Mr. Wilson and Mr. Sizer were often found chatting in the hall between classes or during lunch break.








Mr. Jerald White, Principal

Mr. Randolph Nicholls served as sophomore counselor and assisted the sophomores who took the National Education Development tests this year.









The girls' physical education classes participated in a nationwide physical fitness program with awards being given to students who are above the fifty percentile on all test items.



The Acorn Yearbook










