The School Board is charged with making policy for the operation of the school system. The Board also adopts a budget each year and appoints a Superintendent of Schools as the chief administrative officer. The Superintendent carries out the policies of the Board, makes recommendations and conducts the day-to-day operations of the school system.

The Board believes the public, as major underwriters of education, has a right to know about the policies and operation of the system. The Board meets on the second and fourth Tuesday of each month at 7:30 p.m. in Council Chambers, Municipal Building. Notice of any special meetings is made to the news media in advance. All meetings are open to the public. The Board encourages attendance and participation.

Any citizen representing a group who wishes to speak to the Board is asked to call the Superintendent's Office, 981-2381, by Thursday noon. To be on the agenda, individuals may follow the same procedure, or ask to speak to the Board at the appropriate time during the meeting. Agendas are available in the Superintendent's Office on Friday afternoon before a meeting.

Quality Beyond the Basics

Quality has become an overused word in American education. Everyone seems to be for it, but no one can really define it. Statistics are available to prove just about anything. It is practically impossible to measure the quality of education.

How then can the average citizen make a judgment about the education being provided the children of his locality? All school systems emphasize the basics of reading, math and writing. All school systems hire the best available teachers and administrators and provide the most materials they can.

Perhaps the quality can be determined to some extent by the programs and opportunities offered students and their success. Three years ago, City schools developed a special reading program. The program, then called Criterion Reading, was a management system of teaching reading so that each child would know what skills he had mastered, what remained and exactly where he stood in comparison with where he should be. The State Department of Education is now requiring school systems throughout the state to adopt such an approach and is using many parts of the Roanoke program for the entire statewide program.

The City was the first in Virginia to offer the "forward to the basics" or traditional approach in elementary school. The concept proved so successful four more such schools will be operating this coming year.

The City has had programs for exceptional children for 47 years and has been a pioneer in developing classes to meet all needs of children. Several programs, such as hearing impaired and visually impaired, serve children from surrounding school systems. This year, the City is adding a pre-school center, with teachers, aides and a psychologist, working with 2, 3 and 4 year old children with special needs.

The City's program for gifted and talented students is interwoven in the curriculum. It is not considered an extra to be tagged on to the curriculum, but is integrated with system-wide offerings, those at the school level and in the individual classroom. Curriculum specialists develop the program beginning at the fourth grade. Junior and senior high students are able to enroll in many advanced classes.



Art, music and physical education teachers augment the daily instruction of classroom teachers at the elementary level. Students have the opportunity to play in the band or orchestra or sing in the chorus in elementary school. A junior high student could take two years of art. There is an all-city orchestra for senior high students. Pianists, dancers and architects are among professionals who have worked with students. School bands have won many honors.

The City operates a large adult and vocational education program. Roanoke is one of the few school systems in Virginia to have a diploma-granting evening high school. Adults can receive instruction over the phone. Students have the opportunity to combine study in the morning with work in the afternoon to prepare them for careers.

Students can benefit from varied activities relating to the classroom. Newspapers, literary magazines, and yearbooks have won awards. Organizations exchange the study of certain specialized subjects and trips abroad often follow for students to learn firsthand about a country or language. The schools have an extensive athletic program for girls and boys — one with a history of winning and community support.

Quality goes beyond the basics.

What Time Does School Start?

The opening and closing times for elementary and secondary schools are different. The staggered opening and closing times are necessary because many buses make several runs each morning and afternoon.

The length of the school day is six hours and fifteen minutes for all schools. The exception, of course, is kindergarten, where students attend half-day sessions.

Kindergarten

Kindergarten sessions last three hours. They start at 9:00 a.m. and

end at 12:00 noon, or at 12:15 p.m. and end at 3:15 p.m., with the exception of Fallon Park, Lincoln Terrace, Monterey and Westside, where hours will be 8:30 a.m. - 11:30 a.m. and 11:45 a.m. - 2:45 p.m.

