, the First Vice Regent shall become Regent. Vacancies in other offices shall be filled by the Executive Committee until the next annual meeting, when the chapter shall fill the vacancy for the expired term.

#### ARTICLE VI Officers & Their Duties

The officers shall perform the duties prescribed by these bylaws, by the bylaws of the National Society, the State Organization, by the parliamentary authority and such other duties shall be ordered by the chapter.

**Section 1.** The Regent shall:

- a. Preside at all meetings of the chapter and the executive committee/board.
- b. Be the chief executive officer of the chapter.
- c. Appoint all committees not otherwise provided for.
- d. Be ex-officio member of all committees except the Nomination Committee.
- e. Determine method and by whom meetings notices are relayed.

**Section 2.** The Vice Regent shall:

- a. In the absence of the Regent perform the duties pertaining to the office.

- b. Shall be chairman of the Hostess Committee.
- c. Schedule regular meetings dates and times with appropriate First Presbyterian Church staff.

**Section 3.** The **Chaplain** shall:

- a. Conduct such religious services and DAR ritual as required.
- b. Communicate with members who are ill or in distress.
- c. Plan memorial services for deceased members upon the request of the family.

**Section 4.** The **Recording Secretary** shall:

- a. Record the proceedings of the meetings of the chapter and executive board.
- b. Provide copy of the minutes to the Regent.
- c. Maintain a roll of members of the chapter.

**Section 5.** The **Corresponding Secretary** shall:

- a. Conduct such correspondence as requested by the Regent or required by action of the chapter or the Executive Board.

**Section 6.** The **Treasurer** shall:

- a. Receive all funds of the chapter and deposit them in a bank of banks as may be designated by the chapter.
- b. Disburse funds as directed by the Regent of the Executive Board.
- c. Remit to the Organizing Secretary General and to the State Treasurer the dues of active members, prior to the first day of December.
- d. Make monthly reports to the chapter and provide a copy to the Regent and the Recording Secretary.
- e. Provide dues notices to members prior to the October meeting.
- f. Fulfill the requirements in Article IV, Sections 4 and 5.
- g. File form 990-N with the IRS annually after fiscal year ends May 31.

**Section 7.** The **Registrar** shall:

- a. Furnish application papers to candidates whose acceptability has been favorably acted upon by the chapter.
- b. Secure Chapter check from Treasurer in exchange for Applicant's personal check, ensure Applicant's papers are complete and in the proper form before mailing to National.
- c. Keep a record of members of the chapter, including name, address, name and rank of ancestor, national number, date of transfer, resignation of reinstatement, marriage, divorce and death.
- d. Notify new members, the regent, recording secretary, corresponding secretary, and treasurer of election to membership.
- e. Upon transfer out of the chapter, send the required papers in accordance with instructions of the National Society.

**Section 8.** The **Historian** shall:

- a. Direct such historical work as may be requested by the chapter in accordance with the historical program of the National Society and of the State Organization.
- b. Be custodian of historical and biographical papers which the chapter may acquire.

**Section 9.** The **Librarian** shall:

- a. Cooperate with the state librarian in securing books for the DAR Library in Washington, DC and such other library work as the National Society and the State Organization may authorize.

**Article VII Executive Committee & Board**

**Section 1.** The officers of the chapter shall constitute the Executive Committee. The Committee chairperson and the Executive Committee shall constitute the Executive Board.

**Section 2.** The Executive Committee shall have general supervision of the affairs of the chapter between its meetings and shall make recommendations to the chapter.

**Section 3.** Meetings of the Executive Committee shall be at the call of the Regent, or upon written request of four members of the Board. Five members of the Committee shall constitute a Quorum.

**ARTICLE VIII Meetings**

**Section 1.** Unless otherwise ordered by the Regent or the Executive Committee, regular meetings shall be held on the first Friday of each month from September to May, inclusive.

**Section 2.** The May meeting shall be known as the annual meeting, and shall be for the purpose of installing officers and any other business that may arise.

**Section 3.** Two thirds (66%) of active members shall constitute a Quorum.

**ARTICLE IX Committees**

**Section 1.** A Finance Committee consisting of the Treasurer, Registrar and Regent shall consider requests for funds and shall plan a budget.

**Section 2.** Committees of chairpersons of committees shall be appointed by the Regent as the chapter may authorize of as the State Conference and National Society may require.

