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Russians Tour Amos Plant

Four Russians recently visited West Virginia to tour Appalachian Power Company's John E. Amos

The June 20 tour followed a conference in Washington on thermal power-plant heat rejection systems, at which Millard Cherry, assistant section head of the Service Corporation's Heat Exchanges and Pumps Section of Mechanical Engineering, spoke on natural-draft cooling towers in the United States. Both the tour and the conference were part of a six-day joint technical exchange sponsored by the Atomic Energy Commission.

U. S. representatives from businesses and government agencies made technical presentations and heard the Russians deliver four papers during the exchange.

The USSR delegation was headed by Viktor Zubenko, chief engineer of the Main Technical Directorate of the Ministry of

Chairman Cook outlines economy program; reliability of service will not be jeopardized

The American Electric Power System has embarked on an economy program that has the objective of minimizing both capital and operating penditures during the current period of rampant inflation.

Chairman Donald C. Cook last month outlined the scope of the program in broad, general terms. He called for cutbacks in construction expenditures and operating expenses to help take the pressure off the System's financing requirements.

(In an interview with BUSINESS WEEK, Cook had put the scale of the program on the basis of possible spending reductions totaling \$250 million through the end of 1976.)

The chairman said that, with a few major exceptions, some construction projects would be stretched out and others deferred to better times. He urged reductions in operating expenses in every possible area.

At the same time, Cook emphasized that no step would be taken that would jeopardize the reliability of customers' electric power supply.

"The AEP System is in a strong position today," he said. "We are strong in electric power generation and getting stronger, with 4.8-million kilowatts of additional generating capacity well along in construction and

operation within the next 24 months. We are also strong in our transmission system and in our fuel supply. All of these strengths will stand us in good stead in the months and years to come.

"Nonetheless," he continued, "we are not immunue from inflation, high interest rates and the soaring environmental costs facing the electric utility industry today. These are problems that are simply not in our control or, at best, cannot be dealt with in the same ways as in the past.

In the past, when we needed to do things, we did them, conscious of the fact that we would have no difficulty in financing them. Now, all that has changed. of times. We have to determine which things are most important to do within the limits of what can be financed.

"We cannot wait until we are in trouble to prove that we can get out of it. The job is to see to it that we don't get in trouble in the first place, and we are developing these programs to see that we don't," Cook concluded.

He said that the slowdown in construction would apply more to new plants announced but not yet under way than to the two major power stations now well along: the 2.6-million-kw, coalfired General James M. Gavin Plant in Ohio and the 2.2-million-

scheduled for commercial kw Donald C. Cook Nuclear Plant in Michigan. "In fact, we hope to accelerate final work on the nuclear plant's Unit I so that it can be licensed and placed in operation on the earliest possible date this year," he said, pointing out not only that it would begin earning a return on the investment in it but particularly that its operation, utilizing nuclear fuel, "would help to ease the burden on the System's use of coal, the price of which is skyrocketing out of sight."

Cook estimated that construction of three new 1.3-million-kw, coalfired generating units, announced earlier this year, would be slowed down from 12 to 24 months, as follows: Appalachian Power Company's new plant at New Today, we have a different kind Haven, W. Va. - 12 months; Indiana & Michigan Electric Company's two new units near Sullivan, Ind., Unit I — 18 months, and Unit 2 — 24 months. In this connection, the new Appalachian unit is now scheduled for operation in 1978; the first I&M unit in late 1979, and the second I&M unit in 1981.

> At the same time, Cook emphasized that there would be little, if any, change in the over-all impact on the local economy of the two areas as a result of the stretch-out of the two projects.

Blue Ridge license granted project still faces delay

Appalachian Power Company least five years and co has accepted the license granted by the Federal Power Commission for construction of its proposed Blue Ridge pumped storage and hydroelectric project on the New River in Grayson County, Virginia, and Ashe and Alleghany counties, North Carolina. Appalachian accepted the license as issued but called the Commission's attention to the fact that several of the license articles called for the completion of certain matters within a specified time after the issuance, rather than after the effect date of the license.

The favorable FPC decision came June 20, just one week short of 12 years from the day Appalachian had applied for a preliminary permit for the project.

Pending legislation

The Commission, however, delayed the effective date of the license until January 2, 1975, so that the 93rd Congress will have full opportunity to act upon pending legislation that would affect the project. The House of Representatives is currently considering a bill sponsored by Rep. Wilmer Mizell of North Carolina to include a stretch of the New River for study as a potential part of the National Wild and Scenic Rivers System. A similar bill has already passed the Senate. The passage of such legislation could delay the start of the project at

ultimately kill the Blue Ric Project.

The project, as approved in I month's decision, would cost estimated \$430-million. / palachian is required to st work within two years from 1 effective date of the license a to complete the project with eight years of that date.

The FPC said the project "\ markedly enhance the re reational potential of a porti of Appalachia, and in so doi will be of benefit to the people the crowded metropolitan are of much of the eastern Unit States". In addition, the Co mission said the project will e courage economic developme in the immediate area surrou ding the project as well provide water benefits dow stream where New River flow are periodically in need augmentation.

The Commission also conclud that the environmental cc sequences of the project will both profound and, on balance beneficial. The FPC said th inevitably so massive a project this will effect various substant environmental changes, whi have been examined in gre detail. I&M, Braztah sign 25-year contract for 140-million tons of low-sulfur coa

A long-term contract for the supply of more than 140-million tons of low-sulfur, high-heating-value coal was announced last month by Indiana & Michigan Electric Company and McCulloch Oil Corporation.

Estimated total sales value of the coal to be produced at the mine site is in excess of \$1-billion.