Elementary Schools

All elementary schools will operate on the following schedule: 9:00 a.m. to 3:15 p.m., with the exception of Fallon Park, Lincoln Terrace, Monterey and Westside, where hours will be from 8:30 a.m. to 2:45 p.m. The school for the Trainable Mentally Retarded students at Fishburn Park will operate from 8:00 a.m. to 2:00 p.m.

Junior High Schools

All junior high schools will operate on the following schedule: 8:00 a.m. 2:15 p.m.

Senior High Schools

The two senior high schools will operate on the following schedule: 8:30 a.m. - 2:45 p.m.

What are the Book Fees?

It is expected textbooks will be returned at the end of the year with one year's wear. In other words, if they were issued in good condition, they should be rated at least fair after one year's use. If they are not returned in that condition, a charge may be assessed. Any book that is lost or damaged beyond repair will have to be paid for by parents.

Students may elect to buy textbooks. Those who wish to own their books may purchase them at the School Administration Building, Department of General Services. Please call 981-2716 to verify the textbook is available.

Fees

Fees help defray the cost of textbooks and materials and are due the first day of school. Most schools will accept a check made payable to the school. Contact your child's school for information on the method of payment.

Elementary

The textbook fees are the same as last year. The rental fee is \$6.00 for students in grades 1 through 6. This fee does **not** apply to kindergarten students. It covers both basic and supplemental textbooks. There is a **separate** materials (crayons, paper, etc.) fee of \$3.00 for all elementary grades, including kindergarten.

Secondary

The textbook rental fee has not changed this year: \$8.00 for students in grades 7, 8 and 9, and \$10.00 for students in grades 10, 11 and 12. This covers basic and supplemental textbooks. There also is a \$1.00 materials fee. Other fees may be charged; contact your school for information about them.

What About . . .?

Insurance

As a service, you may purchase insurance for your children through Pilot Life Insurance Company. The school system makes no profit on this service; rather, it is a service conducted by the PTAs.

The rates this year will be \$4.50 per child for insurance coverage just during school hours, and \$28.00 per child for 24-hour coverage. Information will be sent home.

Dress

The School Board does not have a standardized dress code. However, Board Policy (EPS/NSBA FILE: JCDB) does state that the Board shall prohibit all dress, or manner of attire, or grooming which could reasonably endanger the health or safety of students, or which could disrupt the educational process.

Closing School

If school has to be closed because of weather conditions, radio and television stations will be notified as soon as the decision is made. They will **not** be called unless school is closed. Please do not call your child's school. Call 981-2556 if you have a question. If parents question the advisability of having school, they should use their own judgment in determining whether to send their child to school. Buses may be late in severe cold weather. Again, parents should use their own judgment and not allow children to stand outside for a long period of time.

New Students

A student new to City schools should call our information number, 981-2556, to find out what school he or she will be attending. The student must register at that school. Parents should bring birth certificate, immuni-

How Much is a Meal?

All meals served in City schools meet state standards as to quantity and quality of food. Last year, about 9,000 lunches and 2,000 breakfasts were served each day. The cafeteria managers at all 29 schools are engaged in a program toward certification.

All schools serve the Type A meal, consisting of 2 ounces of protein, % cup fruit and vegetable, bread and milk.

The responsibility of the Food Service people goes beyond preparation of meals. It includes purchasing food, planning menus, serving meals and cleaning the cafeteria and equipment, as well as observing the numerous state and federal regulations.

There will be no increase in the cost of meals for students. The school system receives federal and state funds to help keep the cost of meals low. No profit is made on the cafeteria

zation record and other school-related materials to school. The school will request your child's cumulative record.

Transfers

A student who moves within the City after the first six weeks of school can remain at the school he or she was attending, or go to the school in his or her new attendance area. If the student elects to remain in the school in which he or she began the year, then transportation becomes the responsibility of the student or the parents.

Rising 6th, 9th and 12th graders also have the option of remaining in their school with the understanding that transportation is the student's responsibility.