**ARTICLE X Parliamentary Authority**

The rules contained in "Robert's Rules of Order Revised" shall govern the Chapter in all cases to which these bylaws are not applicable.

#### **ARTICLE XI Amendment**

These bylaws may be amended at any regular meeting of the chapter by two-thirds vote of the members present, provided the amendment as been presented to the chapter and submitted in writing to the Recording Secretary at the previous regular meeting. The bylaws should by reviewed every five years.

#### **ARTICLE XII Dissolution**

Section 1. When it is necessary for a chapter to disband the chapter will comply with the procedures in the bylaws of the National Society.

The program given by Betty B. Low at the Christmas Luncheon of the Margaret Lynn Lewis Chapter, DAR on December 7, 1991:

MARGARET LYNN LEWIS

When our program chairman, Kay Ross, asked me to be the speaker for our December 7th meeting, I expected the topic would be one of the two obvious ones for this date. Instead, she said the subject would be: "Margaret Lynn Lewis". I was so pleased since I am very interested in Colonial Virginia History, especially the history of Virginia west of the Blue Ridge.

In researching the subject of Margaret Lynn Lewis, I found that there just naturally seemed to be three parts to the story, unfold-like a three act play. I suggested to Betty Bond that she and Nelson might write a play for our meeting. But, she reminded me where we would be. I'm not a playwright, but I still wanted to use that form and so I will try to set the scenes for you and I will ask you to use your imagination in seeing these characters who had such a strong impact on Virginia History. And so our play begins.....

ACT I, Scene I The time is early in the Eighteenth century. England and Scotland have recently (1707) signed a peace-keeping treaty that unites them. The scene is set in the misty Highlands of Western Scotland. We see a large stone house, surrounded by smaller buildings, It is the house of the Laird of Loch Lynn, a wealthy land owner, whose well-kept Estate shows the work of many hands. Inside the house, seated at a tea table, we see two lovely young women. Through the large window that is behind them, we see that the winds of the Atlantic have blown away the dark clouds that often blanket the land, revealing the bright

green moors and the heather covered plateaus. In the distance, the blue loch and beyond that the craggy mountain peaks.

The young women have not touched the elaborate tea set before them. The scones and cakes, clotted cream and jam, and a fresh pot of Tea must wait for the arrival of their mother. Sarah, the older of the two sisters, (indeed, her own James is older than her sister Margaret) comforts her sister, Margaret, whose approaching wedding has caused her to be fretful and teary-eyed.

Sarah reassures Margaret, "You will like being married. John Lewis is so handsome and strong, your Irish Hugernot! I have been so happy since I married Henry Patton and I wouldn't take anything for our children."

Margaret argues, "But I will be so far away, across the sea in Ireland. And with strangers! How can I stand to leave Mother, good Dame Farley, and old Elliott, our nurse?"

A door opens and Mother enters, dressed in black for mourning of her husband. "Ah, I can hardly wait for my cup of comfort!" she says, advancing to the Tea table. "Margaret, what is the matter with you?" Sarah explains, "She is worried about being married."

Mother pats Margaret and remarks, "Nonsense! It is a wonderful match. John is a good man, a devout Presbyterian, and from such a wonderful family.

You are already sixteen and all is arranged. Let's not talk about it anymore, and have our Tea. (Curtain)

ACT I, Scene 2 Time - Fifteen years have passed.

Place - Donegal, Ireland, Clonwall Castle, Margaret and John Lewis's bedroom. It is late at night. All the children are asleep, even Samuel who will be fourteen soon. The house is quiet, which means all the household has retired. Margaret is <sup>alone, sitting</sup> on the side of the bed, braid-



in her hair. She listens intently for some sound that John returns home.

"He's here!" she says to the empty room, as she hears him coming.

John opens the door to their bedroom and stands rubbing his hands together to warm them from the cold. "Where are the children?" he asks.

"They are asleep. Do you know how late it is?" she asks. "How is Edward?" John asks in answer. "Your brother is not well at all tonight.

I am glad all his family is here with him. Did you see the young Lord of the Manor?" she asked, unable to wait any longer for the news.