The contract now awaits approval by the Securities and Exchange Commission and completion of financing arrangements by the two parties.

Under the agreement, I&M will buy a minimum of 140-million tons of coal over a 25-year period from Braztah Corporation, McCulloch's Utah-based coalproducing subsidiary. I&M will also make loans and guarantee debt and lease financing for equipment and facilities at Braztah's underground mines near Helper, Utah.

As the mine is developed and production accelerates. Braztah will increase coal shipments from 800,000 tons the first year to

an annual rate of 6.5 million to by 1982.

I&M has already received init shipments of coal, following tl signing of a letter of intent la

The contract includes minimu quality specifications related the coal's heating valu moisture, ash and sulfur content

American Electric President George V. Patterso commented, "This coal supp contract is of significance to u because I&M and other AE System generating units as assured a dependable supply the low-sulfur coal needed maintain compliance with a quality standards."

And McCulloch Oil Presider C. V. Wood, Jr., said, "This potentially the most significar contract ever undertaken by Mc Culloch Oil Corporation, and w are delighted to have this or portunity to establish a long-terr relationship with this great utilit system."

recreational areas of the eastern portion of the U.S.

A major public benefit of the project, and one beyond dispute, would be the 160,000 acre feet of flood control storage capacity it would provide for the Upper New River area, an amount endorsed by the Army's Corps of Engineers. The FPC noted that no flood control protection now exists between the lower reservoir site and the federal Bluestone Dam at Hinton, W. Va.

The Commission said the issue of improving the quality of the lower Kanawha River by the storage and controlled release of water for the benefit of Charleston, W. Va., has now been eliminated.

On the question of water quality control storage for the benefit of Radford, Va., the FPC adopted the administrative law judge's conclusion that this would be accomplished by the release of up to 1200 cubic feet per second through 1999 and up to 1400 thereafter, as the need arises. The Commonwealth of Virginia expects increased industrialization in and around Radford, the FPC noted.

The Commission concluded that "on the basis of the massive record," the adverse effects upon the environment that the Blue Ridge Project would cause are both numerous and substantial. However, the FPC also concluded "that they are more than balanced by the environmental benefits that would be created." The FPC noted that a free-flowing stream would be partially lost, 2700 people would be forced to move, and about 40,000 acres "of handsome. rolling countryside would be inundated".

But simultaneously, the Commission added, electric power would be produced - "power that is and will be sorely needed by American consumers for the purpose, among many others, of improving the environment". "In our judgment," the Commission declared, "the Blue Ridge Project would contribute much more than it would take away".

Sporn workers reject union

Employees at Central Operating Company's Philip Sporn Plant last month voted 194-39 against representation by the Utility Workers Union of America AFL-

UWUA had represented a portion of Sporn employees since 1956, and all three groups of employees represented by the union at the plant rejected further representation.

In October 1973. Central Operating Company officials had petitioned the National Labor Relations Board seeking an election among the employees at the plant. At that time, E. H. Gloss, plant manager, explained the company had made the request because 92 members of UWUA Local 426 had returned to work "apparently repudiating a strike which has been under way since July" and the company had a "good faith doubt" that the union represented a majority of the employees at the plant.

I&M sells bonds, delays stock offer

Indiana & Michigan Electric Company last month accepted a proposal for \$70-million of eightyear first-mortgage bonds submitted by a group of underwriters represented by First Boston Corporation. The successful bid was for 99.417 percent of principal amount and a coupon rate of 10.25 percent, a cost to I&M of 10.359 percent. The successful underwriters are reoffering the bonds to the public at 100.8 percent of principal amount, a yield of 10.1 percent.

At the same time, George V. Patterson, I&M vice president and president of the Service Corporation, announced the company's decision to postpone a proposed offering of 300,000 shares of cumulative preferred stock. He said, "The postponement of the sale of the I&M preferred was made in the light of unsettled market conditions and because of the company's desire to ascertain whether some modification in the terms of the security or the means of offering might facilitate its sale."

Sale of the bonds and the proposed sale of the preferred stock by I&M, Patterson explained, remain part of the company's overall financing program, with proceeds of the two issues to be applied to retirement of short-term debt.



APCo job was turning point for former invalid Liston Ernest

Our companies' policy of hiring disabled veterans whenever possible may have been the turning point in Liston Ernest's life.

In 1943, while serving in the U. S. Army's 70th Division, Ernie was involved in a vehicle accident during which he sustained a hip and pelvis injury that never healed. He spent six years at one stretch in the hospital and seemed

destined to be an invalid the rest of his life. But Ernie had a talk with himself and decided that one way or the other, he was going to make it out in the world, earning a living for his family the same as any other man.

One of the first places he applied for a job was at Appalachian Power. He began work in 1953 as a junior clerk and was a PBX operator before being promoted to T&D clerk in the Huntington Division operating center. And, as of July 1, Ernie had progressed to the pleasant stage of his life called "normal retirement".

When asked if he would do it all over again, Ernie replied without hesitation: "Definitely. My experience with the power company has been good for my health and happiness and has been the force that enabled me to live a useful and productive life."

Ernie and his wife Marie have a married son and a daughter still in school. He is active in the Jefferson Avenue Baptist Church in Huntington, a Mason and, as he puts it, "a proud grandfather". Some of his future plans include traveling and hunting. Maybe some people think a man who walks with a crutch is unable to hunt, but Ernie knows better.

Retirement for Jim Roseberry means "no more trouble calls"

The words "concern, care and dedication" might well describe both the career and life of James J. Roseberry, who retired July 1 as Abingdon Division area supervisor A. A deeply religious man, Jim is respected by his men for not compromising his beliefs.