Attendance

110 Prover

All children who have reached their sixth birthday by January 1, 1978, and who have not passed their 17th birthday are required by law to attend a public or private school, or be taught by a teacher approved by the Superintendent of Schools.

A child going to public school for the first time must be 5 years old on or before January 1, 1978, to enter operation; nor is any loss incurred. It is designed to be self-sustaining.

Elementary

Lunch costs 45¢ in elementary schools. Students who bring their lunches may buy milk for 7¢ per onehalf pint.

Secondary

Lunch is 50¢ in junior and senior high school. Students who bring their lunches may buy milk for 7¢ per onehalf pint. In addition to the Type A meal, students have a choice of a la carte items. The price list is posted in the cafeteria.

Breakfast

Eighteen schools serve breakfast for 25¢. The Type A breakfast consists of four ounces of juice or fruit and juice, one ounce of protein and milk.

kindergarten and 6 years old on or before January 1, 1978, to enter first grade during the 1977-78 school year.

Birth Certificates

A birth certificate is required when a child enters public schools for the first time. The certificate must be presented when a child registers for school.

Absences

Attendance and promptness are required, with the exception of legitimate excuses such as sickness, severe illness or death in the family, exposure to a contagious disease, religious holidays or other unusual circumstances.

A student wishing to be absent for any other reason should receive permission in advance from the principal. Such requests should be in writing, stating the time and reason for the absence.

Leaving School

Once a student arrives at school, he or she may not leave the school grounds without permission from the principal. If a student needs to leave High Schools, Breckinridge, Jackson, Madison, and Ruffner Junior Highs, and Fallon Park, Fishburn Park Special Education Wing, Forest Park, Garden City, Highland Park, Hurt Park, Lincoln Terrace, Morningside, Northwest, Oakland, Virginia Heights, and Wasena Elementary Schools.

Tickets and Reduced Price Meals

As a convenience, tickets for lunch may be purchased for a week or a month. They also can be purchased for breakfast, lunch and milk.

Information about the free and reduced price meals will be distributed to each student on the first day of school. Applications should be returned to the principal of the school.

school early on a particular day, the parents should submit a written request to the principal in advance.

A student will not be permitted to leave the school before the end of the school day with anyone other than a parent or school employee unless the principal has first obtained written permission from the parents. Parents will be called if a student needs to leave school because of illness.

Health and Immunization

A physical examination is required at the time of enrollment if it is the child's first admittance into public school. The examination should have been made no more than 12 months prior to enrollment. Forms are available at your school.

Proof of immunization against diphtheria, tetanus, whooping cough, polio, measles and German measles must be presented at the time of the child's enrollment.

Take Me Along

The Transportation Department is committed to provide safe transportation for students.

This is the third year the school system will be operating its own bus fleet. This year, 30 buses have been purchased, enlarging the fleet to 90 buses and three vans.

The increase has led to a reorganization of the department. Chauncey Logan has been named Administrator of Transportation; Barry Tyree is the foreman and Donna Walters is coordinator of training. They direct a staff of about 100 drivers and substitutes and three full-time mechanics and two helpers. Mechanics are able to perform most of the maintenance of buses, including state inspection and repairs.

More than 50 new drivers recently completed the training program. Following curriculum of the State Department of Education, the drivers underwent 8-10 hours of classroom study, a varying amount, depending on need, of behind-the-wheel instruction. The classroom course of study included driving fundamentals, the driver's role and responsibility, passenger control, preventive maintenance and what to do in case of accidents and emergencies. The more experienced drivers will undergo retraining during the year.

Drivers will report to work about a week before school begins for orientation and practice of their routes.

The City follows the state guidelines for determining who is eligible for transportation: elementary and junior high students who live more than a mile from school and senior high students who live more than a mile and a half from school. This means about 13,000 students will be transported each day.