"Well, yes.....He had guests and they were eating.....and drinking and didn't want to listen. But, I stood in the middle of the room 'till all became quiet." John struck a pose, his tall sturdy frame very straight, to show her. He continued, "'My Lord, (bowing) I said, 'many years ago, your father, the late Lord of Clonwall Castle made a freehold agreement with me for three lifetimes for leasing the estates on which my family lives. Now you want to change that agreement. I have kept it well and prospered. But if you carry out your threats, you will ruin me and disgrace your family name.' I think that young Lord C. is heavily in debt or he would not act thus. Why, he shouted at me to pay what he asks or move my family out of Clonwall Castle. I will have to deal with him when he is in a more sober frame of mind." (Curtain)

ACT I, Scene 3 Time - The following evening in the Tower of Clonwall Castle. All the household members sit or stand around the bed of John's brother, Edward. John is finishing evening prayers and reads from the Bible as shouting is heard without. Looking out in the direction of the noise, John exclaimed, "It is the drunken Lord C. leading an armed force of ruffians. Rally round, we must defend ourselves." he cried to the domestics, and even poor Edward rose from his bed and they all went forth to fight the battle. (Curtain)

Act I Scene 4 Time - Four days later. Margaret stands on the balcony

of Dungavin, the home of a good friend. She stares out into the hills as the sun is setting and speaks as if to the hills, "My home lies in ashes, but far worse, ashes lie on my heart, too. My beloved John is a fugitive from the Law, and for me, I cannot say why my poor sight was not blasted by what it four days since beheld.\*

Poor Edward, shot through the head, and his little son, Eubank, trampled under foot. John looked like an enraged tiger, wielding right and left, until first the obnoxious noble, then his favorite steward were dispatched. Our men succeeded in driving off the interlopers, but some of our best were slain. John is gone and I know not where."

From inside the house Lady Clara enters quickly and rushes to Margaret, "Do you see the white kerchief waving over there in the woods?" Margaret gasped, "That was to be our signal!" Lady Clara and Margaret start off in the direction whence the signal has come. John is there and comes to the edge of the woods. The three sit and talk, and he tells them, "I have been to Portugal, but like it not for a living. The Virginia wilds hold out a safe asylum for our oppressed house, and thither we sail at once." (Curtain) \*(quoted from The Common-place Book of Me)

#### INTERMISSION

ACT II, Scene I Time - About 1730 Place - A group of log cabins sit in the woods some thirty miles south of Jost Hite's settlement. Inside one cabin Margaret Lewis sits at a table writing a letter to her friend in Ireland. Reading aloud what she has written, she says: "My Dear Friend Clara, Today is a holiday and many of the young folk and their elders have gone up to see the Towering Rocks. John took Alice and her brothers so I have the house quiet and will write you our good news. His Majesty sent free and full pardon to John and also generous patents, grants of land in this Eden Valley of Virginia. Our cow, Snowdrop, is fastened each day on the meadow border. They drive her in when required for the use of little Charles, our new world baby. The settlement begins to look quite lively now, with the gardens around the cabins and patches of grain and all. About thirty of our tenantry have clung to us through evil and through good. When our grey stone dwelling is finished, I shall feel something like ornamentation, for the children's sake, especially Alice. I think people get beauty of sou

INTERMISSION: I would like to tell you about JAMES PATTON. He was the son of Sarah Lynn Patton and Margaret Lynn Lewis's nephew although he was older than she. He made 25 round-trips, as Captain, from Ireland to Virginia. For each family he brought, he received 100 acres of land. He became a very large land owner. He was Surveyor of Augusta County and head of the Augusta Militia. Col. James Patton was at Mary Draper Ingles' house when the Indians attacked. William Preston of Smithfield, his nephew, (Sarah Lynn Patton's grandson) had been there earlier, but had been sent on an errand by his uncle. Patton was 6'4" tall and had great strength but was killed by the Indians.

with growing up among pretty things, particularly girls, but all indeed should have their home beautified so that they may love to stay in or come to it as the case may be." "I was setting out some plants by the door of our cottage when one of Alice's Indian friends came by. His name is Oroon-ah. "Wrong" he said, "The Great Spirit put the herbs where he wants them....." Margaret stops reading and listens. Someone is calling her. "Momma, Momma", and the door bursts open. "They have taken Alice and Omayah" Mary jumped up, turning over the chair. "Who has taken Alice and Omayah?" she asked. "The Indians. They came out of the woods and they and Alice and Omayah disappeared in its thickness. The men fired their guns but could not get through the underbrush to go after them." (Curtain)