The schools feel strongly the responsibility of providing safe transportation. At the same time, officials recognize safety is a two-way process. Drivers need the cooperation of parents and children. Rules for safe transportation will be distributed in the schools. Parents are urged to discuss the rules with their children and to do everything to see that they follow the rules.





Most Don't Warm Up To Fire Drills

Crayons and coats are expendable.

Not one of Donna Horak's first graders at Grandin Court Elementary School bothered about school gear or wraps when the fire alarm sounded at 1:30 p.m. Thursday.

But they didn't risk leaving beloved animals behind. It was sense day — touch, taste, see, hear and smell. Many of the children brought their favorite bedtime pals, a plush monkey, a little black bear, a perky puppet, for classmates to see and touch.

Those went along as the class trooped out for the monthly fire drill.

Patra Wright left her green pepper in her desk.

"It's a good thing it wasn't a real fire," said Scott Sink when they returned to the classroom. "You'd have had a toasted green pepper."

Craig Skull didn't bother to take his water pistol, either. "Wouldn't have done any good," he said. "It was empty."

Young as they are, Mrs. Horack's first graders are a pretty sanguine group about fire drills.

The second the rancous siren sounded, they started trooping out the rear door of their classroom and up concrete steps to a wooded knoll they share with a kindergarten class as a fire drill station.

Mounds of leaves were wet from a recent shower. They made for great scuffing, but it was obvious from the nearly unbroken files of all the classes that fire drills aren't fun time. They're too short for anyone to sneak in a bit of romping behind the teacher's back.

It took a minute and 20 seconds to empty the building. Another minute or two to make sure everyone was out and then it was back to class.

Even so, it was a welcome stretch for pupils chained indoors by rain for the last two weeks. A couple of the first graders couldn't help skipping and prancing back down the steps.

Jack Stevens wasn't happy. He doesn't like fire drills. Ever since kindergarten, he said, he expects the school to be on fire when he goes back in after a drill.

Some of Grandin Court's teachers didn't like Thursday's drill, either. They complained of "freezing to death" during the extra minute or so outside enabling the photographer to take pictures. The temperature was 61 degrees.

Mrs. Horak worried about the janitor having to clean all the muddy tracks off the classroom floor. After the first month of school when a fire drill is held every week, regulations call for a drill to be held once

nonthly — usually during the first week. Spokesmen for four elementary Roanoke schools called before Grandin Court said they didn't hold fire drills in inelement weather.

"We've enough sore throats already. And when it's muddy, it's too messy," said a spokesman from Lincoln Terrace.

There was a downpour 15 minutes before the Grandin Court drill, which had been scheduled Thursday morning when the sun was shining.

Principal A. Carl Nave Jr. peered outside at the diminishing drops and decided to let the drill go as scheduled.

"A little rain won't melt them away," he said. Not a drop fell during the drill.

Asked what she'd do if the school really burned down and a telephone wasn't available to call her parents, one first grader said: "I'd just wait out front for the bus."

Another said she'd start walking home.

A boy allowed as how he'd help the firemen put out the fire and ride home on the back of the truck. That must have a been a wizard idea.


The REACH Preschool Staff appreciates your interest in our program. We were very encouraged that you included us in the recommendations you presented to the School Board last week.

Safety poster contest winners announced

Winners have been announced in a safety poster contest sponsored by United Commercial Travelers of America, a community service organization.

Students in public and private schools throughout the Roanoke Valley were invited to enter either the regular division or the special education division. Each division had subcategories of lower level (grades 4-6), middle level (grades 7-9) and upper level (grades 10-12).

There were no entries in the middle and upper level categories for the regular division. Winners in the lower level category are Melinda Jackson, Preston Park Elementary, first place; Margaret Hale, Grandin Court Elementary, second place; Marnie Hogan, Garden City Elementary, third place; Lynn Chittum from William Byrd Intermediate School and William Bond from Grandin Court Elementary, honorable mentions.

Winners in the special education division's lower level are Pamela Wendell, first place; Larry Cunningham, second place; and Rhonda Gregory, third place. All are students at Highland Park Elementary. Darryl Brown, John Schram and Melissa Swain, all from Huff Lane Elementary, received honorable mentions.

Winners in the special education division's middle level competition are Elsie Greene, James Madison Junior High, first place; Tyler Turner, William Byrd Intermediate, second place; Patricia Bucker, James Madison Junior High, third place; David Richie, William Byrd Intermediate, and Joseph Miller, James Madison Junior High, honorable mentions.

The upper level winners in the special education division are Charles Turner, first place; Kathy Pickering, second place; William Boyd, third place; Debbie Morton and Kathy Manning, honorable mention. All are students at the Roanoke County Occupational School.

The judges were James P. Jones, safety officer for the Roanoke City Schools; J.G. Woodard, vice president, Stanford and Inge Outdoor Advertising; and Edward Tucker, planning department, city of Roanoke.

Winners received \$10 for first place, \$5 for second place and \$3 for third place. All special education students who entered received a \$1 award.

Mrs. Valentour said there are 37 handicapped children ages 2 to 4 in the program at Grandin Court Elementary School.

Some children, such as Tamara, have severe and multiple handicaps, while oth-ers have handicaps that are detected only through fine screening by experts.

"We have some children that, if you came out here and looked at them, you wouldn't think there was anything wrong,' Mrs. Valentour said.

Mrs. Valentour said she would guess that about 40 percent of the preschoolers at Grandin Court have a chance to go into regular kindergartens and lead normal lives if their language delays can be overcome ear-

Some of the suppressed development is a result of cultural deprivation - mothers and fathers who don't talk to their children, said Grace Repass, speech and language pathologist at the school.

Other children with obvious mental and physical handicaps - sometimes both - will always need special help, Mrs. Valentour said, but they will be better off with this headstart than without it.

And there are still many children the schools don't know about who need help now, she said.

"We've just scratched the surface," she said.

Undetected subtle problems, such as language delays or emotional problems, usually would show up in later grades as disruptive behavior or failure to learn.

"I believe very strongly in what we're trying to do, I think it's very important," said Mitchell Bowman, principal at Moun-tain View Elementary School where the county's program for the preschool handicapped is going on.

The county has 21 children ages 2 to 4 attending special classes. To the uninitiated, the goings-on at the preschool centers look like child's play.

It is.

"We believe that at this age, children learn through play," Mrs. Valentour said.

"One of the concerns I hear expressed," Bowman said of critics of the program, "is are we doing any more than providing baby-sitting service?"

The brightly colored blocks, the funny puppets, the bouncing balls, the beads to string, the wheeled toys the children push around the rooms are intended to serve as stimulation to break through the barriers of their handicaps.

Children, otherwise isolated at home, interact with one another. They play. They hit. They laugh. They cry. They are workto do what comes naturally to other ing children.

"We have a purpose behind every activity, it's not just playing and entertaining the kids," said Caren Rowland, the coun-ty's child development specialist.

Behind every child in the preschool

programs there are tests and evaluations and charts and record books to record their every move, every inch of progress.

A large chart on a bulletin board, surrounded by children's water paintings, is entitled, "Behavioral Characteristics Pro-gression."

Kerry Krause, who with his wife, Linda, makes up half of the four-teacher staff, said the chart lists 59 common activities (eating, drinking, using the bathroom) and includes 2,400 benchmarks of progress.

In the city and county programs, every child is tested to determine the extent of the handicaps and to map out individual educational plans to help the child make the best of it

"I think they need all the stimulation they can get," said Maritta Bryan, who attends Mountain View with her 2-year-old son, Mark. Mark has Down's syndrome, a form of mental retardation known as Mongolism.

"As parents, we need all the help we can get," said Mrs. Brian, who has two oth-er children, ages 3 and 11. "They (the teachers) help us to know what to do when we get home. I've got to carry it on into the home.

son, Eric, also has Down's syndrome, said she, too, is learning a lot about how to help her son develop his potential.

right way," she said. "Now I know I wasn't all alone and I know there are people who want to help."