ACT II, Scene 2 Time - A few days later. Mary sits at the same table where she had sat writing so peacefully how many days ago?! /<sup>Windows and</sup>Doors barred. Mary says, "Four days, and we have heard nothing. None of the men have returned. What of my child! There is terrible warfare going on outside. We hear wild cries at night!" Someone calls from outside. "Who is there?" Margaret comes close to the door and can see through a crack that it is crazy Mary Greenlee, dressed like an Indian and carrying a bow and arrow. "What do you want? Margaret asked. The voice whispers, "I can bring your child if you give me a horse." /<sup>Margaret agonized over her request for a moment.</sup>"Take the pony!" Margaret answered, even though she/<sup>felt</sup>it gone for no purpose. (Curtain)

Act II, Scene II Time - Weeks later. The doors are still barred, windows shuttered but all the family sits at the table. John says, "Well, the old witch was as good as her word! She got herself captured and at the first opportunity escaped on our pony with Alice behind her." Looking at Alice he continues, "She says she hid with you in a cave and let the pony go so the Indians would follow its tracks" Alice just smiled, looking very infant-like with her bald head. John just shook his head and smiled. "That crazy woman!" he mumbled under his breath. (Curtain)

ACT III, Scene 1      Time - 1738      Place: - Margaret & John's <sup>Grey</sup> "Bellefonte"  
 Stone Dwelling

A group of men are gathered in the Lewis's house. They have been using this home for the Meeting House for the Presbyterian settlers in the area. A man says, "It has been more than five years since we have heard a sermon 'till today." The Rev. James Anderson from the Donegal Church in Lancaster, Pennsylvania is present. He has been appointed to carry the concerns of the people of Beverly Manor (as the settlement was now called) to Williamsburg. John Lewis (speaks), having been appointed 'Captain of the Inhabitants!', "It is not only a minister we need. There promises to be little peace between us and these savages ever again." Rev. Anderson said, "I will take a letter from you with your requests to the Virginia Council in Williamsburg and give it to the Honorable William Gooch and remind him who protects and defends Virginia on the Western Frontier.

ACT III, Scene 2      Time - A few months later. John has just arrived home from Williamsburg. He is very excited telling Margaret what they have accomplished. "I am glad I went with James Anderson. It took a long time but we convinced them. The appeal secured not only the support of the government but also permission to call our own ministers. And the House of Burgesses promises to make us a County as soon as we have enough people. But the best, we will have justices from the Augusta area as commissioners of Orange County to look after affairs west of the Blue Ridge." John leaves her then but Margaret begins to think about how much their coming to this wilderness has influenced the development of the country, and what strange circumstances brought them here. She says to herself, "I am content to stand with the one who has been my helpmate and watch what influence our children have on this country."

THE END

And so, since it is December 7th, I will say Merry Christmas and Remember Pearl Harbor. Remember, too, that "The hand that rocks the cradle is the hand that rules the world.!"

Remember who rocked the cradle of:

1. Samuel Lewis, Captain in the War between the English and the French. had Andrew, William & Charles in his company. And was killed in 1755 in the War between the English and French Colonists.
2. Andrew Lewis, General, was called by George Washington "the foremost military man of the country" and recommended him as Commander-in-Chief of the Armies.
3. Thomas Lewis, Colonial Surveyor, member of the House of Burgesses, the Virginia Convention in 1776, Commi Confederation in 1777, ratified the Constitution
4. William Lewis, Educated in the East, became a Medical Doctor, member of the Society of the Cincinatti, had high regard for education of children of the Valley
5. Marg Alice Lewis, married William Long who established the first mill in Beverly Manor, called Beverly Mill, later Staunton
6. Ann Lewis, the frail child who couldn't survive the wilderness, and was buried on the prairie.
7. Charles Lewis, the "new world child", <sup>when a child</sup> who/by cunning expaced capture <sup>and as an adult</sup> from the Indians, /led a unit in the battle of Point Pleasant and was killed and buried at the Point.

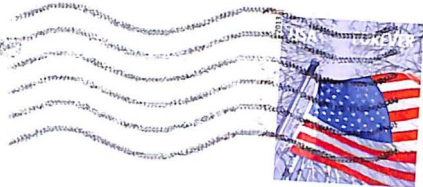
The hand that rocked the cradle of the seven Lewis children ws the hand of Margaret Lynn Lewis, daughter of the Laird of Loch Lynn.

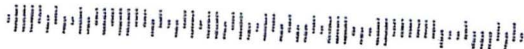