"What we're trying to do is help the mothers work with their children," Mrs. Rowland said. "The parents are the most important teachers the children will ever have. But you can't wait until they are in the third or fourth grade to start working on them.'

The first five years of a child's life – especially if they're handicapped – are the most important, she said.

For the older children - the 3- and 4-year-olds — learning to carry a tray and pour their milk in the school cafeteria is part of the day's learning plan, Krause said.

'Some of these kids can't walk too well, so carrying a tray is a challenge in it-self," he said. Three teachers, three aides and three foster grandparents from the League of Older Americans supervise the lunch period.

Elizabeth Robertson, 62, a foster grandmother for the handicapped children, said she used to work at a day-care center.

"I didn't think I'd like this over here at first," she said, "but when I see how rewarding it is I like it better than the daycare center.'

Mrs. Robertson said she just wants to help make a child happy - but the work helps her more than anyone.

Krause gestured toward a boy sitting in front of his tray. The boy wouldn't even sit down at the table on the first day of school, he said. He's learned to sit down. A breakthrough.

A lot of the work is training children to do what most children learn naturally, Krause said. Without professional help ear-ly, he said, some of the children may never learn even to care for themselves.

"It takes a lot of patience and a lot of firmness, too," he said.

Krause said he hopes that by the end of the school year all the children will be toilet-trained and able to feed themselves. About half of them do not utter a word,

Mountain View Principal Bowman, who has a doctoral degree in early childhood education, said that getting these children together before they would normally start school is part of the therapy.

Social interaction, he said, "is forcing them to want to talk.

Bowman pointed to a boy and said, "We don't know whether he can talk. He won't talk. We don't know if he's deaf or what."

At almost that same instant, Mrs. Krause, who had just entered the room, hugged the child Bowman had been point-ing to and exclaimed, "Good talking, good talking.

The boy had said something.

It was the first time, she and Bowman said, that the boy had responded verbally to anything.

When Mrs. Krause had entered the room, the child said, "Hi.

School Helps Disabled Tots

"I think that by Christmas she'll be sitting up," the mother said. "Of course, I've been saying that for two Christmases."

Janice Sweet said her doctor gave her little hope that her daughter, Rickie Ann, would be much more than a vegetable when she was born two years ago with part of her brain protruding from her skull.

She survived an operation to close the skull. but for most of her 24 months of life she did not move much under her own power.

"She just rolled over in May," Mrs. Sweet said. Now her doctor is giving cautious encouragement that Rickie Ann may gain a measure of control over her body - someday.

Rickie Ann, her fine blonde hair tied back with plastic berets, fretted and fussed as her physical therapist manipulated her rubbery arms and legs and discussed her treatment with her teacher.

"I'd be satisfied if she could learn to walk so she could go to the bathroom ... so she could play with her brother," said Mrs. Sweet, whose son is 31/2. "I think I'd be satisfied if she could just do some of the things we take for granted."

These are simple things that most mothers and fathers take for granted in their children reaching, grasping, rolling over in their cribs, crawling, walking, talking, playing with other children.

Matthew, 22 months old, is blind.

His mother, Kitty Ailstock, said he was not expected to live when he was born 21/2 months early weighing only 21/2 pounds. Oxygen needed to keep him alive caused his blindness, his mother said.

"It's a miracle he's alive," Mrs. Ailstoch said. "They told us up until 15 days before we brought him home that he wouldn't live."

Tamara, who was 2 last March, seemed to be a normal child until she was hit by seizures at about 2 months and lapsed into a five-week coma on her first birthday.

Her mother, Debbie Reynolds, said doctors don't know what caused it, but the results were brain damage, near total blindness, deafness and the inability to talk.

"I think it's really wonderful," Mrs. Reynolds said of the Roanoke Valley's new program of early childhood education for the handicapped, "how they have different people to work with different parts of her body.

Tamara, her hair tied up into black cotton-Stoff Photo by Betty Mosters balls with pink and blue yarn, spends most of the day in school because the staff thinks she needs as much help as possible - jusi learning to breathe and move. Her mother sail she has noticed some improvement this year.

While a teacher reads to a half dozen 4-yearolds, Tamara is propped in a special wooden seat made for her at the University of Virginia Children's Rehabilitation Center. The seat holds her head erect.

Georgia Valentour, child development specialist for Roanoke City's Project REACH (Roanoke Education and Assessment for Children with Handicaps), said there's no way to tell if Tamara is getting anything out of the reading or her association with the other children. She just sits there. But the other children obviously love her

A 4-year-old boy has not learned to talk yet because a chronic ear infection has impaired his hearing.

A girl, 5 but not ready for kindergarten because of retarded language development, is a mystery. Mrs. Valentour said, but minimal brain damage is suspected

Another 4-year-old boy has brain damage because he accidentally shot himself in the head with his grandfather's gun two years ago, she said.

To compensate for their handicaps, Mrs. Valentour said, "we try to bombard the other senses.

Most children naturally learn to walk and talk at home and start kindergarten at age 5, but the State Department of Education estimates that 10,000 children under the age of 5 in Virginia have handicaps that retard their early childhood development.

About 4.000 children under 5 have been identified as having a handicap, ranging from severe retardation to a mere delay in language development, who need early childhood education in the public schools. The schools are looking for the rest of them.

Rickie Ann, Matthew and Tamara are among about 60 children under 5 in Roanoke City and Roanoke County who are getting preschool services, either in school or at home.

Public schools throughout the nation are getting into early childhood education of handicapped children because a federal law passed four years ago requires appropriate education of handicapped persons ages 3 to 21 at public expense.

A Virginia law, passed six years ago, goes a step further - down to age 2. But such education is expensive - two to three times the cost for regular students - and progress has been slow.

Total student prizes are worth \$2710 cash. There are also four school trophies (valued at \$140), and 12 cash grants of \$25'each (accompanied by a framable certificate) for classroom teachers (total value \$350). Total contest prizes equal \$3200.

Contest Rules

- 1. Contest is open to students enrolled in grades 1-12 of any public or private school within the State of Virginia. Students may also enter individually, or through 4-H club, Scouts, etc.
- 2. General theme: "Keep Virginia Beautiful." Posters should illustrate one or more of the many ways Virginia can be made a cleaner state in which to live, work and play. Students may select sub-themes emphasizing litter prevention, or the dangers and problems litter creates. Suggested sub-themes might be: Litter hurts wildlife, Keep Smokey's home clean, Doesn't litter bug you? Litter-a fire hazard, Lost resources in trash, Give a hoot-don't pollute, Keep our waters clean, etc. Posters might note the wasteful costs of litter cleanup, or the benefits everyone enjoys from clean parks and forestlands.
- Posters should be bold and simple, using attention-getting colors, and symbols rather than detailed pictures. Any medium may be used: water color, oil, magic marker, crayon, collage, etc. Poster must measure 11" WIDE and 14" TALL. Any other size will be disqualified.
- 4. On the BACK of each poster must be shown the full name, age, and grade of the student, with school, school address, zip code, county and teacher. Students may submit more than one poster, but will be awarded only the highest prize won.

5. Dollar amounts of prizes will be DOUBLED for all winning grade school posters identified with a 1978 imprinted KVG bookcover cutout. High school winners using the 1978 imprinted cutout will receive \$35, 30, 25, and 20 extra, respectively, for the top four places; \$15 extra for honorable mention; and a doubling of prizes for all other winners.

Cash prizes and certificates will be sent to the school principal.
- Judges will consist of art professors, commercial artists, staff of the Dept. of Education, Virginia Forestry Association, Division of Litter Control and the Division of Forestry, together with any others designated by the sponsors. Decision of the judges will be final.






